A Message from Rev. Dr. Roger Paavola, President

TRADITION

Tra·di·tion – $tr \ni 'diSH(\ni)n$ - the transmission of customs or beliefs from generation to generation, or the fact of being passed on in this way. (Oxford Collegiate Dictionary of the English Language, 2009) Lutheran schools and education have been a tradition and were always a priority for Lutherans who migrated to the United States and Australia from Germany and Scandinavia. One of the first things they did was to create schools for their children. This strong educational tradition was handed down from Martin Luther himself. When The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod was founded 1847. traditional Lutheran education was continued from the congregations that started with an education ministry prior

to the formation of the LCMS. The Synod started with twelve churches that operated a total of nineteen schools. Several of the churches operated a number of schools in the rural countryside so that students would not have to walk too far to school each day. In a letter to German councilmen, dated 1524, Luther writes, "By helping the youth we shall be helping ourselves and all men." In other words, a well-ordered and stable society must have men and women who are professionally trained in their particular fields. It's essential because, Luther wrote, "Where there were no people who have been made wise through the Word and the laws, there bears, lions, goats and dogs hold public office and head the economy."

By and large, Lutheran schools are operated by individual

congregations. Some Lutheran schools are operated by groups of congregations, or associations. The schools are autonomous in that they call or contract their own teachers, select their curriculum, and establish their own fee structure. Most of the costs for providing early and secondary education were paid by the sponsoring congregation. With the economic situation that exists today most of the operating funds come from tuition and fees. Yet, tuition based private education faces an increased pressure to find other funding sources.

The LCMS operates the largest Protestant school system in the United States. As of the 2017-18 school year, the LCMS operated 1,127 Early Childhood Centers, 778 elementary schools, and 87 high schools. The LCMS also operates seven universities and two seminaries. These schools educate more than 180,000 students and are taught by almost 22,000 teachers. Lutheran schools in Hong Kong, mainland China, and Vietnam are operated or affiliated with the LCMS. By comparison, The Wisconsin Synod (WELS) operates 393 early childhood education centers, 304

elementary schools, and 29 high schools. The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) operates 1,573 early childhood programs, 296 elementary schools, and 14 high schools as of December 31, 2018.

Lutheran schools have always had a prominent role in the Lutheran church. Martin Luther and Philipp Melanchthon were professors at Wittenberg University. Melanchthon focused on curriculum revision at the post-secondary level. Luther centered his attention on the lower academic levels. He stressed the education of children and assigned responsibility for this task to parents, the church, and public authorities. He advocated instruction in the vernacular for girls and boys and a curriculum heavy on religion and music.

Lutherans immigrating to America often brought with them a determination to educate children using a religious-based curriculum. Rev. Dr. Henry Melchior Muhlenberg arrived in America in 1742 to assist the scattered Lutheran churches and their schools, especially in Pennsylvania. In addition to assisting with parish schools, Muhlenberg conducted

one of the first "charity schools" in Pennsylvania. St. Matthew Lutheran School was established in New York City in 1752.

The emphasis on parish schools was even greater among the Saxon Lutherans who immigrated to the Midwest. Their goal was that every parish should support a school. So important were parochial schools to them that, when they organized what is now The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod (LCMS), "the establishment and support of congregation parochial schools" was listed as one of the primary purposes for the establishment of that Synod. The growth of the LCMS can be directly related to the presence of the education ministries.

Former education executive for Synod, Terry Schmidt, observed, "Lutheran schools have a reputation for offering highquality education. Yet, the schools promise so much more. They are centered on Jesus and His amazing grace demonstrated on the cross for every child enrolled in our schools. It is uniquely Christ's care as God's Word is infused daily into the lessons and curriculum of our Lutheran schools that make the ultimate difference." Rev.



Dr. Daniel Paavola, a theology professor at Concordia University Wisconsin in Mequon, Wis., adds, "Lutheran education at all levels teaches and lives out the Gospel message of God's salvation through Christ."

Our objective in the Mid-South District is to grow education ministry opportunities, following the pattern from the beginning of the Lutheran Reformation, and its advent into the American landscape. We continue to pray for our education ministries, our workers, and the congregations that support this vital link to our communities and around the world.





FOR CHANGE




"Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world." Those are the words of Nelson Mandela and they are so relevant for the future of Haiti. Where close to half of the adult population remains illiterate, change is critical in this country of 11-million people. That change must start with educating the next generation, with close to 40% of their population being under the age of 14 (compared to approx. 21% in the U.S.). Haitian parents must value education and strive for their children to stay in school. It is especially important for those parents that do not have an education themselves to understand this reality.

Haitian schools teach the children far more than just reading, writing and arithmetic. With many of the children living in remote, isolated areas, the school setting teaches them social skills, leadership, and how to work well with others. In addition, a very large number of the schools throughout

Haiti are directly associated with a local church, therefore teaching them the Good News of Jesus Christ. This equips the children to battle the influence of Voodoo, a very prevalent and dangerous problem in their communities. As the great philosopher Aristotle wisely said, "Educating the mind without educating the heart is no education at all." The combination of academic learning, social development, and Biblical truths fully prepare the child to become a future asset to their country.

child However, if а is malnourished or has not eaten recently, the learning process often falls on deaf ears. For that, God created the ministry of Trinity HOPE. Through the dedicated support of their many donors, Trinity HOPE now provides a nutritious noon meal to over 33,500 children, teachers and cooks every school day in 160+ Christian schools throughout Haiti. In addition, by continued blessings provided by God, Trinity HOPE

plans to add another 8,000 – 10,000 children to their feeding programs over the next 6 months. This meal is a tremendous incentive for parents to find a way to send their children to school, and helps the child better learn and retain their lessons. 
