A Message from Rev. Dr. Roger Paavola, President



Are most Americans optimistic? A recent poll off the Internet said 70% of American expect – count on – 2022 – to be better than 2021. 70%!! Now, does the clock striking 12 midnight or flipping the calendar to the next day, month and year really mean that 2022 is going to be better? Of course not! Will we change our bad habits? Will January 1, 2022 be any different than December 31, 2021? Our wellbeing, this world, our bodies, and the entire Cosmos aren't inseparably tied to our calendar. In fact, 2/3 of our world doesn't celebrate New Year's Eve. They use a different calendar. So where's our optimism coming from?

A son called his parents to wish them a happy New Year and when his Dad answered the phone, he asked his dad, "well Dad, what's your New Year's

resolution? His dad replied, To make "To make your mother as happy as I can all year." When his mom got on the phone he asked her the same question. His mom replied my resolution is "To see that your dad keeps his New Year's resolution."

Because we're a follower of Christ, we know our life should be filled with joy, and hope amidst all things – good or bad. We also know we have joy despite the junk that messed up this last year – but will likely happen again in 2022. St Paul's Epistle says joy in Christ is our strength – in bad or good times, regardless of circumstances. This joy and peace passes our human understanding, that if properly grounded, properly nourished, and properly fed, it will overcome great grief and suffering.

When Jesus prayed to the Father, He said, "I pray that they

[that's us – His dear children] - may have the full measure of My joy within them." He also made a great promise, saying, "You will rejoice. And no one will take away your joy" No person, no thing can take away our peace and joy that passes our understanding! It's His Promise!

Remember the times when Jesus spoke to His disciples about troubles and persecution? They were going to be robbed of everything they owned. Ten of the Eleven would be tortured and put to death. And, despite all of this, Jesus promised them joy. So, why did a majority of Americans say they felt 2022 would be better? Because they realize, in retrospect, that 2021 didn't even come close to what they wanted!

St Paul picks up on this idea saying, "Nothing...no disease... no persecution... no alienation... no

loneliness.... no torture... not even death..... will take this gift of Divine peace and joy away." Do we really want that kind of joy? Paul knew how to live in a dying world – a world that's deeply immersed in brokenness, troubles, persecution, and conflict. Just look at our cities' streets last month! How can Christians live like that?!

Paul's answers for us on the entry into another optimistically filled New Year's Eve: He says that because we're followers of Christ, our bad things are real, but God will work them together for good, our good thing won't be lost. This is the reason for Divine joy. The bad things that happen to us (which are bad) will work together for good. Paul says it this way, *"We know that for those who love God all things work together for good, for those who are called according to His purpose."* Everything! The Good, the Bad, and the Ugly. They happen to Christians, just as they do to the rest of the world. But, for the Christians – those called according to His purpose - these things will never make us lose our hope in our Promise from God.

He makes the sun rise on the evil and on the good. He sends rain on the just and on the unjust. We face the reality of what it means to journey through this life where bad things happen. God wants us to live in an eternal joy and get us out of this rat trap where evil things happen. Being a Christian doesn't put an invisible shield around us or give us trees in our backyards that grow money. That's not the way things happen in this world. It's false teaching!

Too many Christians hear preachers say that if you have enough faith, love God, and serve Him faithfully, then you won't have any bad things happen to you. If that's true, explain the martyr deaths of countless thousands who died for the faith in the first six centuries after Christ? How do we explain the poverty, suffering, and death of Jesus? For that matter, how do we explain the little children from foreign lands who are slaughtered in front of their parents because they won't renounce Jesus Christ as their Savior. Simply stated, teachings that becoming a Christian turns everything into a bed of roses is simply false! Scriptures doesn't teach that.

St Paul makes this clear. He says "All things" good and bad will be used for the good of those who love God. He goes on to say, *"What then will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress or persecution, or famine, or nakedness or peril or sword?"* These aren't good things, they're terrible! But, God's Word says that when these things happen to those who love God, they won't separate us from God's love, peace, and joy... ever! Thanks be to God, when good things come. They're always going to be because of God's grace and favor toward us. God makes all things come together for our good.

Notice Paul doesn't say, *"Things* work together for good." He knew that when he relied on his own works or flesh, he constantly failed. He wrote, *"O wretched man that I am! Who can deliver me from the body of this death? I thank God: through Jesus Christ our Lord."* If the great

apostle Paul struggled with sin and failure, what makes us think we won't? St Paul, like us, knew that on our own, we can never work those things together for our good. In other words, if good happens, it's because God works it together for our good.

Paul writes, *"For those whom He foreknew, He also predestined to be conformed to the image of His Son, in order that He might be the firstborn among many brothers. And those whom He predestined, He also called, and those whom He called, He also justified, and those whom He justified, He also glorified. What shall we say of these things? If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare His own Son but gave Him up for us all, how will He not also with Him graciously give us all things?"*

When we experience love... when someone is there to hug us if we're hurting, or holds our hand if we're in despair... if someone loves us despite all our flaws and sin, it's because God brings all things together for our good! God's holding love, peace, forgiveness and joy in front of our faces. Everything that goes well... **everything good** is another example of God's miraculous grace for us.

