A Message from Rev. Dr. Roger Paavola, President

hange happens to everyone. We can have things going our way but become perplexed when something unexpectedly hits us. How many prize fighters were certain of winning a fight, only to miss seeing a left hook speeding toward their jaw? For a year, COVID-19 has been throwing some left hooks, knocking some down, and knocking out some others. But the changes that came from the virus put us in a better position of understanding Easter. Last Easter was almost universally cancelled... for in-person worship that is. We recovered somewhat and were reminded

that nothing can actually cancel Easter. It's still our blessed hope and promise from God.

Just a week before Easter, the disciples were among the most popular people in Jerusalem. They were men the people wanted to see, because they knew Jesus. Everything that was supposed to go right was going right – just the right place and the right time. It felt good. But, they forgot what Jesus said about a change coming. "We are going up to Jerusalem, and everything that is written by the prophets about the Son of Man will be fulfilled. He will be handed over to the Gentiles. They will mock Him, insult Him,

spit on Him, flog Him and kill Him. But, on the third day He will rise again." (Luke 18:31-33 (NIV)

The disciples didn't understand Him because He told some bad news. Sometimes when we hear bad news, like them, we miss the good news. If we don't understand the bad news that Jesus gave us when He said, "In this world you will have tribulations", we won't understand His good news, "Be of good cheer for I have overcome the world." The disciples' lives were turned upside down between Palm Sunday and Good Friday. Their hopes for themselves simply

vanished. They watched as nails were driven in Jesus' hands. They saw their dreams hammered away. A few of them saw Jesus beaten. A few saw Him cry out, "It is finished!," and then die. They saw the tomb where His body was placed and the stone rolled against the entrance. For the first time in the past three years, their purpose and hopes were taken away. Everything they had was gone. They locked themselves inside a house, afraid to go outside. Death threatened them since the people who crucified Jesus wanted to get rid of them as well. Christ's crucifixion had taken away from them someone they loved dearly as a leader, as a friend, and almost as a family member.

This year's Easter will be unlike any other we have experienced before. Many of you can't remember an Easter Sunday that you weren't in church – at least before last year. We were like the disciples: Last year we isolated ourselves behind locked doors. Many friends found themselves without jobs. We know someone whose life was taken from us. But, not unlike the disciples, in the midst of the fear going through their hearts, Jesus brings Good News.

How Jesus passed through a solid, locked door, we may never know. But when Jesus is trying to get inside, nothing can keep Him out. Jesus showed up to give the disciples a message, "Peace be with you." They probably thought He was a ghost. But, Jesus went a step further. He showed them His hands and side so they could see His wounds. He reminded them of what He said (John 11:25-26), "I am the resurrection and the life. He who believes in Me will live, even though he dies; and whoever lives and believes in Me will never die."

Jesus is living proof, that the dead will rise to life. No one had any idea that Jesus would rise from the dead. The women who went to the tomb on Easter morning expected to find a dead body. But, instead, they were stunned to see an empty tomb. An angel asked them, "Why are you looking for



the living among the dead. Jesus is not here, He has risen indeed." Later, when Mary Magdalene grabbed Jesus to worship Him, she didn't grab a ghost. It was the living Jesus.

The other women ran to tell the disciples the good news. But, the disciples said the women were confused or just imagining things - they had lost their minds. Peter had to see for himself, so he ran to the tomb with John. John looked in and saw that the tomb was empty. They didn't expect to find a living Jesus. But, they also left the tomb confused and wondering. While they were sitting in a locked room, trying to figure out what was going on, Jesus walked in and talked to them. He didn't bother to knock on the door or to pick the lock. He just appeared inside the room. He showed them His hands, and showed them where the spear had pierced His side. He was no longer dead, He is risen! The disciples eventually went from a huddle of scared men and women to men and women who would rather die, than deny Jesus Christ's Resurrection.

Jesus appeared to His followers, but hundreds of others - Roman soldiers and 500 witnesses who saw Jesus alive. His disciples would be arrested, thrown into prison, and beaten. They were told they would be punished if they kept talking about the Resurrected Christ. But they couldn't stop talking about what they had heard and seen.

The centrality of Christianity depends solely on the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. He told His enemies, "Destroy this Temple, and in three days I will raise it up again." Jesus rose from the dead as the Son of God and Son of Man. The only reason anyone could successfully reject the Resurrection would be to provide overwhelming evidence that Jesus Christ did not rise from the dead. God promised it was going to happen. Jesus rose from the dead, and hundreds and thousands of people were (and still are) willing to stake their own life on it.

God so loved the world, that He gave us His Son, that whoever believes in Him will not perish, but have eternal life. It's that simple Gospel message that is made possible when God became our Savior – offered His life as a ransom for our sins – and rose from the dead to prove God's satisfaction with Christ's sacrifice and guarantee our justification. We are, therefore, saved by God's grace, through faith – all gifts from our gracious and merciful God. The Resurrected Jesus Christ makes all the difference. Count on it! Have a blessed Easter.


The theology classes were very deep and educational. They really made us think about our faith and beliefs. The professors were awesome. They were interesting and funny and we enjoyed getting to know them.
