A Message from Rev. Dr. Roger Paavola, President

"Getting Real in the Church"

of the strangest ne phenomena I encounter in counseling families is the sense of belonging. From the very beginning of our lives, we seek and work on belonging to someone or something worthwhile. Marriage, family, neighborhoods, social organizations, and churches are organizations that fulfill that longing within our human spirit to belong. In one sense, the search for belonging goes back to our first parents - Adam and Eve who had once belonged to the family of God - created in His image - but lost their belonging and their belongings when they fell into willful sin. St. John of Chrysostom wrote in the third century, "My soul will not be at rest, until it finds its rest in You, O God."

Il Corinthians 4:7-11

And that, my friends, is the difference between the Church and all the social organizations people turn to in order to find their "belonging." Belonging to the Church is a fulfillment of the seminal need within our souls that can find no rest, until it finds its rest in Almighty God.

So, what is a Church... a long list of names from our church roster, an organization out to get your name and dollars into a fancy building, or a club for financially well-to-do elitists? Well, the Bible describes Church membership quite differently - at least in the true Christian Church. We pray for our brothers and sisters in Christ and receive new members as the Lord gives the increase. We need to understand what their new membership with us means to them and what impact it has on our lives, as well as theirs. We can never be the same as we were before they arrived. We'll never be the same as we were before. This world is dynamic ever changing - and when we place our lives in the hands of Almighty God, things are going to happen in a big way.

St. Paul says Church members are ordinary people... you and me. He writes, *"We have this Gospel treasure in earthen vessels,"* clay pots... ordinary ground down dirt. We're ordinary people who sin, who get hurt, and who struggle with the Old Adam within us. But we're all clay pots - some made so finely - like fine China that might crack easily if handled in a not-so-gentle manner. Other ones are sun-dried mud, hardened with dirt and grime, but who crumble easily even if bumped. But we're all clay pots and that's why we all have the same limitations, the same problems... the same cracks and fractures.

St. Paul is being realistic. It's humbling to realize that our beginning and belonging starts with the same basic ingredients. Our purpose, designed by God, according to St. Paul isn't to make ourselves great, but to be of service to others and to God. Our first purpose, as clay pots, is to be filled by God with all His blessings, so He can spill us over and serve Him, serve others, and build up His kingdom.

So, Paul goes on to say, "We have this all sufficient power in us, so that people will see that the power for our life comes from God." If a pot is made out of dirt, then, it stands to reason that the value of what it represents lies within it as it serves and who formed it. Some people describe their lives, "Empty without Jesus," because that's what they are. They suffer from this lack of belonging; an emptiness because there's no real peace without Jesus Christ. When our goals disappear, meaning disappears. When meaning is gone, purpose is gone. And when purpose is gone, life is dead. Emptiness and despair run over the top of those who struggle trying to find identity and belonging.

But, even within a church, there are people who can't find purpose or relevancy. They come because they're drawn by some kind of culture, friendship, or family. Serving in a church accomplishes some new activities for them. So they begin to move into places of control and participation within a church. But emptiness can remain because the sufficiency and purpose of their lives is hollow - nothing inside – because they haven't had Jesus Christ fill their empty clay pot.

Like clay pots, we're created to hold something. Genesis says that "something" is the breath of life and the image of God... His light and life within us. Without God our lives are hollow and meaningless, unfilled. God created us from the dirt of the earth. He breathed life into our souls. So, when we're formed into Christ - as earthen vessels, the Living, breathing Christ brings us back to life again. He IS the life within us, as Christians.

But don't be confused. There are some who have the idea that Jesus jumps inside after there's been some class, or they go through some ritual. Then there are those who've been around for such a long time that everyone considers them to be THE members because... they just belong. But being a member of the true Christian Church means opening ourselves up - letting Christ fill us with His life, so He can fill us with life and purpose.

But St. Paul also says that there are some cracked pots. In fact, he writes, *"We are afflicted in every way, but not crushed, sometimes in doubt, but never* in despair, persecuted, but not forsaken, badly hurt at times, but not destroyed. At all times, these mortal bodies of ours face the struggles of life and death, just as Jesus did - so that everyone can see the life of Jesus revealed in our bodies."

It's hard to admit we're cracked, fractured by original and actual sin. But we know it. We may try to gloss over it, glue our broken parts back together, cover them up, or hide them. We may try to live by our own self sufficiency and search for our inner self. When that happens we truly find nothing but emptiness and the reasons why so many cracks and crumble happend under the burden of carrying their own weights of life.

Paul says afflictions, doubts, persecutions, and being hurt are merely the examples of the burdens that come from outside of ourselves that will shatter our family, our relationships, and even our own person. But Paul says, for the Christian, those kinds of things don't have victory over us. Jesus takes the chains of afflictions, removes the shadows of doubt, lifts us up in the persecution and shows us - in the most dramatic way - that being hurt as a Christian shows the life and death of Jesus Christ is alive within us. "My grace is sufficient for you," God told Paul when he was persecuted and hurting.

