A Message from Rev. Dr. Roger Paavola, President

hen I travel throughout our Mid-South District, I oftentimes see immense, seemingly almost endless fields. I think to myself that when the farmer first pushes the planter into the soil, does he give a sigh of weariness for the toil of the miles and miles of fields he must travel in order to finish planting those gigantic fields? What a long and daunting task it must be. At this time of the year the harvest is months away and the newly tilled soil may produce an abundant crop of rice, corn, or cotton. Except for the tell-tale signs of serpentine windrows in rice fields, we don't necessarily know the content of the expected harvest at planting time, unless we were the planter. However, in the Fall, we can see gigantic colorful rolls of cotton, huge combines swallowing up

endless fields of corn or rice, and wispy tails of white smoke as fields are cleared of stubble.

In the distance along these long country roads, our eyes can become fixed on a grove of trees that frame the setting of a tall white steeple. The steeples were a sentinel of directions before GPS and route finder applications on our cell phones. "Turn left at the church you see over there...," the farmer would tell the lost traveler, "it's about 4 miles from here, and you can find your destination right after that."

The steeples and the churches that supported them were sort of a cornerstone for our forefathers. The steeple marked the location of a place of worship. But the steeple also pointed toward the heavens to place an exclamation point of

farmers and families in earlier days where the proclamation of Christ Jesus as our Lord and God might be heard. The churches became a cornerstone of the community – not the building mind you, but the people who were attached to those small and rural congregations.

St. Peter speaks about the cornerstone in his first Epistle. "As you come to him, a living stone rejected by men but in the sight of God chosen and precious, you yourselves like living stones are being built up as a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, spiritual sacrifices offer acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. For it stands in Scripture: 'Behold, I am laying in Zion a stone, a cornerstone chosen and precious, and whoever believes in him will not be put to shame.' So, the honor is for you who believe,

but for those who do not believe, 'The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone." (I Peter 2:4-7, ESV)

In ancient architecture, the cornerstone was an important part of any building's foundation. It was the "blueprint" of the footprint of what the building would eventually look like. As a result, it had to be cut perfectly. Each subsequent stone had to be laid perfectly in line with it in order to make the building strong and firm. The cornerstone was the first stone set in the construction of the foundation. All other stones were set in reference to this stone.

The cornerstone of the Church is Christ – perfectly given as true God and true Man. Christ is the cornerstone, because all of us as living stones are called, formed, set, created, and aligned in reference to Jesus Christ, our Lord and Redeemer by the calling work of the Holy Spirit. Without Christ, we are not Christians. Without Christ, there is no purpose to our gathering in worship and service.

The cornerstone also set the orientation of the building. Traditionally, the direction toward which

we will see Christ at His second coming is toward the east - the rising sun. Christian churches centuries for preferably built their buildings so that the altar, set against one of the walls, would face easterly. Then, when we pray and worship, the congregation and pastors would face, with

the congregation, all in the same direction, and toward the coming Christ. The Church looks always forward into our future as into the sunrise where Scripture tells us the Christ will return in His glory to receive His elect into His eternal kingdom.

Can a church building face other directions? Of course. But, as we find in many of our older church buildings, it says so much to position the cornerstone and the rest of the structure so that the whole church, that is the whole congregation, looks toward the east as they, the Church, worship, and pray to our gracious God in Christ Jesus.


St. Peter was inspired to write that we are all living stones in this edifice built on the cornerstone of Christ. There are bishops, pastors, elders, and fellow workers within the church building, but the basic priesthood of believers is one we all share. We are the church – the beloved bride of Christ. We are all called to offer – as Peter tells us – prayers and the sacrifice of worship for ourselves and the rest of the people of God.

St. Luke tells us in his Acts of the Apostles that seven men, full of the Holy Spirit, had a special role in the Church. They were called and ordained to service. But they, as well as us, are also called to show image of Christ in our day and time. St. Stephen wasn't portrayed as someone whose role was limited to waiting on tables. The first thing he did after ordination was become a stumbling block for the Jews of the Synagogue of Freedmen. He challenged them, quite vigorously, quoting Scripture and calling them to repentence. The

message Christ, our Chief Cornerstone made the Freedmen SO angry that they dragged him out and stoned him to death. The image of Stephen dying with forgiveness on his lips and proclaiming still message the of the cross of Christ was the primal event of

martyrdom – witnesses of Christ to the fullest extent of a willingness to die for the sake of the Gospel message. A man named Saul was at the stoning of St. Stephen, but would later pick up his own cross and become one of the most effective evangelizers in the Church – St. Paul.

Yes, as followers of Christ and workers in the army of the great Christian martyrs who came



before, like Stephen and Philip, we may often need to step outside our safety zone to become stumbling blocks for those who are doing evil and reject the message of the Gospel. St Peter explains the reason for our stewardship of the Gospel, "You are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for His own possession, that you may proclaim the excellencies of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light. Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy."

We praise the small and rural congregations who continue their steadfast work for the Kingdom of Christ. Like fields being prepared for planting, we are all planted in the rich soil of the Gospel. Through His suffering, death, burial, and resurrection, Jesus has ascended to heaven to be seated at the right

hand of God the Father. He is preparing rooms for each of us, and for all of us collectively, mansions in the kingdom of God. But here and in this day, we are placed here to be like those rural church steeples to point the way to Christ and share with others the Gospel of Christ where the Holy Spirit calls them into becoming disciples of our Lord. Let us pray for continued guidance, wisdom, and abundant harvest – all the gifts of God, so that we can hear His voice bringing us peace, joy, and a certain hope of life everlasting.

PAWS ON THE GROUND

Covenant Presbyterian Church and School in Nashville

On Monday, March 27, 2023, tragedy struck the community of Covenant Presbyterian Church and School in Nashville as six people -- three children and three adults -- were killed by a lone shooter. The city was in shock, as were we all. On Monday afternoon, Job Comfort Dog's ministry coordinator Genie Swan at Christ the King, Memphis, was contacted by Lutheran Church Charities (LCC) to ask if Job could join five other LCC Comfort Dogs from around the country in Nashville by the next day, in response to an invitation from Rev. Lane Reuter of Our Savior Lutheran Church, Nashville. We had "paws on the ground" by 2PM on Tuesday, March 28. There ensued a week of visiting with those experiencing the pain of grief, gathering at the memorial site, in private homes, and in surrounding schools. The community welcomed the dogs with open arms, and were able to mourn, to share precious memories, and

to feel a glimmer of hope as these peaceful dogs and their caring handlers ministered to each adult and child. While this kind of deployment — in the wake of random shootings — previously have occurred perhaps once a year, they now are occurring with heartrending frequency. The LCC


LIME organized oral defenses of Licentiate Thesis for seven students. The programs went very well. We are sending you some photos of them. (right)





Without your donation, this would not be possible. We are so grateful that we get to serve Christ alongside you!












