ast month we enjoyed Easter! It's the best time of the year for our congregations. Easter is the most attended worship service across Christendom. Christmas Eve is the second most attended, followed by Mother's Day. The lowest attended worship service is the Sunday after Easter - followed by Father's Day! But unlike the year the Pandemic shut down our Easter celebrations, nothing stopped us this year - no snowstorms (unless you live in the Dakotas), no cold weather, no daylight savings time sleepiness, and the trees were already leafing out, so the allergies didn't act up!

We celebrated that great day with great joy, food, families, and festivities. We may have had record numbers of visitors and people attending worship. They came in worship, hearing the

What's Our Excuse?

Good News of God's promise of life everlasting, and receiving the blessed Sacrament of Christ's body and blood for the forgiveness of our sins.

But, then there's that after-Easter slump. It happens every year and in almost every church. When we want to understand why, we hear excuses like, "I just have gotten out of the habit." Habit? "I have so many things to do." Things? "Sure, the kids want to go to Sunday School, but I just can't seem to get going to get them there." Can't? "I went on Easter, what does he expect?" He? Who is "He"?

Excuses.

A college physics professor once told our class, "If we laid all the crutches in the world end to end, they still couldn't support all the lame excuses

I've heard." Do we need a "No Excuse Sunday"? Think about it, we could furnish cots for those who say Sunday is their only day to sleep in. We could install wheels on armchairs for those who think the pews are too hard. Eye drops and hot black coffee could be served for those who have trouble staying awake because they stayed up watching TV or partied on Saturday night. We might issue hardhats for those who say the roof will cave in if they come to church. Blankets could be issued for those think the church is too cold and personal fans for those who think it's too hot.

We could arrange for neighbors or relatives to cook the meal that can't wait. We might even hand out buttons saying, "STAMP OUT STEWARDSHIP" for those who think churches ask for too much money. We might bring in a pallet of grass and a tree for those who want to worship God in nature. A doctor and several nurses could be available in case someone felt like they were coming down with something. We could put up Christmas poinsettias and Easter lilies for those who don't think the church looks any different since the last time they were there.

People have many and any reason for not being an active part of the Christian Church. Many of our congregations are an exception when it comes to volunteering, stewardship, and worship attendance. But Jesus is used to excuses. He's heard them all! "Let me go bury my father, then I will come follow you." "I will follow You, Lord, but first, let me say goodbye to my family." The responses Jesus gave to those kinds of excuses might, at first, seem cold and uncaring. But Jesus comes to us on HIS terms, not ours. He is right where He said He'd be... in Word and Sacraments.

Why is it so difficult? Why are some so willing to commit, but not on the terms of unconditional commitment? Family, friends, work, sports, service clubs, cleaning, cooking, vacation, rest, or just plain too busy seems to cover most of them. Too busy to be bothered by God, today? The issue that the whole Christian Church faces today is the same Jesus faced when He walked this earth. People were ready for commitment, but only on their own terms.

Discipleship is being a follower of Jesus. Discipleship comes with a price. Discipleship and drive himself because he couldn't read the road signs and he only drove 30 miles per hour when he did drive. What he did is tape one of those bright orange flags on his lawnmower and went 240 miles across the state of lowa so he could see his sick brother.

It's all about love - unconditional love like that which God gave us when He sent us His Son, Jesus Christ. In Christ, God gave us something we couldn't earn on our own – His grace - that priceless gem of grace we apprehend with the gift faith He offers, and we carry everywhere we go. God's gifts of grace and mercy don't depend on how good I am or how well intentioned I am. They come from God freely in His faithfulness to us and His Holy Christian Church. He is always willing to forgive - more so that we are willing to even ask for His forgiveness. He extends love, even when we don't deserve it nor sometimes even expect it.

Remember your last family reunion? It starts with, "Just bring what you want to eat yourselves, and we'll furnish the drinks for everybody." You really don't want to go. After all, there'd be that small talk about whose kids are growing up so fast. You'd hear about somebody's surgery or latest aches and pains. It's been so long since you've seen some of the relatives, maybe this would be the last time they'd invite you. You drag yourself around, not wanting to get excited about it. You want to dress so that you don't stand out in the crowd. There's nothing in the refrigerator you can find

The History Of Our Hand Built Cross

First Lutheran - Little Rock, Arkansas

Our wooden cross came to be during the 1989 Lutheran Layman's League's International Convention held at the Convention Center in downtown Little Rock. Joline Kaucher provided the details of the cross in an article at the convention. But as the famous radio commentator, Paul Harvey, would say: "And here is the rest of the story".

