Give Thanks to the Lord of the Harvest

While driving through our District recently, I watched thousands of acres of rice, corn, soybeans, and cotton being harvested. The harvest is going full bore. Monstrous combines gobbled up hundreds of acres of golden corn, wheat, and rice. Huge semi-trucks and tractors dot the edge of the endless fields, waiting to carry the fruits of the harvest away. Gigantic pink and yellow rolls dot the landscape where an abundant harvest of cotton has been granted.

Another sight that fills the skies is a slender white column of smoke that can be seen for miles along the flat prairie landscape. The farmers burn

the straw from the harvested fields. The demand for straw is minimal – not worth enough to bother taking off the field. Just like sentinels watching over the fields, the white pillars of smoke rise above the vast fields, signaling another completed and successful harvest.

But, voluntary burning is a recent development in the North American prairie farming. Today's farmers have only a few animals, if any. In the past, the farmers needed the straw for bedding for animals. A pillar of smoke in the centuries past meant something quite different - it meant there was a prairie fire that was burning out of control.

The story of one such fire is told, when the autumn grass lands were dry, and how wildfires would rip through the prairies, consuming all the crops, the grasses and even the humus in the soil within minutes. Hundreds of acres were consumed in minutes. In late 1871, a farmer saw an ominous cloud of white racing toward him and his family... on an otherwise crystal-clear day. The hot, strong Fall winds carried the smell of smoke into his nostrils, making his eyes turn toward the West where a cloud of smoke covered the entire horizon.

He knew wildfires were fast...too fast to outrun with a team of horses. He knew the fires could sweep over him, his family, and farm in a matter of seconds, snuffing out every living thing. Panic would have normally filled a man's heart. There seemed to be no place to turn or to run. Gathering all his livestock, his family, and everything they might need for a few days, the farmer stood at the western edge of his own fields and lit a match. The match caused the grass to burst into flames, quickly spreading toward the house and barn, spreading around all his fields, crops, trees and shelter grasses...everything was consumed in minutes.

But, while he and his family stood there amid all the smoldering black soot, they turned their eyes, again, to the West, where the heat of the wildfire pressed against their faces and the flames of destruction could be seen. As the wildfire roared with angry assault nearer to them, they stood in the middle of the charred remains of all their earthly possessions. Yet, when the angry tsunami of fire and smoke came passed their farm, the family stood safe because the farmer had already burned everything that could burn...the wildfire had nothing more to destroy. His family was safe. Exactly 150 years ago, the Peshtigo (Wisconsin) fire stands as one of the most devastating wildfires in our nation's history. It burned over 1.2 million acres of land, claimed more than 1200 lives, and swept across the waters of Lake Michigan's Green Bay, wiping out towns, timber, and homes in Wisconsin and the Upper Peninsula of Michigan.

St. Paul draws our attention to a similar scene. No, not the destruction – the sentinel of the smoke. He urges us to keep our eyes, not on things on earth, but on things above in heaven, where Jesus Christ is seated at the throne of God. *"For you have died, and your life is now hidden with Christ in God,"* he writes. *"When Christ, who is your life, appears, then you also will appear with Him in glory."* (Colossians 3:4-5)

The evening TV news and newspapers are filled with stories of people who will do just about anything to save themselves and their earthly possessions. There are stories told of men who have destroyed themselves, their wives, and children because they lost \$100,000 in the stock market. In 1929, a wildfire of crimes, suicides and bizarre events were triggered when people saw their worldly wealth

going up in smoke. Orson Welles infamously triggered wide-spread panic several years later with a preposterous story about an invasion from Mars. On New Year's Eve in 1999, there were more people who were convinced that there would be massive destruction and outages because computers might not convert from one century into the next. People couldn't find enough portable generators in the hardware stores. They hoarded water, food, and clothing to withstand months of electronic crashes. Some preachers even preached unusual and strange solutions to withstand the impending disasters.

Does the flip of a page, the tick of a clock or the downturn in stock values demand that kind of attention? Does it make sense that the split second between December 31st at 11:59 PM and midnight of January 1st as we dove into the Twenty-first century should really drive us beyond reason?

What does all this mean? The story of the prairie fire is a vivid contrast to newspaper accounts of destruction over earthly riches. On one hand, the farmer saved his family and their lives by creating a back-fire barrier. On the other hand, the people in the newspaper articles and in Orson Welles' time were taking their lives because they believed life was over when their possessions were taken away. St. Paul begs us to be like the prairie farmer and like Job... look to your life that is hidden away in Christ... hidden from the world, but visible in the eyes of faith.