Paul didn't promise Christians an easier earthly life than those who don't love God. Nor did he imply that bad things are really good things or that hardship, distress, persecution, famine, nakedness, peril and sword are good. He does say however, that we have the promise that all these things will work for OUR good because of His love for us.

Hear God's promise: *"And those whom He predestined, He also called; and those whom He called,*

He also justified; those whom He justified, He also glorified." Isn't the word "glorified" past tense? Shouldn't Paul have said, "He will glorify?" The Greek is clear. Paul speaks of glorification as an accomplished fact: Glorified! God won't let anything in this life get between us and His eternal Promise. We're predestined, conformed into the image of Christ by God's grace in Holy Baptism. When simple water and His Word was poured over us, we became an inheritor of God's Kingdom, one with eternal intimacy with God. "For those He foreknew, He also


predestined to be conformed into the likeness of His Son."

Paul gives us an absolute certainty, *"For I am persuaded, that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor powers, nor things present, nor things to come, nor height, nor depth, nor any other thing in all of creation, shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which is ours in Christ Jesus our Lord."* It's our covenant relationship given by God. He's our forever Father! We're His forever family!

We don't have to wait for another day. We don't have to wait for another year. God's

promise isn't about the ticking of a clock, a month on the calendar, a year in our journals, a decade, or for a lifetime. Paul isn't promising better life circumstances. He promises a better life - an eternal life filled with joy - a life glorified in Christ - a life being conformed into the image of His Son - and a life that never ends. May God bless you in your New Year and forever.

EXPERIENCING SCHOOL THROUGH THE EYES OF A HAITIAN CHILD



Schools in Haiti share some commonalities with American schools, but there are many differences that impact the future prosperity of this nation. In Haiti, the government funds education for only 20% of the children in the entire nation. Because of this, 98% of the schools in Haiti are private schools, often supported by organizations in Canada and the United States. Only 60% of Haitian children ever get to enter a school building. Of those that attend, most never get past 6th grade. Because Haiti is a nation of extreme poverty, about 4.4 million people suffer from acute hunger, eating only a few meals a week. In many of the schools, an education is provided, but a school lunch is not.

Children in Haiti walk sometimes 2-3 miles to get to their school building. Because parents must pay a tuition, they often cannot send all their children at once, so siblings from one home may alternate years, attending school every other year or every third year.

Trinity HOPE partners with 241 private, Christian schools throughout 13 districts in Haiti. Through our partnership, we show the Grace of God by providing a noon meal for the children and staff in these schools.

In a Haitian school with a Trinity HOPE feeding program, the cooks make large batches of rice, beans, and sauce over an open fire, often outside. This special recipe was created in partnership with nutritionists at Vanderbilt University, and provides a balanced meal of protein, fat, and carbs. This noon meal helps children concentrate and attend to their learning. It is also the conduit through which we share the grace and mercy of God.

Before the meal, children wash their hands with some sort of running water, often out of a large cooler. Dishes and eating utensils are scarce. Often, when mission teams travel to Haiti, we take spoons so that schools might have enough spoons for all children to eat at the same time. The children thank God for the provision of

food and enjoy a meal that fills their tummies and souls.

The pictures in this article are from two Lutheran schools, Concordia and Evangelique le Lutherinne, both in Leogane, Haiti. Between them, we partner to feed about 80 souls. These pictures represent many of the unique attributes of Haitian schools. Throughout the next few months, we will be highlighting schools from all 13 districts on our Social media pages. LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF CARE-VAN DRIVE 2021

At this year's Lutheran World Relief CARE-VAN ingathering the Mid-South District once again had seven drop sites where we collected handmade quilts, school kits, personal care kits, baby care kits, and fabric kits. Our drop sites included Grace, Knoxville, TN.; Cross of Christ, Chattanooga, TN.; Our Savior, Nashville, TN.; Immanuel, Memphis, TN.; First, Fort Smith, AR.; Grace, Little Rock, AR.; and Salem, Springdale, AR.

At the time of this report (12/15/2021), the top three quilt-producing congregations that dropped off their work at an LWR CARE-VAN ingathering site were Zion Lutheran Church, Alexander, AR (173 quilts), First Lutheran Church, Cleveland, TN (133 quilts) and St. Paul Lutheran Church, Gillett, AR (110 quilts). A total of 1,437 quilts were donated.

To date we had 43 congregations participate (4 ELCA), collecting over \$5,736 for shipping costs. We also collected 1,661 personal care kits (one congregation donated 325 personal care kits!), 110 fabric kits, 862 school kits, 128 baby care kits, and 75 face

masks were also donated. The CARE-VAN trailers were loaded up with 546 boxes (weighing approximately 10,791 pounds!) of offerings from District congregations for Lutheran World Relief. Way to go Mid-South District!

Many of the congregations' efforts are coordinated by LWML groups and longstanding quilting groups in the congregations. They participate in this effort to share the love of Christ in a personal way. The tireless efforts of those who share their talents and the generous contributions of many make this a successful ingathering.

Thank you to all who participated in this year's annual LWR CARE-VAN drive! You touched someone in need!
