A Message from Rev. Dr. Roger Paavola, President

WHAT IS THE CHURCH "FOR"?

Bumper stickers do not often contain enough space for a good theologically complete thought. However, one that comes close is "Christians aren't perfect. Just forgiven." Those who do not understand the Christian religion can easily mock our faith by pointing out the sinfulness of the church's children. I'm guilty as charged! The mockers presume that the church's goal is to make sinners perfect. We Christians know from experience alone that that goal will never be reached.

So, what is the church "for"? The church is for proclaiming the forgiveness of sins and strengthening us for this pilgrimage. The church is about a perfect message of perfect forgiveness for less-than-perfect believers in Jesus Christ. While we do not bear the cost of forgiveness, Christ does, we are aware of its precious price. Here's why we urge ourselves to lives of good works. We can do no less. "We love because He first loved us" (I John 4:19).

Yet we have no doubt that we fail. We feel that failure in our battle against our sinful flesh every day; pulled as we are between the first Adam and the second Adam, Christ our Lord. We will feel the tug of temptation as long as we live in the flesh, for sin and depravity adhere to our constantly crucified flesh. When we fail, we do so not intentionally, but as a failure that we lament and heartily repent. There will always be temptation to sin, we will fall into it, but it will not rule over us (Romans 6:14). This is why we Christians pray in the Lord's Prayer every day: "Forgive us our trespasses." If we didn't have the Holy Spirit, sin would not be a failure, but a carnal success. Sin would never occasion a godly repentance. It would never drive us to our knees in prayers of contrition. The Spirit succeeds, however, because sin remains our failure. He comes to show us our sin (John 16:8) and lead us to repentance.

The world does not cease persecuting the church and her children. Every medium introduced to our "post-modern" society does so by pointing out not only the weakness of God's chosen children but also the ordinariness of the church's piety. Her piety is shaped by the Ten Commandments. She has no piety other than those things given by God. What's more pious than a right faith, right worship of God, right

obedience to earthly authorities, and right service to our neighbor's body, goods, and reputation? Yet, the world mocks these as insignificant. After all, "anyone can do them."

These are works of good order and social structure. Yet, Christianity, if it is to be a religion of works and perfection, must strive for glorious and glittering works, not the mundane works commanded by God in the Ten Commandments. But our Lord expects us to live our lives in the mundane. We do not live by works in God's presence, but by faith. We cannot ascend into heaven to offer our works as a means to get in there. Our God given works (Ephesians 2:10) will be offered here and be for use to those on earth here, and now. Since our works gain no merit with God toward salvation, they can only be offered here and are best offered here.

The unfortunate ladder-climbing works of self-righteousness, offered as they are for God's benefit, are truly worthless and faithless. They merit nothing before God. Being a good friend and a faithful neighbor does not sufficiently go high enough up the ladder of piety to be considered truly pious by God, or by the world. In the quiet simplicity of mundane works, the Spirit is truly working in our lives. Have no doubt.


Why all this talk about works, piety, and righteousness? It's always about Jesus. He humbled Himself to come to earth, taking on human form to become our Lord and Savior. He came to be the Lamb of God to take away the sins

of all the world. Martin Luther said of our "good works," "What makes us think our good works gave greater merit before God than the life Jesus gave to win our salvation?" For Christ, the Babe of Bethlehem lives the perfect life we cannot live.

"He also suffered once for sins, the righteous for the unrighteous, that he might bring us to a right relationship with God, being put to death in the flesh but made alive in the spirit, in which He went and proclaimed to the spirits in prison, because they formerly did not obey, when God's patience waited in the days of Noah, while the ark was being prepared, in which a few, that is, eight persons, were brought safely through water. Baptism, which corresponds to this, now saves you, not as a removal of dirt from the body but as an appeal to God for a good conscience, through the resurrection of Jesus Christ, who has gone into heaven and is at the right hand of God, with angels, authorities, and powers having been subjected to Him." (I Peter 3:18ff) Want to see humility and righteousness? Gaze into the crude manger and see God's great gift for the promise of our eternal life with Christ in His glorious Kingdom. Have a blessed Christmas.