The theme of this Convention "Build The Rock". was On Joline, being the convention's "Decorations Coordinator", came up with the theme display idea of having a large wood cross sitting on top of a rock pile, with a decorative arch overhead. Now we know that the featured cross was built by brothers David & Ted Kaucher and that today it still stands in our worship services as our Lent & Holy Week "Rugged Cross", and our Divine Easter Sunday Flowered Resurrection Cross.

For the development of the cross' base 'rock pile' Joline came up with a very unique idea. For the convention's promotional announcement information Joline asked that all attendees bring a rock to the convention with their name and contact

information on the bottom of the rock. And at the end of the convention everyone would come by and pick up a different rock from the pile to take home. This action would provide the means for everyone to have a contact buddy to extend 'postconvention conversations and prayers' with.

Joline stressed that every rock in the pile was different and unique from the others; some were bigger - some were smaller, some were beautiful and some were, well, not so beautiful. She wanted her pile to reflect exactly how we, too, are unique as well as different from each other when it comes to possessing our Blessed Gifts of Talents from the Holy Spirit.

In looking back, Joline believes there must have been about 700 -800 rocks in that convention pile!

And now, "The Rest Of The Story!"

The convention has closed and Joline & David are on a hotel elevator going down from their room. They still had their convention name tags on. The elevator stops and another couple steps in, also with their name tags on. As the elevator starts down with the two couples aboard the

lady looks at Joline's tag and with a surprising tone say's: "Joline, I believe I have your rock! Joline, now starring at this lady's name tag, shouts back: "I also have yours, no way!" The couple was from Indiana and they stayed in contact for many years following.

Joline describes this happening as "God's Divine Coincidence"! Out of 700+ available rocks! And upon exiting the convention to come together on an elevator! Why it just has to be so!

LUTHERAN EARLY RESPONSE TEAMS GROW TO SERVE DISASTER-AFFECTED COMMUNITIES



When a deadly chain of intense storms rapidly intensified and dropped dozens of tornadoes during the afternoon and evening of March 31, 2023, the Mid-South District included communities that were hit especially hard: Little Rock and Wynne, Ark, as well as the town of Covington and rural McNairy County in west Tennessee. Several LCMS church members in those communities were among the many whose homes were completely lost or severely damaged, and many lives were lost, as well.

Fortunately Grace, Knoxville, had recently hosted Lutheran Early Response Team (LERT) trainings on March 4 and March 25, and the classes had attracted students who showed lots of enthusiasm for volunteerism!

The 38 newly trained LERT volunteers joined Mid-South's existing teams in Paducah and Hopkinsville, Ky., and Batesville, Ark., giving the District a total of 82 LERT trained volunteers, some of whom (Hopkinsville) are also chainsaw trained, and will provide a home for the District's new skid steer and our disaster trailer.

When the March 31st disaster

struck, LERT teams also came from Oklahoma and Tyler, Texas, to support the Batesville teams' response in Little Rock.

Jan Simko, Mid-South District Disaster Response Coordinator, reported that about 3,000 homes were damaged or destroyed and many families displaced, mostly in North Little Rock, Amboy, Sherwood and Jacksonville. Ark.

LERT assistance was gratefully received. A Jacksonville native left this heartfelt note: "I wanted to thank you and your

congregation for your acts of kindness and compassion for my family My words can't accurately describe my gratitude, but I cannot thank you enough. GOD bless all of you!"

"We knocked on many doors with no response," she recalls. "I left business cards at homes with minor damage thinking that homeowners may return.

"There was already some rebuilding going on, mostly roofs, within the first two weeks, but this will be a long-term rebuild—probably 1-3 years," she estimates.

The need for such teams will almost certainly continue, and volunteers are rising to the challenge.

Newly formed LERT terms at Trinity, North Little Rock, and Hope, Jacksonville, received training on April 10 and 11, and the Knoxville team underwent basic and advanced chainsaw trainings in late April.
