A Message from Rev. Dr. Roger Paavola, President

### "The Three Nails"

one week before Holy week, I conducted three and visited funerals several others in the hospital who are seriously ill. It seemed that death was a welcomed visitor to those who had struggled so severely... welcomed, because as one of my dear friend Peter put it, "I'm tired of being sick but excited about being home with Jesus. Those were his last words despite his desire to stay with his loved ones. Wanting to leave behind the pain and be at home with Jesus was a blessed assurance that we, as Christians can embrace by faith. But leaving behind those whom they loved.

The death of Jesus on Good Friday was even more difficult for those who loved Him. His death came immediately on the heels of a glorious, triumphant entrance into Jerusalem a few days earlier. His violent, tragic death wasn't a welcomed visitor. It wasn't to relieve the pain of a long suffering illness. His death wasn't aided with oxygen or medication. He was given nothing to ease the pain and help the breathing. But the death of Christ Jesus was an agonizing, suffocating, naked tragedy on a crude rugged cross.

St. John declares: "So they took Jesus, and He went out, bearing His own cross, to the place call the place of the skull, which is called in Hebrew - Golgatha. There they crucified Him, and with Him, two others, one on either side, and Jesus between them." There's no mention of Simon of Cyrene, the

spectator who was pressed into service to help Jesus carry His cross: no mention of the conversations Jesus had with the criminals; no mention of Jesus' cry of despair as He was forsaken by God; and there's no mention of the dramatic earthquake and the ripping open of the Temple curtain like mentioned in the other Gospels. All we hear from John's Gospel is the stark reality of a young Man, walking toward a hill outside of Jerusalem to be tragically nailed to a cross and left to die naked and alone. We ponder those nails as silent witnesses of what Jesus did for us.

"There they crucified Him," means they stretched Him out on rough wooden beams, impaled His hands and feet with spikes



and raised Him above the ground to hang until He died of suffocation or shock. Johann Sebastian Bach wrote in one of his symphonies, "In the death of my heart; Your name and cross, Shine at all times and in every hour. Because of these I can be happy. Let this picture appear to me; As comfort in my time of stress, as You, Lord Christ, so freely; have sacrificed Your life for me!"

Maybe that's why we call this Good Friday. But take a long, hard look at His death and realize. we didn't help... we didn't offer comfort or seek relief. You see, He died for us. I too, nailed Him to the cross. Maybe that's why John's Gospel is unique, saying, "standing by the cross of Jesus were His mother, His mother's sister, Mary, the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene"... women who were closely related to Him. They stood - intimately related to Jesus - heart broken and grieving in the scene of despair and ugly suffering. Jesus, on fire with pain and suffering, looked over to these

women and said to His mother, "Woman, behold your son!" Then to the disciple whom He loved, He said, "Behold your mother." And from that hour, the disciple took her to his home."

In spite of the circumstances, (or perhaps because of the circumstances) Jesus sealed our Christian relationships – loving relationships. Ending relationships causes grief. Absence of relationships causes loneliness. Estrangement of relationships causes frustration and emotional injury. But enjoying close relationships is what gives contentment, peace and meaning in life.

Christ's words from the cross shows that loving, responsible, and caring relationships are most important to Jesus. It's why He offered His invitation to us, "Follow Me!" It was in our relationship with Him that His followers find our greatest joy and purpose. It's for the continuation of our relationship with Him in love and forgiveness that Jesus died. He didn't die so we could join

something, or to give some kind of intellectual assent for who He is. He died for us to live together loving and forgiving - in a personal relationship with Him and all His followers. He died so we will have a close and personal relationship with Him forever. It's the reason He became God Incarnate. Our everlasting peace with God is the reason He died on the cross.

His second word from the cross unique to John is a word of humiliation: "Jesus said, 'I thirst.' A bowl of wine vinegar stood there, so they put a sponge filled with vinegar on hyssop and held it to His mouth." What a horrible statement! Listen! He hung on a cross, the image of God's perfect love for us. It's a picture of unmerited and unconditional LOVE. But think about how the world takes offense to His perfect love. Think of how the world imposes deep suffering to Him who offered us His perfect love.

