Message from Rev. Dr. Roger Paavola, President





We approach the season of Thanksgiving in 2020 with a gigantic question, "Can we find real reasons for celebrating Thanksgiving this year?" course we can! This year has been like a script from a Sci-Fi movie where a world is battling against an invasion of an unseen alien. Yet, in retrospect, 2020 has given us plenty of things for which we are thankful. You're reading this, you're able to connect with loved ones, you're able to attend worship, there's food on the table, and thousands of other things that prove God's continue provision for all we need.

Politicians are accusing their opponents of corruption, malfeasance, ineffectiveness, and lying about their record. Nowhere in the political ads (as much as I avoid them, they still appear!) have I seen anyone thankful for the great country we live in and

our ability to worship God in a way we choose.

But unlike a secular world's "Thanksgiving," where gathering with family, carving turkey, and watching six back-to-back football games, Christians always understand thanks-giving is our privilege for the relationship God carved for us for our life in His grace and provision. Christians have been celebrating thanksgivings for divine provision and rescue for centuries. But, the history of thanks-giving to God goes far beyond the Christian era. Holy Scripture notes a record of thanks-giving beginning with Noah's thanks-giving after the worldwide flood and when the Israelites gave thanks after God delivered them through the Red Sea on dry ground, rescuing them from the Egyptians, just to mention a couple. The Old Testament is filled with examples of thanks-giving.

If we think about it, St Paul begins most of his letters to congregations with thanksgiving to God. Yet, like most of the annual events associated with our relationship with God, a secular world pictures our Thanksgiving as the first time people came together to offer thanks for one reason or another. Several years

ago, there was an article in a newspaper that claimed most of what we understand about American Thanksgiving is a myth. As nice as the image of pilgrims sharing their corn, pumpkins, and turkeys with the indigenous people, it is unlikely most of that happened the way the artists portray.

The article included information about the first thanks-giving event on American soil occurred over sixty years before the pilgrims came to the Jamestown colony. In 1565, the Spanish explorer, Pedro Menendez de Aviles celebrated thanks-giving in St. Augustine, Florida. His celebration was Spanish, not American. By the same token, the pilgrims were "American," not since were still subjects of England and paid their allegiance to the king of England. The American "Thanksgiving" wasn't "American" since the pilgrims were not disloyal to England. The American Revolution was still over 150 years away. The pilgrim's colonization certainly had identified religious implications, but they were still subject to the British crown.

What makes the American Thanksgiving our thanks-giving? The first official thanks-giving proclamation was from President George Washington in 1789. But, then President Abraham Lincoln made an official declaration of the American Thanksgiving in the Nineteenth Century around the time of the war between the states. Even in my short time of living in Canada, Thanksgiving was introduced to my family in the history of a day celebrated

much earlier than our November festivals. Canadians put on "all the fixin's" that rivaled the biggest feasts around because of a national thanks-giving introduced by Martin Frobisher, an English explorer, in 1578.

Who was first? It doesn't really matter if we understand what thanks-giving is all supposed to be about in the first place. St Paul's writes to the Corinthians, "I give thanks to my God always for you because of the grace of God that was given you in Christ Jesus, that in every way you were enriched in him in all speech and all knowledge" (I Corinthians 1:4-5). Thanksgiving is focused on giving thanks to the Giver. Thanksgiving is celebrated reverently by the receivers in a way that gives a foundation for our Christian understanding of real thanks-giving. We know Who gives us all things.

In other words, the earliest records of "American" thanksgiving – whether secular or religious – were never focused on feasting and watching the Detroit Lions getting thumped in another Thanksgiving Day football game. The priests with the Spanish explorer, de Aviles said mass for the sailors and troops in St Augustine in 1565. The pilgrims thanks-giving in the Jamestown colony consisted of a day of prayer and worship.

The Old Testament Scripture writers gave us vivid pictures of the eyes of the faithful who knew their provision was given by a gracious God who promised them a Savior. True thanksgiving for Christians goes back in recorded history thousands of

years ago. Thanks-giving brings our eyes to the cross of the promised Messiah – Christ Jesus. Thanks-giving should remind us of a gracious and loving heavenly Father. For God has prepared for us an unending feast of victory in His glorious and eternal Kingdom.

Compared to those devout thanksgivings of long ago what we call Thanksgiving bears very little resemblance to the faithful Christian worship of those who first gave thanks here. It doesn't really matter who gave thanksgiving first, or what they ate or what they shared with their neighbors. However, it does matter if we are uncertain to Whom we are thanking. Our thanks-giving is our response to what God has and continues to give to us out of His fatherly love. "Let us give thanks to the Lord, for He is good and His mercies endure forever." (Psalm 107:1)

Have a blessed and meaningful Thanksgiving for all things He continues to shower on us in His great grace and mercy.
