



A Message from Rev. Dr. Roger Paavola, President

Zig Ziglar wrote a story about a situation that happened in the Great Smokey Mountains several decades ago. It seems some hogs escaped from a farmer's pen, and, over the generations, the hogs became more and more wild. They were a menace to everyone who traveled in the park and on vacations. They ate up gardens and threatened children, pets, and livestock. Hunting down the hogs was unsuccessful because the population seemed to flourish in the unlimited environment of the Smokies.

One day an old farmer came to the officials in the park and said he could get rid of the hogs. All he had was his mule, an old wooden cart, a couple of sacks of grain and some rough sawn lumber. The

park officials doubted his promise to get rid of all the hogs - since the hunters were unsuccessful but let him proceed. He went to a clearing near the highest point in the park and watched for the place where the hogs congregated to eat. When he found it, he put out a few handfuls of grain. At first, the hogs were hesitant, but eventually ate the grain. The next day he put a plank next to the grain. The hogs were hesitant, but eventually ate the grain. Then came the first corner post, a few more posts, a few rails. Each time the wild hogs were hesitant, but eventually ate the grain.

The farmer made a trap. Every time he added something, the hogs hesitated, but eventually came back to get "Something for nothing." What happened took a long time and a lot of patience. But, the luxury of a "free lunch" made it possible that the farmer eventually captured the whole herd. When they became dependent on someone else to give them food, they easily became captive to their desires.

The same is true for human beings: If we give a man a free lunch long enough, he will soon be in the habit of getting something for nothing, and then he's trapped. In a study, led by health economist, Dr Tor Dahl, I helped compile data from 1967 through to 1976. We looked at various governmentally run entitlement programs related to healthcare and its relationship to a person's health. What we

discovered is that there is an undisputed inverse proportion of a person's responsibility for their health and the 21 major factors of health. In other words, the less a person spends in their own time and money on healthcare, the less healthy they will be and their quality of life. The more a person spends with their own time and own money on concerns for healthcare, the healthier they become and with a higher quality of life standards. (That led us to the conclusion of what seven factors created an increase in life expectancy, up to 21 years of life!) But, that's for another subject and another time for us to discuss those items.

This is not a newsletter about the current national debate over healthcare – wherever that may be going. This is about work and our national holiday we call, "Labor Day." In the Gospel of John, chapter 6, Jesus calls Himself the Bread of Life... the Bread that the crowds could eat and live forever. When the crowds asked for this "free bread" Jesus didn't rebuke them for their shortsightedness, but rather, Jesus says, "...to work for bread that does not spoil."

In response, the crowds ask, "What must we do to accomplish the work God requires?" Once again, the Old Adam kicked in, thinking there is something we can do to please God, to accomplish His Will, to develop our relationship to Him, and so forth. Law-keeping doesn't earn God's favor. Our obedience doesn't earn a place for us in His eternal and heavenly mansions. Only the work of Christ on the cross and victorious resurrection from the grave are acceptable to God for the redemption of man.

God is the source of life. The Bread Jesus spoke of isn't crushed grains or Wonder bread – it is the Person of Christ and His means of grace. "No man can come to Me unless My Father draws him. And I will raise him up at the last day, for whoever eats of My flesh and drinks of My blood, has eternal life; and I will raise him up on the Last Day."



That's a promise no other person can make, nor any other bread can give.

What is the work that God requires for eternal life? Jesus said, "The work of God is this: To believe in the One He has sent." Doesn't sound like a hot and sweaty job, does it? But why is it so difficult to accomplish? As we read further in John's sixth chapter, the crowd quickly left Jesus when He told them His flesh is real food and His blood is real drink. We understand Him to mean the blessed sacrament of Holy Communion. The crowd didn't mistake this as being something symbolic. They left Him in disgust! They left Him thinking He was too gross or maybe insane. But make no mistake of it, they left Him. They left behind the Son of God who offered His true body and His true blood because it didn't make sense to their human logic that Jesus could do such a thing. Did Jesus capitulate and beg the people He offended to come back? No! He asked His disciples if they too were going to leave Him (Imagine: Leaving Jesus because they couldn't grasp the idea of eating of Him, the Bread of Life!) It takes faith, not logic or reason; but pure, child-like faith.

There is no free lunch. Getting drawn into something that sounds too good to be true is probably too good to be true. This month we celebrate Labor Day – a time to reflect on the work of millions of people who have made this country great – the most prosperous and powerful nation in the history of mankind. If we don't think it takes hard work to accomplish that quality, we can find plenty of examples around the world where lack of industrious efforts creates a worthless existence where every person expects someone to bail them out.

The only vivid and holy contrast to a totally free gift

comes to an inheritance of an eternal peace with God. It took work, to be sure. But, in the case of securing our eternal life, it was the work of Christ, who, on our behalf suffered and died so we may receive His eternal peace. By His resurrection from the dead, Jesus won God's favor for our justification. The only work we can do in this mystery of God's grace is to believe and accept Him in faith. "The work of God is this: To believe in the One He has sent." Have a blessed Labor Day as we remember the work Jesus did for us and our everlasting life.

CHURCH ROOFS FOR TANZANIA

The Southeast of Lake Victoria Diocese (SELVD) of the Lutheran church of Tanzania has witnessed tremendous growth. When a new congregation is formed, the members purchase and clear the land, pour the foundation, make the bricks, and construct the walls for the new building. This is a labor of love by the members many of them new Christians. Their biggest challenge is to raise money to purchase wood and steel sheets for the roofs. Most of these new church plants are in rural areas where the congregation consists of subsistence farmers. Money is a scarce commodity.

In 2012, when the SELVD was established, it was made up of 14,371 members, 5 Districts, 37 Parishes and 70 Sub Parishes. In 2022 when it marked its tenth anniversary, it had 28,498 members, 15 Districts, 105 Parishes and 312 Sub Parishes.

With this phenomenal growth comes challenges. Currently over forty congregations are meeting without a roof to protect them from the weather. The diocese estimates 24 more congregations will be formed in the next 2 years.