Hope Lutheran Church Family Life Pantry Begins!

On October 13, we finally began a long-planned outreach service into the community handing out diapers, wipes, formula, and baby food to families in the community with babies and toddlers. Twice a month (the second Monday, 5-7pm and the third Saturday, 9-11am) members from Hope Lutheran Church in Batesville and our sister church, Shepherd of the Hills in Horseshoe Bend volunteer to provide a much-needed service to our community. While open to all, our unique work certainly helps the many lower income families. (Of 75 counties in Arkansas, Independence is 29th at 19.6% below poverty line and Izard 16th at 21.1%. FYI—the National average is 12.4% and Arkansas's population has 16% below that line.)

This project began in 2023 with fundraising and just as we were about to start, in June of 2024, Hope was struck with major storm damage. When the damage was fixed in November 2024, we were preparing to get opened when the member who was going to run it moved away. This left us with the problem of an organizer. God has a funny way of answering prayers at just the right time: enter Dawn and Tim Vaughan. They moved here in January of 2025. Tim finished a career in the military retiring as a Sergeant First Class and is now able to work remotely. In a previous church, Dawn organized and served as the manager of that church's food pantry.

In May, Dawn took up the mantle to start organizing things. She has truly been a gift to Hope as she has helped organize the congregations to serve in this important work. At our last give away on November 15, we had 18 volunteers from our two small churches!

There is a lot of behind the scenes work and without her dedication things would definitely fall through the cracks.

On Saturday mornings we offer breakfast to the families who come. This gives the opportunity to get to know the people and invite them to hear the Word of God. Which, of those who have come, over 60% have no church home! We have also been able to meet the significant Hispanic population in Batesville and some of our members are brushing up on their Spanish to communicate with them. We are providing a variety of the



CPH pamphlets, especially ones on baptism and the catechism to help teach people why it is so important that we are Lutheran, both in Spanish and English! CPH through their Gospel outreach program provides our Pantry with the classic arch books to give away and they offer this to us free of charge.

Mission Trip to Tanzania 2026

— May 14-24, 2026 —

We are excited to announce that planning is underway for a Mid-South District LCMS mission trip to Tanzania in 2026. Bishop Yohana Nzelu of the Southeast of Lake Victoria Diocese (SELVD) has recommended that our mission activities take place during the week of May 18–24, 2026.

Our team will depart from the United States on Thursday, May 14, and arrive in Tanzania on the evening of Friday, May 15. Upon arrival, we will travel to Shinyanga, where we will stay throughout our mission work from May 17 through May 24.



Mission Activities

The diocese is organizing our church-planting mission in the villages of Mwamadulu and Mihama in the Kishapu District. Each day we will drive from Shinyanga to one of the villages for church planting outreach with Pastors and members from the Kishapu district.

We will celebrate the mission trip in worship in Mwanashele, a congregation that was started through work of a district outreach team in 2011.

Safari Extension

Some team members plan to participate in a safari adventure into the Serengeti. This group will drive to the Western Gate of the Serengeti to meet their tour guides on Monday, May 25. They will return to Kilimanjaro Airport on the evening of Wednesday, May 27 for their flight home.



Please note, participation in the safari is optional. Not all team members will be joining this portion of the trip.

Additional Outreach Opportunities

Beyond church planting, we expect to visit the Buhangiji Albino Center in Shinyanga, the medical clinic at the cathedral, the deaconess home for young albino women, Mwadui Lutheran Secondary School, and the group homes for albino children established by St. John Lutheran Church in Bingen, IN and Mwadui Lutheran Secondary School.

We look forward to a meaningful and impactful mission experience, serving communities and sharing the love of Christ in Tanzania.
