Encourager



Message from Rev. Dr. Roger Paavola, President



The assignment for this month's Encourager is "Church Planting." It's a subject I am totally committed to serving in our Mid-South District and in many of the locations where I have had the privilege to serve as a church planter. Yet, when I view the subject, it's fairly obvious that we can't go to Best Buy, purchase a program, and plug in some fancy dangled thing that will make church planting work. The history of most of our Districts, (including the Mid-South District) have a track record in church planting that is a batting average that wouldn't make it in the major leagues. In fact, from 1974 when church planting and Church Growth became the buzz words in the church world, the number of successful church plants has been a "batting average" that most pitchers in the major leagues wouldn't want (American League pitchers do not normally bat. It's left to the Designated Batter.)

The Mid-South District's church planting projects that have been able to sustain themselves beyond the three years shows a tremendous relationship between the "mothering church" and the church plant. First Lutheran in Hot Springs and Grace Lutheran in Knoxville are examples of that relationship. In the places where the church plant has been parachuted into a location or are without the "mothering church" to give it leadership, financial, and visionary support, our results and the results in other Districts has been less than stellar. Most Districts have a "batting average" similar to Tim Tebow when he was brought up to the "Bigs" by the New York Mets. Other districts are much more fortunate in their efforts to fostered sustainable mission plants.

But, Church planting began in the First Century! God's Spirit move hundreds and thousands of people to convert to Christianity in remarkable numbers. "And as they were speaking to the people, the priests and the captain of the temple and the Sadducees came upon them, greatly annoyed because they were teaching the people and proclaiming in Jesus the resurrection from the dead. And they

arrested them and put them in custody until the next day, for it was already evening. But many of those who had heard the word believed, and the number of the men came to about five thousand." (Acts 4:1-4, ESV)

Why isn't that happening 2100 years later? That brings up several important data points for our consideration. First, the number of people who <u>do not</u> identify with any church in the United States exceeds 22% of our population. A July 23, 2020, Pew Report states that 57% of Americans do not see God as necessary to live a moral and wholesome life. The report went on to say that 70% of the people believe religion is "somewhat important," the majority does not see God as an essential element in a moral life. Perhaps they missed the point of the God we worship and serve is a God that goes far beyond moral guidance as our God is the God of life and salvation! That makes church planting a difficult undertaking, to say nothing of the added ingredients of COVID shut downs!

Yet, on the global front, people in economically emerging countries consider God to be necessary. For example, people in Russian and the Ukraine are more inclined to embrace a strong preference for God and worship than their counterparts in other parts of Western Europe. The explanation for this phenomenon is that after the lifting of the Iron Curtain, the public in "liberated" Russia and Ukraine found Christianity a refreshing departure from Communist rule and state-mandated atheism. Our neighbors to the north in Canada are even more dramatic in their disbelief in an essential God with a whopping 73% of Canadians who think God is not necessary for moral good (to say nothing about God as necessary for salvation). Since 2002, the opinion in the United States on the necessity of God has dropped by 14%, a number that is roughly parallel to the increase of the number of "nones" (over 22%) — those without any church affiliation.

What makes the difference? In one particular study, Pew Research (Global 2020) indicated an inverse proportion of a country's economic well-being correlated to the belief in a necessary God for Christians. For example, Kenya which has a very low per capita income (\$4,509 annually) has 95% of its population express a view that belief in God is an integral part of a person goodness and moral standards. On the other end of that spectrum, Canada, the United States, and the Netherlands have per capita incomes well above \$50,000 to \$60,000 and a dependence on God below 25% expressed by the general

population. Prosperity economically may affect spiritual poverty. [See "The Global God Divide" Pew Research]

As we dissect the LCMS and its history, we have to first note that the birth rate in the LCMS membership went from 4% of the church-active population in the 1960's to just under 1% in the first decade of the Twenty-First Century. That "natural church growth" of the past isn't happening anymore. What is more, the retention rate of children from their Baptism to Catechism age is 60-70%, while the retention rate of those who make it from Catechism to adulthood is only 33%. Translation: Out of 100 children baptized in the LCMS, 60 to 70 of those children will come to and complete Catechism. Of that 60 to 70 who came to and were catechized, only 33% have remained in the church — 20 to 23 out of the 100 children baptized!

We have seen reports that indicate every mainline denomination in America is in decline. There are a few pockets in each denomination that are exceptions to this data. Yet, many studies have verified that the emergence of the non-denominational church bodies (actually microdenominational bodies) has not answered or curtailed the decline in overall Christianity decline.

So, let's bring it closer to home: The Mid-South District was one of two districts that not only did not see a decline in its total membership between 2015 to 2018, but actually saw a slight increase in membership! To God be the glory. The joint effort of the Mid-South District and the Mid-South District LWML sponsored a program called $\mathcal{E}ach\ 1 - \mathcal{R}each\ 1$.

It was a program that <u>was not designed</u> for church growth, but designed around the Great Commission and the encouragement St. Peter offers us as Christians. "As you come to him, a living stone rejected by men but in the sight of God chosen and precious, you yourselves like living stones are being built up as a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. For it stands in Scripture: "Behold, I am laying in Zion a stone, a cornerstone chosen and precious, and whoever believes in him will not be put to shame." So the honor is for you who believe, but for those who do not believe, "The stone that the builders rejected has become the cornerstone," and "A stone of stumbling, and a rock of offense." (I Peter 2:4-8)

But, then Peter continues, "But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for His own possession, that you may proclaim the excellencies of Him who called you out of

darkness into His marvelous light. Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy." (I Peter 2:9-10) To whom does Peter refer? He answered that question in the first chapter, "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! According to his great mercy, he has caused us to be born again to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, to an inheritance that is imperishable, undefiled, and unfading, kept in heaven for you." (I Peter 1:3-4) Everyone who has been baptized in the Triune God is called to be a witness of God, that we "may proclaim the excellencies of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light."

We will continue to work with congregations and circuits that are engaged in church planting. We will encourage church planting and mission development. We have several "mission sites" that are being or will be developed in this year and next. In addition to the mission sites already underway in Munford, TN with Rev. Dan Hawkins, and in Fayetteville, AR with Rev. JD Ziscke, we will be adding a mission re-plant in Olive Branch, Mississippi with Rev. Sawyer Meyer as planter, West Little Rock with Vicar Dan Bodemann, Smith Grove, KY with Rev. Dr. Mark

Press, and Hohenwald, Tennessee with Rev. Douglas DeWitt as planter.

People are hungry for the life and salvation that is offered in Christ and wish to come to worship Him in truth and purity. On top of that, we have 23,000 or more people who can be encouraged, engaged, and equipped for giving witness to the saving truth of Christ Jesus. If we were to understand our own data, if only 20% of our catechized members were equipped to spread the Good News that would mean 4,600 new souls could be led by God's Spirit's gift of faith to apprehend the overflowing grace of God. If only 2% were able to proclaim their new life in Christ to those God would entrust to their role in the priesthood of believers, it would still be 460 new souls won for the Kingdom of Christ. Now, that would be a great plant! May God continue to grant His blessings on our church planting efforts.