Being Christ's followers means that, when we see His perfect image of love, we're drawn to resemble that image of Him in our own lives to the rest of the world. Suffering happens - not because we seek it, but because perfect love is offensive to the decaying world. Turn to the cross and see the cost of perfect love. I also nailed Him to the cross.

The final words in John's Gospel is a declaration of a completed mission: "When Jesus received the wine vinegar, He said, "It is finished!", and He bowed His head and gave up His spirit." Tetellestai! "It is finished!" It's a Greek emphatic meaning a goal is accomplished or ended successfully – nothing

more is to be done! It's whyJesus was born in Bethlehem, why He was raised in Nazareth, and was baptized by John. It's the reason He called disciples, healed the sick, and raised the dead. It's all a confirmation of questions He asked, "Who do people say that I am?" It's the reason for the time at the Mount of Transfiguration and why He said He must go to Jerusalem that "All the things said about the Son of man may be fulfilled." It's the reason why He celebrated the Last Supper, prayed in the garden, why He met the soldiers who came to

arrest Him, and why He was silent before the chief priest and Pontius Pilate.

Tetellestai... it is finished. Jesus' obedience to the will of our heavenly Father was His atoning sacrifice for a fallen mankind. Death was swallowed up in His death, so that we may have life! The rupture of mankind against God was repaired when God's own Son was ripped open for our sake. Our sins were left on the cross when God's wrath made Jesus the forsaken sacrifice of God. Three nails, one Man's suffering, the Son of

God's death. It is finished. It was my sin, my nail, my scourging and mockery that He suffered as well. I too, nailed Him to the cross. Do we have other nails we would pound into the cross too? Thanks be to God, *Tetellestai*, it is finished.



### SHARING THE LOVE OF CHRIST

### One bowl of Rice and Beans at a Time



Through the Trinity HOPE Haitian Feeding Program, 35 Feeding Program Directors visit over 260 schools in Haiti twice each month. They not only monitor the feeding program guidelines, but they share the Good News of the Gospel of Jesus Christ with each visit. One of our newest feeding program directors, Jean Dony Zidor, "Dony," works with 6 schools in Belle Anse. Belle Anse is a district located between the shore and mountains south of Port-au-Prince. The schools in this district straddle two worlds. Some are in populous, urban areas, and others are in the rural hills of Haiti.

Mare-Briole is a school of meager means with a tin roof, dirt floors, and walls made of wood and palm fronds. The mature trees that surround the school on this hillside provide some shade for the children while they're playing outside. Dony sees his "work" for Trinity HOPE less as work and more as a ministry. He described riding his motorcycle along a precarious road and across a river. After a storm the river is too swollen for him to

cross it. Nonetheless, he believes the children need to be fed and hear the Gospel.

Each time he visits the school, he offers a spiritual message. One particular day in January, he travelled to Mare-Briole for his bi-monthly visit. Prior to his visit, he prepared the message he wanted to share with the students and teachers. It was based on Psalm 91:14-15 "Because He loves me," says the Lord, "I will rescue him; I will protect him, for he acknowledges my name. He will call on me, and I will answer him; I will be with him in trouble, I will deliver him and honor him." As he traversed the river and the pathway to the school, he rehearsed the message he had prepared. Keeping in mind the Biblical passage and the points he wanted to emphasize.

However, as he began to discuss the issues the students experience daily and share the message with them, the Holy Spirit spoke to him and lead him to guide the students into learning about having a relationship with Jesus Christ. The following verses immediately came to him, John 1:12-13, "But to all who did

receive him, who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God, who were born, not of blood nor the ill of the flesh nor the will of man, but of God."

At the close of the message Dony said he could see on their faces that they wanted to know more about Jesus, they were genuinely hearing and understanding His love for them. Afterwards, he talked to a professor who is also a pastor in the community. He wanted them to have the support of a local pastor as they learn more and grow in their faith. Sixteen students began being discipled on this day in January. Dony realized that listening to the direction of the Holy Spirit causes miracles.

This is what it is like to serve the children impacted by the Trinity HOPE feeding programs. Through a bowl of rice and beans, the children are learning about the love of Christ every day.


