A Travel Brochure

you remember the children's cartoons where you're supposed to find the 6 things different between two similar cartoon characters? In one, the character may have a different dress or might be wearing a different hat. Or there may be a dog with a curly tail in on and in the other the dog has a straight bushy tail. But, the picture John painted in his revelation from God is kind of the same thing. It's a first century, "Where is Waldo." In fact, the thing missing from John's picture into heaven is so remarkable that he noticed it right away. In cartoon puzzles we're supposed to see things differently. But, St.

John isn't looking at a cartoon. He's looking directly into heaven.

God gave John this vision so he could tell all Christians about the promise of God. God showed a vision of heaven so John could pass along what he saw to the rest of Christianity. God heard the cries of despair from His people who were being whipped and beaten because they carried the name of their Savior - Christ. God heard the cries of anguish from men, women, and children alike who were thrown into the arena to face wild, savage animals and brutal gladiators. God saw the delight of some of the people His Son had died for, who departed from their faith, to live in sin, lust

and debauchery and living as if Jesus was only a passing fancy.

It's difficult to understand exactly what John saw. It was like explaining a first century Christian travel brochure, sent by God, on behalf of all Christians to whom He announced that they were the recipients of a free, one-way pass into Paradise. Until John was really taken in heaven, he had no comprehension of how beautiful it was going to be – a view that is impossible to describe in words.

He saw a throne of God and the gigantic city gates made of a single pearl. He saw the gold lined streets and throngs of saints and martyrs singing with the heavenly choirs before the throne of the Lamb of God. John saw the Tree of Life restored in Paradise which had been taken from Adam and Eve, but now stood forever, watered by the Waters of Life that flows from the side of the Lamb. But, when John looked for the Temple... the place where the people worship - it wasn't there! "I didn't see a Temple in the city," John writes, "because the Temple is the Lord God, the Almighty, the Lamb."

Can you imagine that?! Probably the most important building that we might think is going to be in heaven, IT ISN'T THERE! NO TEMPLE! You would imagine that the most magnificent, the most beautiful, most spectacular church we could ever see would be the one in heaven. But, it's not there.

When read the Old we Testament accounts about the Temple of God, it's a pretty important place with the Jews. The converts to Christianity found the synagogues and churches a mainstay in their walk with God. Until the time when Jesus walked among us, the Temple was a place where animals were sold for sacrifice. The sacrifices were a reminder for the people that they needed a Savior and the shedding of blood. The Temple sacrifice reminded them that God promised a Savior who would take away their shame, guilt and punishment of their sins. It reminded the Old Testament faithful that they walked in faith -

not by sight - but in faith founded on the faithfulness of our merciful God.

Today we have church buildings where people come to worship and sing praises to God. We don't have to wonder about God's faithfulness to send a Savior, because Jesus already came, suffered and died in our place when He became the Lamb of God's own sacrifice for us; but then rose victorious over sin, death, and Satan.

We have altars, but the altars are reminders of the sacrifice Jesus Christ offered on our behalf. We believe the altar is the presence of God who comes to visit us, by His grace and serve us through His Word and His sacraments. The altar is the mercy seat where the Almighty God sits in judgement over all creation. The sacrifice of the blood in the Old Testament, allowed the high priest to enter into the Holy of Holies to offer sacrifices on behalf of the people, once a year. The blood of the sacrifice covered the mercy seat and the high priest. But each year the sacrifice had to be offered, never ending, because the real atonement for sins had yet to come.

We don't have to bring animals for sacrifice, anymore. Instead, we come before the altar to hear the message of God's peace, redemption and grace, through the blood of His own Son. We come to the altar after the curtain before the Holy of Holies was ripped open from top to bottom

because God's own sacrifice superseded all the others for all time and in all places.

Creation ripped wide open on the day Christ was offered as the sacrifice for us. Earthquakes and the covering of the sun, were violent reminders that God was making everything new – the old had passed away and everything was made new in Christ. God destroyed the evil that sin brought into the world. God received the blood sacrifice of His very own Son on our behalf.

But, it remains a picture of amazement that in heaven there is no Temple. There are no church buildings, no kinds of altars, or curtains hiding the mystery of God's presence among His people. The sacrifice of Jesus Christ was a pure acceptable offering to God for all the sins of all of mankind. Easter morning, the door of the tomb was burst open. It showed an empty tomb because Jesus Christ had walked out, alive and breathing new life. Sin and death had no more power over Him. And anyone... you and me... anyone living in the righteousness of the Risen Christ has been given the promise of Christ's power over an everlasting death and punishment.

St. John writes to tell us why there is no Temple in heaven. He was told, "The city's Temple is the Lord God Almighty, the Lamb." Instead of a carved image that serves as reminder of our crucified and risen Lord, in heaven we shall see Him face to face. There's no

need for a Temple OR an altar. Christ – the final edifice of the presence of God with His people is with all those who are present with Him in everlasting peace, life and blessedness.