Christ's victory is our victory. So, our ego, our pride, our filling ourselves up with hot air have to be crucified in Christ - put to

death, so that the life of Jesus can fill us up, heal our cracks, and let His glorious Light shine in a new life for us. Here Paul concludes, saying, "For while we live we are always being given up to death for Jesus' sake, so that the life of Jesus may be revealed in our mortal flesh." Through Baptism we die with Christ. We become living members of His body when He fills us with the Holy Spirit who calls and enlivens us for new life. He transforms our ordinary lives into vibrant, extra-ordinary lives of service to Him and to those He has entrusted to our keeping. Sure enough, we admit our weaknesses, but, in Church membership, we also declare the wonders of the mystery of the life we share in common union with our Savior and Lord, Jesus Christ.

I pray our Church membership isn't something taken lightly – just like it would be in some social organization. I pray your church membership and attendance is our honest, sincere desire to be filled anew by God's marvelous grace and mercy. And I pray that if anyone have some cracks, some imperfections that have been glazed over, that God's Spirit speaks to let you know of the love, forgiveness, mercy and grace that is ours through Jesus Christ... who fills us with His grace, mercy, salvation, and power for the sake and in the name of our blessed Savior Jesus Christ.

Rev. Charles Vincent Shemwell, pastor of Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Johnson City, TN, has successfully defended his Master of Sacred Theology (STM) thesis at Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne (CTSFW). Congratulations!

His thesis was entitled, "The Hero of Enlightenment Stood on his Head: A Study of the Eighteenth-century Struggle against Traditional Lutheran Catechesis and Johann Georg Hamann's Defense in Three Socratic Texts." The thesis was supervised by colleague Dr. Roland Ziegler (thesis advisor) and reviewed by the readers of the thesis committee, Prof. John Pless and Dr. Gifford Grobien. Getting into rather tough and challenging German primary sources of Hamann, even for the German natives, Vincent has masterfully presented Hamann's apologia of the traditional catechesis when the passivity of catechumen, particularly represented by the question-and-answer format of Luther's catechism, was being replaced by instructions that highlighted the use of reason. This thesis engages in the philosophical background of the past centuries that had helped move the church's catechetical tradition away from the rythum of God's speaking/our hearing, and His gifts giving/ our being given to of His gifts. It was refreshing to know more about Johann Georg Hamann. Another superb study and STM thesis. STM program is very proud of Vincent's scholarly achievement for the sake of the church. Once again, congratulations!

TRINITY HOPE REACHING HAITIAN CHILDREN IN DIRE TIMES



At this point, trying to explain the current conditions in Haiti is very much a moving target. However, knowing our donors are fully invested with their prayers, financial support, and genuine concern for our brothers and sisters in Haiti, we want to be forthcoming with the latest information we have. Right now, the headlines are changing by the hour and conditions continue to deteriorate rapidly.

At this point, it is impossible to know exactly where the political upheaval will land. However, there are several points we DO know with absolute certainty.

First, God is a merciful God and He is still in control. We so often do not understand the twists and turns God allows in our lives, but we know God never abandons

His people ("*The Lord himself goes before you and will be with you; he will never leave you nor forsake you.*" Deuteronomy 31:8). We must continue to trust His plan and His timing.

Second, throughout all this chaos, we are still feeding thousands of children every school day. Although the gangs' antics are impacting the entire country, the most dangerous areas are somewhat concentrated to those areas around Port au Prince (see map). Outside of those areas, most schools are continuing to operate at a basic level and, at this time, we are able to continue the feeding programs in 247 schools (out of 271 we expected to feed this year). Thanks be to God for His protection over the children and our staff.

Third, in all the darkness Haiti is now facing, God is allowing Trinity HOPE to be a reminder to the people that *true hope* is found only in Jesus Christ. While these children receive this critically needed meal of rice and beans, they are also being fed the true Gospel of Jesus Christ. They need this spiritual food, as well as the physical food, more than ever right now. (*"Jesus spoke to them, saying, 'I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness, but will have the light of life.'"* John 8:12).

Most everything in Haiti is incredibly volatile right now. We stay in very close contact with our staff in Haiti, reminding them that their safety is paramount. To date, God has consistently provided His protection over them, and has always enabled us to find a way to buy the food we need. It hasn't always been every ingredient we would normally buy, and it certainly hasn't been at the prices we desired, but He has always provided. We give Him thanks for this! God created and called Trinity HOPE to feed His children every school day, and our commitment is to continue this important work as long as He enables us to do so, giving Him ALL the glory for this wonderful blessing.

PLEASE continue your steadfast prayers for all those in Haiti. We know the fight is already won, and the future of all Believers are secure through Jesus Christ. Pray that God will use Trinity HOPE, along with the entire body of Christ throughout Haiti, to share this message with great urgency to all those we are blessed to serve.
