A Message from Rev. Dr. Roger Paavola, President

FEAST OF THE HOLY CROSS

Each September, the Christian Churches around the world set aside September 14 as the Festival of the Holy Cross. It seems the way St Paul writes in his epistles, he can be a bit wordy at times. But in his letter to the Corinthians Paul makes two points: First, it's foolish NOT to follow God, even when it may seem foolish to the rest of the world. Second, there's a general objection to an object in this world – it's the cross.

Apparently, things haven't really changed that much in the last 2,000 years. The majority of the world still thinks it's foolish to believe that the way to eternal life is accomplished by the death of a Man on a cross. Why did the people of Paul's day think Christ's cross was foolishness? Perhaps it's the same two reasons people think it's foolishness today. Back then, Paul said the cross was a stumbling block. Part of it was because Jesus wasn't the kind of Savior most people expected or wanted. They thought the Savior was supposed to be a strong warrior who would liberate Israel from their Roman oppressors. So, according to their rationale, a Savior dying on a Roman cross seemed to be foolishness.

He was supposed to triumph over the enemies of God's people and should not be crucified by Romans.

Skeptics today still stumble over the cross, while others are offended by it. They're still looking for a god who will knock out all of their enemies, take care of all their problems, and give them every kind of prosperity their hearts desire. They look for a god who will do things in their way and in their timing. So, if God doesn't answer their prayers when and how they want Him to respond or looks the way they think a Messiah should look... they reject Him and His cross.

They wonder why God doesn't heal cancer, wipe out the pandemic, or fix the strife in our cities; wondering why God doesn't change one person's attitude and make another person to be more like them? They wonder why God doesn't swoop down, wipe away all those sinners, and just leave the good people? Well, if God DID come to wipe away all of the sinners... He'd have to wipe me away as well.

You see, the cross of Christ's didn't happen just to defeat our enemies. One of old hymn says,:

"From the cross Thy wisdom shining, breaks forth with conquering might! From the cross forever, beams all Thy bright redeeming Light." That last word should be capitalized! That beaming Light from the cross is the eternal Light of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ! The glorious eternal Light of God is seen most clearly when He was raised upon the throne of the cross to bring life, salvation, and our eternal peace with God.

Paul described all non-Jews as "Greeks." So, for those who had never heard about the promised Messiah, the cross was folly. It didn't fit into their platonic thinking. Greeks prided themselves on their wisdom and their ability to be able to philosophically and rationally explain things. But their philosophy just couldn't grasp how God would sacrifice Himself for us simple, sinful human beings. It just didn't make sense! They wondered, "How could His death bring forth life for us?"

Philosophy and worldly religions teach that people have to earn their way to a god. They reason that a person must do something to earn salvation by their works. That's the way worldly religion operate - their idol gods supposedly reward by a person's self-works. But they can't wrap their heads around the truth that the only way to be made right with the true and living God is to receive His sacrifice on a cursed but Holy cross and have His righteousness given to them by God's grace. A crucified Savior was just utter foolishness to them.

According to their philosophical thinking, what good would a dead Savior be?

We still hear that today. Our post-modern culture won't admit that no one is capable of doing any works to earn God's favor. Our good works count for nothing when it comes to earning God's favor. We've all sinned and fallen short of His glory. Martin Luther once wrote, "What is it about your own miserable works and doings that you think you could please God more than the sacrifice of His own Son." Unfortunately, some people can't commit to anything they can't completely understand or fully explain by human wisdom. As a result the Holy Cross of Christ is just plain foolishness.

But St Paul makes it clear that there are only two options when it comes to subject of the work of Christ and His cross: Those who treat the word of the cross as foolishness and folly will perish. But to those who embrace the Word of God and His grace accept the mystery of the cross, as the wisdom of God and the power of God, for us who are being saved and will be returned to a peace with God.

Why did the Church make September the date for the Feast of the Holy Cross? After all, it's been few months since Good Friday and Easter. Why bring up Christ's cross now? We should understand St Paul is reminding us that Easter isn't a single day. Easter candy, new outfits, ham dinners, and Easter egg hunts don't make it Easter!

It's because of Easter and the cross that we can

celebrate! Every Sunday and every day for that matter... is our peace and joy because of what happened on that first Easter over 2000 years ago – the glorious resurrection of Jesus from the dead. When Jesus died on the cross to pay the penalty of our sins, He also arose in human flesh!

Jesus Christ's resurrection proved God was satisfied with His sacrifice to earn our redemption. In His act of grace, God gave Christ's death and resurrection in a joyous exchange – Christ's goodness and glory exchanged for our wretchedness, sin, and condemnation. You see, without

Christ's suffering, death, and resurrection, the cross – any cross – really would be foolishness.

Jesus' death on a cross wasn't unique – at least as far as the world was concerned. But it is totally different, even though real death happened, real burial took place. But none of those other victims on other crosses did what Jesus did. For you and me, He rose from the dead.


According to our confessions in the Evangelical Lutheran Church, we proclaim Christ and Him crucified... which may be foolishness to the world, but for us, it is the promise of grace, mercy, peace, and life from our gracious Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ. We boldly confess the resurrection that proves everything Jesus claimed as being the Son of God, who came to earth to die for our sins, and

that we are justified in the sight of God, proves that the Christ's cross is not foolishness at all.

We reject philosophical things that regard the cross as just not making sense. But the cross of Jesus isn't foolishness. The Person of Easter, our risen and glorious Lord Jesus serves us each day, knowing we can celebrate every day in Easter joy and our blessed assurance of life everlasting.