On earth we still need a reminder of the altar and the church. We need to be fed for this short journey on earth through the means of grace that come from God. We need to receive forgiveness of our sins and the strengthening of faith through the Word and the Sacraments, which connect us to our risen and glorious Christ.

Our sacrifices today are not animals and birds -- offered to God in a hope of a coming Messiah. The Messiah is here, now and on to eternity. Our sacrifices today, instead of expressing our faith in the COMING of the Messiah are, instead, an expression of our honor, praise and thanks to God for what He has already accomplished for us in Christ Jesus. Our sacrifices and offerings today are still by faith and show us today who is our God.

The book of Revelation is a travel brochure. It gives all the information we need, to travel where we are today and how to get to where God wants us to be throughout all of eternity. The journey here may have a few bumps and a few misfortunes. But they don't keep us from pressing on to that glorious homecoming planned for us and all the others who are joined together in Christ. God grants this to us all, through Jesus Christ, our risen Lord, our Savior and God.

Remembering a Dear Friend of the Mid-South District —


PRESIDENT EMERITUS **Rev. Norman Groteluschen**

November 18, 1924 - July 23, 2021

Rev. Norman L. Groteluschen was called to his heavenly home on July 23, 2021. A dear friend and faithful servant, "Pastor G," as he was known to many, was a driving force in shaping the mission-minded character and heart of the Mid-South District.

Rev. Groteluschen was part of the district's first leadership team when the former Western District voted to divide into two districts in 1966, forming the Mid-South District and the Missouri District. A seasoned pastor and church planter with 26 years of experience leading various congregations, his initial role was that of the Mid-South District's Second Vice President. By the mid-1970s, he had been selected to serve as the District's Mission Executive.

His passion for the mission of the church made him well-suited for the Mission Executive role, which, in turn, prepared him for his next position: District President. Rev. Groteluschen was elected the second President of the Mid-South District in 1985. During his two terms as President, the mission mindset was emphasized and nurtured. A "Church Planter's Manual" was

developed and new ministry growth accelerated rapidly. By the time of his retirement from the District President role in 1991, the Mid-South District was home to 110 congregations, after starting just 25 years earlier with 77 congregations. Following his retirement from the presidency, Rev. Groteluschen continued to share his leadership expertise and passion for ministry growth for the next several years as the District's part-time Mission Executive. Even after his complete retirement in 1994, "Pastor G" remained a faithful friend and servant of the Mid-South District, frequently sharing encouragement, advice, and wisdom with those who would lead after him.

Rev. Groteluschen was preceded in death by his beloved wife, Margaret, and two children who died in infancy. He is survived by sons Rick and Ron, and daughter Becky. Rev. Groteluschen's long-time church home, Christ the King Lutheran Church in Memphis, hosted his funeral service on Thursday, July 29, 2021. The Convention dinner preceding the worship service was held in Christ the King's (CTK) new facility. On Sunday, August 1, CTK dedicated their new building.



The 300 people in attendance at the Opening Service of the Convention boldly declared the Lord's glory, praising God for His marvelous works. The worship service was live-streamed and may be watched on-demand.



President Harrison, LCMS President, gave the State-of-the Synod report which covered a variety of challenges locally and nationally followed by a Question and Answer session.

Key Resolutions —

To Reject Racism and Advance the Gospel: by a 85.47% majority vote, delegates supported addressing and rejecting the world view of Critical Race Theory and doctrines that promote racial division. It also encouraged congregations to conduct conversations on race and diversity to strengthen unity within the congregation, and to engage members of their communities in these conversations in the light of the Gospel. It also commended those within the LCMS Mid-South District who intentionally proclaim and work to reach out with the Gospel of Jesus to those who are different from themselves in the light of the Great Commission.

Support of International Missions and in Haiti, Tanzania, and Madagascar: by votes of 97.79%, 98.55%, and 97.83% respectively, three separate resolutions directed continued financial and mission support from the district with encouragement

for personal involvement. These resolutions support: Trinity HOPE in Haiti (a partnership begun in the Mid-South District to provide low-cost meals for children as they are spiritually fed by the Lutheran schools); and to continue relationships with the Southeast of Lake Victoria Diocese (SELVD) of the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Tanzania and the Confessional Malagasy Lutheran Church in Madagascar and its Lutheran Institute of Management and Entrepreneurship (LIME University). Greetings from Bishop Makala (SELVD) and Rev. Dr. Randrianasolo (LIME) were also presented by video due to COVID travel restrictions.

To Encourage Financial Support for Professional Church Workers: by a 98.55% majority vote, delegates supported encouraging

delegates supported encouraging professional church workers by continued assistance in reducing student debt. The resolution emphasized Synod's 2016 Res.

18-03 regarding the challenges and burdens of educational debt while serving the church, and for finding funding to lessen future workers' debt to aid in recruitment. This resolution commits the district to fund designated contributions to MinistryFocus for professional church workers in the district who are burdened with significant educational debt, and to establish additional funding from the District Sunday and designated convention offerings.
