A Message from Rev. Dr. Roger Paavola, President

ary's song, the Magnificat . (Luke 1:46-55) is spectacular! It is a divinely revealed expression of a deep and highly developed faith. That Mary could sing this canticle of praise to God in the face of the external dangers of her situation as she faces becoming the mother of God, is truly a miracle. Imagine the talk around town, "A virgin pregnant! How can she be?" Yet, because of what the angel of the Lord told her, we in the whole Christian faith have our blessed promise of eternal life in such an impossibility!

We're first faced with the question of how likely is it for a virgin to conceive a child? Then, we ponder how is it that God chose to become a Man for the sole purpose to suffer and die for us? Then, how likely is it that this Child born of a virgin mother would pay for the sins of the whole world with His suffering, death, and (equally spectacular) resurrec-

tion from the dead? We wonder why He ascended into heaven, is seated at the right hand of God, and will return on the Last Day. Why didn't He just stay here to prove His eternal existence?

His Word tells us that He accomplished our salvation on the cross and gives us His true body and blood in the Holy Supper for the forgiveness of our sins, the strengthening of our faith, and joining us together in the common union of His Church. How does our Baptism in Christ give us life eternal and the gift of faith from the Holy Spirit?

Post-modernists – even in the Christian circles – begin to extract Biblical teachings that defy human reason, logic, and tradition. Yet, if one "dot or tittle of God's Word" is extracted because it defies one's reason or is considered impossible makes our Christian faith like the individual blocks in a Jenga tower. Once one is removed the entire

tower comes tumbling down! The Bible either stands together or it fall completely apart.

The mother of our Savior, Mary was told by the angel Gabriel, "You will bear God's Son and He will save the people from their sins." Her response by faith embraced the impossible promise, "May it be to me even as You have said." Unlike Zachariah a few months earlier, Mary didn't question God how He would complete the conception of a virgin mother. The promise from the Archangel Gabriel foretold how the overshadowing of the Holy Spirit would consummate God's own explanation of her virgin conception.

Martin Luther wrote, "Isaiah announced: 'There shall come forth a rod out of the stem of Jesse, and a flower shall rise up out of his root, and the Holy Spirit shall rest upon Him." Mary would become the mother of this Child sent from

God and dwell among to fulfill all of Holy Scripture perfectly! We sing the Magnificat with Mary throughout the Church year. But, especially during the Advent and Christmas season, the Magnificat is a faithful singing of God's people who partake in His promises.


If it was left up to simple human minds to prepare from the coming of the Messiah, we would hardly have chosen a poor, young virgin to bring Christ to the world. We probably would have arranged for Him to be born in the castle in Jerusalem and created a spectacular fanfare at His birth. But God's Word spelled out the pattern of His coming in flesh – defying logic, discarding reason, and embracing the impossible by faith in God's Word.

We share in its faith. Mary's Magnificat shines a bright beacon of eternal Light about God's willing-

ness to make man's wisdom foolish. Only as we look down on the crude bed where He lies do we embrace by faith that we are looking at the face of God. The Word of God was made flesh to dwell among us. What God accomplished was hidden in a spectacular essential event that led to birth of this little Child to a humble peasant mother. This is God, Son of the Father, conceived by the Holy Spirit, who born for you and me!

Lutheran World Relief CARE-VAN Drive 2023

At this year's Lutheran World Relief CARE-VAN ingathering the Mid-South District had six drop sites where we collected handmade quilts, school kits, personal care kits, baby care kits, and fabric kits. Our drop sites included Grace, Knoxville, TN.; Cross of Christ, Chattanooga, TN.; Ascension, Madison, TN.; Immanuel, Memphis, TN.; First, Fort Smith, AR.; and Zion of Avilla, Alexander, AR.

At the time of this report (11/27/2023), the top three quilt-producing congregations that dropped off their work at an LWR CARE-VAN ingathering site were Zion of Avilla Lutheran Church, Alexander, AR (193 quilts), Cross of Christ Lutheran Church, Chattanooga, TN (139 quilts), and St. Paul Lutheran Church, Wartburg, TN (133 quilts). At this time, a total of 1,482 quilts have been donated.

To date we had 38 congregations participate, collecting over \$6,645 for shipping costs. We also collected 1,694 personal care kits (one congregation donated 344 personal care kits!), 117 fabric kits, 769 school kits, and 225 baby care kits. The CARE-VAN trailers were loaded up with 534 boxes (weighing approximately 10,850 pounds!) of offerings from District congregations for Lutheran World Relief. Way to go Mid-South District!

Many of the congregations' efforts are coordinated by LWML groups and longstanding quilting groups in the congregations. They participate in this effort to share the love of Christ in a personal way. The tireless efforts of those who share their talents and the generous contributions of many make this a successful ingathering.

The recent closure of Yellow Freight, the shipping contractor for CARE-VAN, created quite a dilemma. The Mid-South District and Lutheran World Relief worked right up to the last minute to secure another shipping contractor. This resulted in fewer drop off locations, which we pray will reduce overall shipping costs.







Luther Classical College Comes to Arkansas!



Trinity Lutheran Church in North Little Rock hosted a presentation by Mr. Samuel Preus, Director of Development for Luther Classical College (LCC) on October 28 for Congregations throughout Arkansas. This meeting coincided well with Reformation Day being celebrated as it is 95 weeks before the opening of this new college, sponsored by Mount Hope Lutheran Church in Casper, Wyoming of the Wyoming District.

LCC will be distinctly Lutheran, classical, and conservative for the sole purpose of preparing Lutherans to serve inside and outside of the church. With plans to enroll 60 students in the fall of 2025 (and eventually a total of 300) it will promote Christian marriage, family, and piety while preparing students to think logically and confess boldly the Lutheran faith. To do this it will offer two degrees a Bachelors or an Associates in Classical Liberal Arts. This degree is attractive because it creates students who

think critically in a world that needs critical thinkers.

With its efficient model it will also be able to offer an incredibly affordable tuition at \$8500 a year as well as affordable on-campus housing. To remove the influence of the world upon LCC, the school will also not accept any federal assistance. LCC returns to the grassroots of how our LCMS colleges began, by congregations and their members coming together to support this effort. In just two years they have gained support from over 250 congregations with the goal of 300 at the end of this year. They have also gained over a 1000 monthly individual sponsors giving between \$10 and \$250 a month.
