The Beauty of the Gospel

There was a story about two apples in a tree, looking down at the world. One apple said to the other one, "Look at all those people fighting, stealing, rioting, and killing. You know if this keeps up, some day there won't be any one left to run the world except us apples." The second apple looked back at the first apple and asked, "Which apples... the red ones or the green ones." Prejudice versus leadership? Maybe. One of the most beautiful passages in the Bible... is the criticism leveled at Jesus by the Pharisees because He ate with and gathered sinners into His company. The hatred the Pharisees had for Gentiles and tax collectors couldn't see beyond the work they had to do to live and the person God made them.

In Mark's Gospel Jesus chose Matthew for one of His disciples. Matthew's name was Levi - indicative of the family genealogy showing that he came from a line of priests. He worked as a tax collector for the Romans. In order to make ends meet he was accused of supplementing his meager wages by extorting money from the Israelites. The Romans allowed tax collectors to take the extra money the Romans used for the operation of Roman authority.

Imagine how the Jews would have hated Matthew. He was considered a traitor and a thief. But Jesus saw him differently. He called Matthew into service for God's kingdom. Matthew accepted the call to follow Jesus.

At a farewell dinner at his home, he invited his friends to join in the celebration that night - tax collectors, sinner, the despised, the social outcasts, and Matthew's partners... kind of seedy crowd Pharisees would have never had anything to do with.


But, right in the middle of the whole mess sat Jesus - not lecturing about their sins, just reclining with the other guests - eating and visiting with them as friends. But that's the way Jesus worked. He called Simon, Andrew, and James out of their father's fishing boats and said He would make them fishers of men. Jesus didn't call men who were educated or perfect. He called disciples who knew risky business and hard work.

Sadly, that's what seems to happen in the Church these days. Some people are afraid or unwilling to go to work in the Kingdom of Christ. Remember the Pharisees were not religiously ignorant. They studied in Scripture, God fearing men - who cared deeply about their beliefs and practices of the Jewish faith. They lived very religious, pious lives. Their focus was on rules and regulations; traditions and prejudices toward people outside God's Old Testament's covenant.

Jesus constantly led His disciples to go outside their comfort zone. He challenged the traditions and status quo. And, why not? As human beings, we need to be pushed outside our comfort zones in order to grow. It would be easier to come to church, to worship in our own way, to visit only our friends or family, spend our time doing the things we think are important and never, ever, ever really accomplish what God wants us to do for the kingdom of God.

The Pharisees asked Jesus, *"How can He eat and be with those who are sinners and tax collectors?"* His answer should be the greatest comfort our ears, *"I came to seek and save the sinners."* That's me! Jesus came to save me and everyone else who has ever sinned. He joined Himself to us who were separated from God by our sin. He came to heal us not to work with the righteous, but to heal the sinners.

So many Christians hear about Jesus every day. They call on Him in times of trouble and even thank



Him sometimes for His blessings. The number one reason people don't get excited about Church and about Jesus is that they can't see any reason to follow Him. They don't know they're sick and dying without Him. Their lives are just fine if they're healthy, wealthy and wise.

The Pharisees were actually in greater need of healing than those they criticized. They were caught up in the intellectual arguments and religious traditions, while they were avoiding Jesus. Sinners realize their emptiness without Jesus and yearn for a way to follow in His footsteps. Jesus took the questions of the Pharisees and made it the most beautiful statement we seek in Holy Scriptures. The Pharisees were self-proclaimed righteous people but needed Christ's healing just as much or more than those obvious sinners.

There's a tremendous comfort in the answer Jesus gave them. He didn't come looking for righteous people by the righteous actions, or by their own inflated idea of

their righteousness. He came for the sick and wounded people - hurting people - people who have no place to turn to - sinners desperate for a way out of their sinful mess. Isn't it wonderful that He came to offer healing, forgiveness, and grace when we are also called to follow Him? Jesus calls us to follow Him and will lead us to the brightness of new life in Him.

There's a story about a speaker at a seminar who once held up a \$10 bill. "Who wants this \$10 bill," he asked the crowd. As hands began to go up, he crumpled it up and asked again, "Who wants this \$10 bill... I'm going to give it away to one of you." More hands went up. "Well, what if I do this," he asked as he dropped the \$10 on the floor, crushed it with his shoe and ground it into the floor. "How many of you still want this \$10 bill?" Not one hand came down. "We've learned a valuable lesson tonight," the man said. "No matter what happened to this money, you still wanted it, because it didn't decrease in

value by what happened to it. It's still worth \$10."

Many times in our lives we may feel as though we've been crumbled, crushed and ground into the dirt. Our decisions and the decisions of others around us bring about circumstances that hurt us and make us sick. We may feel as though we are worthless, but no matter what has happened to us, or what will ever happen, we will never lose value in the eyes of God. To our Almighty Father - dirty, crumpled and stepped on... or sparkling clean, we are still priceless to God.

We were created in the image of God witnessed in the Book of Genesis, *"Let us make man in Our image, according to our Likeness.*

And God created man in His own image, in the image of God He created Him, male and female He created them." Look at your spouse or your children. Turn to your friends or neighbors at your next chance and see those who are formed in the image of God. Jesus Christ gave us His rich and abundant mercy, that indeed, we are no longer crushed and crumpled sinners, but wonderfully new and alive children of our heavenly Father.

He created you! He died for you! Who are we to isolate ourselves from the privilege and the calling of Jesus to share this Gospel of grace from those who are dying to hear its message of peace and comfort? Who are they - out there

- who challenge our comfort zone, but need the Great Physician for their healing too. Look who is leading: That is the beauty of the Gospel: It is powerful to save despite the sinners who share its message.

LIFE REFLECTIONS

In the aftermath of yet another senseless mass shooting (Buffalo, NY) and tragic loss of human life, many voices have attempted to answer the question: "Why?" Most of the answers deal with symptoms and avoid the root cause. Explanations I've heard include -- he is a white supremacist, a racist, and thus has committed a "hate" crime; or, he has a mental illness or is on mind-altering drugs; or he used weapons that, if banned, would not have been used to commit such evil. These are but symptoms of a greater underlying problem.

That problem, to quote *Aleksandr Solzhenitsyn* -- explaining why such calamities befell Russia in the 20th century -- "Men have forgotten God; that's why all this has happened." We can think about what we have forgotten in two ways. First, the 10 Commandments, specifically "You shall not murder" (Exodus 20:13) have not been taught in our government schools for at least 60 years. Martin Luther explains in his Small Catechism: "We should fear and love God so that we do not hurt or harm our neighbor in his body but help and support him in every physical need." Absent the fear and love of God, wickedness will run wild.

The second way we can think about what we have forgotten was beautifully expressed by Pope John Paul II (*The Gospel of Life*, 1995), "By his incarnation the Son of God...reveals to humanity not only the boundless love of God who "so loved the world that he gave his only Son" (Jn. 3:16), but also the incomparable value of every human person." A society that forgets this incomparable value j—from the moment of conception until natural death – will reap the whirlwind of increasing violence and disrespect of human life in ever more alarming actions. Our public servants owe us the truth: that we no longer fear God nor tremble at His Word.


Ascension Lutheran Hosting the Henkel Conference