We only have one goal as Christians... to be with Christ when the clouds and fires of destruction pass by us. The beauty of what St. Paul describes is that all the stuff of this world will pass away. But we will, as St. Paul writes, *"When Christ appears, then we also will appear with Him in glory."*

Perhaps, in the eyes of the world, the prairie farmer foolishly destroyed everything he owned. As Christians, we understand what he did, because without our lives being saved from destruction (I Corinthians 1), possessions are worthless anyway. St. Paul painted a picture to illustrate that our lives and our call to glory in Christ will let us see things from an entirely different perspective. Get back to the prairie farmer... he stood in the middle of smoldering ashes...but he and his family were alive, saved to live another day! We see the signs of devastation around the entire world. We hear horror stories of every kind around

the globe. But we remain firm in our trust in God and we shall not be overcome. We have a Savior, Jesus Christ. We stand today and we will stand on the last day - whenever God decides that is going to be. We will stand saved to live a life in eternity because the fires of destruction will pass over us.

So where do we stand? Where is it that the ravages of the fires of destruction and devastation have already gone? What wildfire of economic uncertainty or of our own health raises ominous clouds on our horizon? What enemy gnaws at our confidence that makes us want to run, but with no place to turn? We've all read about the seventeen hostages held captive by Haitian terrorists. The wondrous thing about their plight is that they are Christian missionaries. They knew the dangers; they read the signs of what was happening in that country. Their lives were living examples of faith in what God has promised all of His elect.

On the day we call Good Friday, the fires of God's wrath and God's entire judgement against rebellion, iniquity, and

sin seared out across the sacred shoulders of His own Son. Jesus Christ stood in our place to receive the firestorm of God's vengeance against the sins of all the world. When we stand beneath the cross of Jesus, the eyes of the world may think of us as strange. But, instead of relying on our earthly possessions and ourselves, we stand in faith beneath the cross of Jesus, where our life is hidden in Christ... to live another day... a day that has no end. We shall live in the glory of Christ Jesus, as we give thanks to the Lord of the harvest, Jesus Christ, our God and Savior, forever. That is more than enough for us to offer Thanksgiving to our gracious God and Lord. Have a blessed and joyous Thanksgiving.

CONSECRATION OF THE SSELIC BISHOP AND PRAYER REQUEST

Hello brothers in Christ,

The consecration and installation of the SSELIC Bishop (Rev. Nathaniel Bol) is scheduled to take place in Kakuma refugee camp in Kenya on the 21st of November 2021. That is so because the Archbishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Kenya ELCK Joseph Ochola who will preside over the consecration has a very serious eyesight problem which cannot let him travel outside Kenya especially to places where he will get treatment when his eyesight problem worsen and because I am currently pursuing my treatment in Kenya.

Due to the above reasons and the long duration taken by consecration since the election was done in December 2011, the SSELIC leadership in South Sudan met 3 months ago and proposed that the consecration be done in Kenya and Archbishop Ochola accepted the proposal.

I found it appropriate for this consecration to be done in Kakuma because we have 4 Lutheran congregations in Kakuma refugee camp. Three of these 4 congregations are South Sudanese and one congregation is for Sudanese.

So I am requesting your support and prayers for the success of this plan and I invited you all to attend this consecration.

As most of you know, when a new congregation is formed the church members purchase the land, clear it, make the bricks, and construct the building. Often the building is without a roof because the congregation has no money to purchase wooden rafters and sheet metal for roofs and cement for floors.

Money from Mid-South District congregations was sent by the District office to the SELVD for church roofs. This congregation started in 2018 after a District mission team visited Lyalu. Team members from Immanuel Lutheran in Memphis were instrumental in the formation and support of Emmau Lutheran Church. They are very proud of their accomplishments and we rejoice with them.

2022 TANZANIA MISSION TRIP

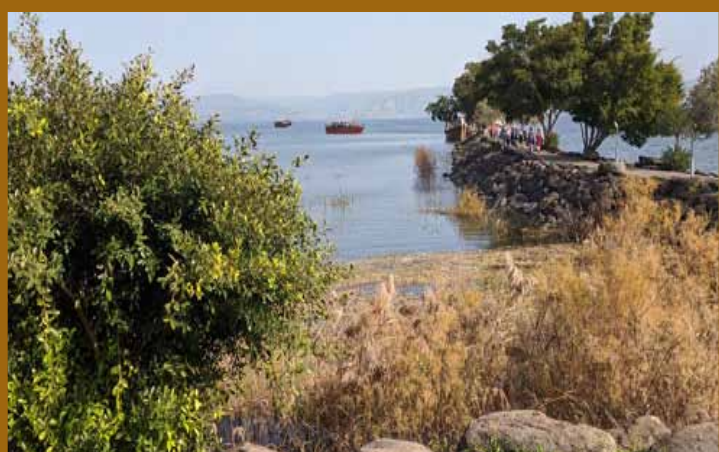
