Overcome by a Tree

The Lutheran the old Hymnal, there is а communion prayer that says, "We give thanks to You, Holy Lord, Almighty Father, everlasting God; On the tree of the cross, You have given salvation to mankind, that, whence death arose, thence life also might rise again and that, he who by a tree once overcame, likewise by a tree might be over come through Jesus Christ our Lord." It's a one sentence prayer that packs a huge amount of theology into a few words. It calls us look away from the tree of knowing good and evil (Genesis 3:1-5), an instrument of sin and death; and turn our eyes, instead to a second tree – the tree of the cross. In that second tree we

see the means by which God reversed the effect of sin and death and bore the fruit of our salvation.

The ironic aspect of the Leader of our Christian hope and life came at His Passion. The death that comes by the one tree is overcome by the life that comes from the second tree. The death that came in the second tree gives life to those afflicted by the effects of the first tree. Confused? No. Satan defeated Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden by using the fruit of a forbidden tree. But, Christ allowed Himself to be crucified by a tree on Golgotha's hill. The wood planted on Calvary was cut off in the prime of its fruitbearing life to become the raw, rough timbers on which the Lord of Life died. What had appeared fruitful, attractive and tasty to the eye in Eden that seemed to produce a delicious treat (Genesis 3:6), now appeared unfruitful and grotesque. The second tree's limbs were sawn and shaped to become an instrument of death.

Yet, what appeared fruitless and barren, unattractive, grotesque and forbidding, became the very source of all fruitfulness – a tree filled with grace for the eyes of faith to see. What our first parents thought was beautiful and appealing introduced death into the world. What seems as an ugly, cruel instrument of death introduced the only means by which life can be restored. At the cross, the tree of death became the tree of life.

The irony is that Satan, using his greatest and most feared weapon - death - was himself

defeated when Christ turned and used that weapon against him by dying the Supreme death - the death of the Son of God on the cross for the sins of all the world, our tree of life. Our Lord was wounded on His sacred head by a crown of thorns. The thorns and thistles God pronounced against Adam in his cursed ground, laid upon the sacred head of an eternal and gracious God. The brow of Christ - the Lord of life - flowed with crimson cleansing

the curse laid on mankind. The bloody stains on our Savior's face canceled the curse of the ground. But, we can bless the suffering as the sign of God's love, mercy and grace on us when His wrath and anger against our sin was carried out on His Son – our Leader of forgiveness unto life everlasting.

Fig leaves were sewn together by Adam and Eve to cover their shame, when they discovered they were naked. The leaves do little to hide what is obvious to God. Adam and Eve had fallen into unbelief. They rejected the warning of God and turned His Holy Word of Promise into a curse. It would take far more than a few leaves that eventually shrivel and die, to cover our shame. To cover their shame, God sacrificed an animal and prepared the skins to cover Adam and Eve's bodies. (Genesis 3:21) What was cursed by the Lord could never be covered by our efforts or by anything in creation. Christ is not a fig leaf to cover our shame and sin. On the cross God prepared Human flesh as a garment of righteousness to cover the wickedness and depravity of our humanity. Christ died cursed that you and I need not seek the fig leaf of excuses or try hide from God's wrath against our sinfulness. The curse suffered on the cross covers us with Himself and protects us from the righteous



ever-all-seeing eye of God. God's question to Adam and Eve in the Garden, "Where are you," wasn't an indication that the fig leaves hid them from His sight. Rather, it's His rhetorical question, "Where have you put yourselves and all of your offsprings?" The rhetorical answer, of course, "We are here, dead in sin."

"Christ be my Leader by night as by day; Safe through the darkness, for He is the way. Glady

I follow, my future His care, Darkness is daylight when Jesus is there." [Lutheran Service Book, Hymn 861, Timothy Dudley-Smith, Hope Publishing, 1964] These words remind us that our Savior Jesus Christ reversed all the curse and wrath against us in the righteous exchange on the tree of the cross. Now, when the searching eye of God searches our hearts and asks, "Where are you," we may respond, "Here I am Father... covered in Christ and His righteousness."

VIRTUAL BIBLE STUDY


Christ the King, Memphis

In these uncertain times, it becomes a challenge to forge and keep bonds of friendship and spiritual kinship alive and flourishing - no in-person Bible Class, no Small Groups, no fellowship over a cup of coffee in the narthex or in the nursery sharing childcare tips. The traditional methods of engendering closeness and community among church members are disrupted; what's the answer to make sure our people are cared for spiritually and to keep those friendships thriving? For as we know, it is often those very friendships which give the impetus to church outreach ministries and produce God-pleasing fruit.

As one answer to this challenge, a group of young moms at Christ the King Lutheran Church, Memphis, began a Zoom Bible Study and

fellowship time. The group meets once a week in the evening, and has adapted Bible Studies from the LWML's Lutheran Women's Quarterly. The leader, new member Jessica Peralta, was identified as a potential Bible Study leader based on the Time and Talent Survey she completed upon joining CTK. In a bold step of faith, she agreed to lead this new group and set about recruiting interested moms, including forming a Facebook groups called "CTK Moms" in which each mom was invited to share a photo of her family and tell a little about herself. Common hobbies and vocations were discovered and instant bonds created.

As the leader Jessica stated, "I was starting to get to know other moms before COVID-19 struck, and it is a blessing to have the opportunity



to continue developing relationships with moms from church through virtual means while strengthening our faith through the Word." When normal returns, whatever shape that takes, these moms will have this Bible Study group to turn to for stability in transition.
