A Message from Rev. Dr. Roger Paavola, President

St Peter's first Epistle was sent to a group of Christian converts who were in need of assurance of their election into the family of God. His letter became a solid statement of our Christian faith that can withstand the assaults of Satan, his evil minions, and a corrupt world. In the second chapter of Peter's first Epistle, he writes these encouraging words, *"Like newborn infants, long for the pure spiritual milk, that by it you may grow up to salvation- if indeed you have tasted that the Lord is good. As you come to him, a living stone rejected by men but in the sight of God chosen and precious, you yourselves like living stones are being built up as a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ... But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for his own possession, that you may proclaim the excellencies of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light. Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy."* (1 Peter 2:2ff, ESV)

In the wild discussions that seem to be swirling around us at times, the government, cities, and vigilante groups want to take over to dictate the morals and teachings within our society for the

Church. Unfortunately, the Church in general is getting a bad reputation in some parts of our country because, for one, there are protests about government sanctions, intervention, and actions. But there are also countless numbers who want to speak their understanding for God on moral and social issues. Never mind their speaking doesn't always jibe with what Holy Scripture says.

Meanwhile, the elect of His kingdom recognizes the need for adherence to the meaning of the Fourth Commandment (obedience to those in authority). But then they are left scratching their heads when that Fourth Commandment obedience comes in direct conflict with the First Commandment and a bunch of those on the Second Tablet of the Decalogue. What seems to be even more confusing, there are those within mainline Christian denominations that teach a doctrine that leans in the direction that the government should be totally Christian and led only by Christian leaders. It might be a nice idea, but totally misses the point that we Christians are citizens of God's eternal kingdom and coincidentally, citizens of an earthly government – the separation of Church and State, or as Luther

stated, the Kingdom of the Left and the Kingdom of the Right.

Not too many months ago, I can remember a time, that while discussing predestination and election with another Lutheran, whose ancestors were Baptists, he mentioned that when he asked his grandfather how he knew he was among the elect (chosen by God), his grandfather replied, "We run this here county, don't we?" His grandfather was certain he was among the elect because of power, political influence, and affluence that the Church should have. However, by that kind of standard, our Lord Jesus Christ Himself would not have been among the elect. Jesus didn't run much of anything by worldly standards, nor did He have much to show for influence or wealth on the scale of an earthly kingdom. "My Kingdom is not of this world," Jesus replied to Pontus Pilate.

Martin Luther once wrote, "Christ makes His dwelling among those who are poor in spirit and brings to them His glorious kingdom whether they live in hovels as He did, or in the halls of power as some early converts to the church did (Phil 4:22). He never appears to "run this here world" (Jn 18:36), instead He depends completely on the word of promise from His Father (Mt 11:27). That's all that remains to us if we are truly His disciples. No one can understand this except through the miracle of faith given by the Holy Spirit."


You see, there isn't an agreement even within Christianity on the obvious difference between earthly rule and rulers and the Kingdom of God where Jesus is King. Jesus permitted Himself to be subject to the rulers and the authorities of Caesar's realm (Mt 22:21). Worldly fortune was never Christ's goal. While living in an earthly poverty saying, "The Son of Man has no place to lay his head." (Mt 8:20). Jesus had no external guarantees of the total authority that was rightly His. He too lived

by faith in the Word and promises of our heavenly Father. If we judge Jesus by the external criteria of worldly influence, wealth, or power, He would be a miserable and failed God, a poor example of worldly power. In fact, in this thinking wouldn't a "poor Christian" be an oxymoron – something that doesn't make sense because they don't work together and earthly wealth is the scale by which most citizens of the left determine success or failure?

Jesus Christ made His dwelling among those who are poor in spirit and brings to them His glorious kingdom whether they live in ghettos as He did, or in the halls of power and wealth as some of the early converts to the Church did (Phil 4:22). Jesus never came or will come to "run this here world" (Jn 18:36), instead Christ Jesus depends completely on the Word of promise from His Father (Mt 11:27). That's all that remains to us if we are truly His disciples. No one can understand these concepts except through the miracle of faith given by the Holy Spirit, that we are inheritors of a Kingdom that stretches beyond our wildest imagination.

Until that day when Christ returns in glory, we pray our Lord will help us to live in this world as we fully acknowledge our necessary obedience to our worldly authorities and be in this world, but not of this world and its dealings. The present form of this world is passing away. But by the promises of Christ, we live as He did, confident of the promises of our Heavenly Father. Have a safe and joyous summer!

Supporting Future Church Workers

To support the education efforts of individuals pursuing a full-time career in church work, the Mid-South District offers opportunities for student financial aid. To be considered for financial assistance, a student must be a member in good standing in a Mid-South District congregation and be enrolled in a seminary or university to prepare for full-time service to the Church as a rostered worker. Rostered workers are pastors, teachers, deaconesses and Directors of Christian Education. This district program, which is bolstered by a grant from the Lutheran Women's Missionary League (LWML), has helped many Mid-South students prepare for full-time careers in church work as they've attended a Concordia seminary or university.

To be considered for the student financial assistance program, you must first inform the Mid-South District Office that you are or will be a student enrolled at a synodical school.

The Mid-South District turns 60 this year! To highlight this great ministry milestone, the monthly Encourager is sharing a look at the faces, places and moments that have shaped our district over the last six decades.

A Big Move for the Mid-South District

For over two decades, a trip to the Mid-South District Office meant a visit to a charming old home with beautiful grounds. The “Massey Mansion,” as it was often called, provided office space, meeting rooms and even sleeping quarters for pastors traveling through town. The property also included a swimming pool that local Lutheran families would frequent during summer months. This charming property served as the Mid-South District’s “home” from 1976-1997.



From 1976 to 1997, the Mid-South District Office was located in a re-purposed mansion property on Massey Road in Memphis, TN. The property included sleeping quarters, a swimming pool, tennis courts and a charming hearth room—all of which were used by traveling pastors and other visitors. Over time, upkeep of what was essentially an aging home became too costly and plans were made to move the District Office to a more business-friendly property. Still, the Massey Road mansion remains an iconic and cherished part of the Mid-South District’s history.

With repair costs at the Massey location mounting, a 1997 study by the Board of Directors suggested that it was time to move District operations to a more traditional office space. Later that year, the District Office was relocated to a leased office space that would serve as a temporary home for several years while plans were made for a permanent location. The move to the permanent home would take place in June of 2001 when the Mid-South District opened the doors of the Alma S. Coleman Lutheran Center: a 7,000 square-foot building custom designed for the District’s unique needs. The new building was made possible in large part to Mr. Mickey Coleman who shared a generous gift to the District in memory of his mother, a long-time member of nearby Immanuel Lutheran Church in Memphis. **The Mid-South District is now in its 25th year at this location!**

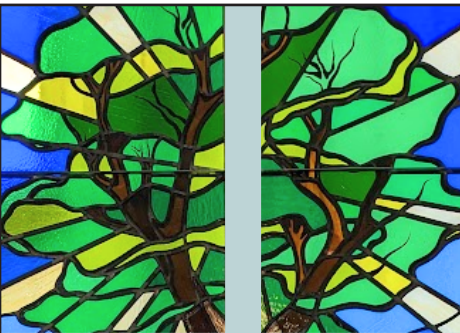
