WHEN EVERYBODY PLAYS
THEIR POSITION

1979, Herb Brooks, the LCoach for the University of Minnesota hockey team, began assembling a list of 20 men who would represent the United States in the Winter Olympics. By the time he whittled down a number of amateurs from high schools and colleges across the country, he had assembled the youngest composition of players to ever play in the Olympics from any country in any Olympic event, ever. After finishing the pre-Olympic exhibition season, it was clear Russia, Finland, Sweden, and Czechoslovakia were the favorites to win medals in the Olympics. But, by the evening of February 22, 1980, unknown American kids pulled off what commentators said was "The Miracle on Ice!" The US beat

the highly-polished Soviet team, and two days later defeated a pumped-up Finnish team. Very few of the under-sized, and under-experienced US players went on to professional hockey careers. But, Coach Brooks chose youngsters who knew their position and played it well. When the final buzzer sounded the end of a hard fought game, Herb Brooks left the bench, ran to the locker room and wept. He chose the right men for each position. Everyone had played their position well... and won.

But, sports isn't the only place where playing one's position takes place. It happens in business, in the community, and it happens in the church. Positions in the church are varied, but more critical than any "game," anywhere. The church is full of people who are uniquely gifted for the positions that the church needs them to "play." Faithful volunteers step up and say, 'Yup! With God's help, I can do that.' It's not off-the-charts miraculous or super-spiritual. Serving the church covers more than teaching Sunday School, singing in the choir, or sewing quilts. There's always a need that's being filled. Volunteers either see a need, or ask if they can take the opportunity to be a part for the greater good of God's kingdom.

Why did the early Christian grow...because Church the preachers preached better; or they finally sang songs the people liked; or because the church served the best potluck dinners? No, the early Christian Church flourished because it was blessed by God for the people who heard God's plan of salvation – the goal He offered through His Son, Jesus. The early church's members quit being spectators, and became the "players" - to "play" their position. They took the gifts God gave and used them for the work of the church.

The church is us! Christ is the Head – we are His body in this world. We're fed on His Word and Sacraments. We're led by the Holy Spirit in a sanctified life and our love for people. We're receivers of what God pours out in abundance by His grace for the good of His Church and His people. But, simply "doing church" isn't "being church." St. Peter reminds us, "You like living stones are being built up as a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ... [B]ut you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for His own possession, that you may proclaim the excellencies of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous Light. Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people..." (I Peter2:5, 9-10a, ESV)

Yet, volunteers have a life!... real jobs, real families, real bills, and real homes to keep. Their time is their most precious commodity. That's what makes volunteers

a people we need to recognize and celebrate. They come to serve... in our congregations, in the District office, or on a mission trip. They show up to work. Volunteers recognize a need to help one another. They seek their best position and stick with it. St Paul writes,(I Corinthians 15:58), "You be steadfast, immovable. Keep abounding in the work of the Lord because your work is not in vain."


For example, Jesus had friends: Mary, three Martha, and Lazarus. They all "played" different positions, but out of their love for Christ. Martha was a working servant for Jesus – everything had to be done just right. Mary was a total worshiper and friend. Lazarus eventually had a powerful testimony about his "play" in Jesus' story. Jesus raised Lazarus from the dead, so at a dinner party to honor Jesus, each one worked together with one purpose. Martha served, Mary worshiped and anointed Jesus' feet. And, Lazarus had a story to tell.

Three people... different gifts. Every church needs their Martha's to cover the details. We need Mary's to sit at Jesus' feet in worship, pouring out a fragrant sacrifice of worship for the Lord. And, we all need the Lazarus' to share the message of grace in Christ Jesus and His love and hope in life everlasting.

We need volunteers at every level of the church's ministry: children's ministry, youth, singles, elderly, women, men, retired, outreach, choir, missions... the list goes on, and even applies to the work of the volunteers in the District's office. So, volunteers,

hear it well: We thank God for you! You're not a spectator in the pews, you go into the field, being fed by God for this good work and give it your all for Christ and His Kingdom. Thank you, and thanks be to God!

CHURCH AND SCHOOL LEADERSHIP

St. Paulin Romans 12 gives us a good understanding of spiritual gifts and church leadership. In verse 3 we are exhorted to, "not think of yourself more highly than you ought, but rather think of yourself with sober judgment, in accordance with the faith God has distributed to each of you." Just as the body has many parts, so the church has many functions or areas of service to the Lord which require different spiritual gifts. Some have been given the gift to prophesy, others to serve, others to teach, others to encourage, others to give generously, and others to lead. But the most important thing is to do all in love.

We are reminded in 1 Corinthians 12 that "4 Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; 5 and there are varieties of service, but the same Lord; 6 and there are varieties of activities, but it is the same God who empowers them all in everyone." So no matter our position or station in the life of the church we are reminded about who is in charge. The lord our God has given some the responsibility to lead the flock, which is a demanding responsibility. But He has also given those individuals the gifts needed to fulfill the responsibilities of their leadership roles. How one uses those gifts in service to others is a key to the success of church. But once again the key to success is shown to us in chapter 13 of 1 Corinthians. "1 If I speak in the tongues of men and

of angels, but have not love, I am a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. 2 And if I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but have not love, I am nothing. 3 If I give away all I have, and if I deliver up my body to be burned, but have not love, I gain nothing."

Dr. Bruce Hartung in his book entitled *Building Up the Body of Christ* reminds us that "... all offices in the church and all spiritual gifts are just that – gifts of the spirit of God." We all have natural abilities and gifts from God that we use to build up the body of Christ, but

we also are given spiritual gifts that come to us not as a result of our own efforts but rather as gifts from the Spirit. This should also remind us that no one particular gift is more important than another. We are one body in Christ and we must work together to praise the one who saved us.

Love is the key to good relationships and to good leadership. Love helps us to use our God given gifts to work together toward the unification of our work here on earth. We need to use our gifts to create beautiful music rather than a noisy gong or a clanging cymbal. Yes, we could use our gifts in a negative or not so God pleasing manner, which would not be fulfilling our roles as a God pleasing leader. Our goal needs to be that of building up the community of believers for the good of others. Leaders are servants. Leaders are learners and study God's word daily. Leaders do not know everything about the scriptures and seek to help and support others to be faithful followers of god's Word. Leaders all fall short of what God wants and needs in this world, but with constant meditation and servanthood toward others, leaders can do what is needed in order to build up the body of Christ.

Zion Lutheran Seeks Help from Fellow Mid-South Congregations to Continue Critical Food Pantry Ministry in Wake of Fire

Following a devastating fire in late May at Zion Lutheran Church in Alexander, AR, senior pastor Rev. Michael Schleider reports that the congregation's top priority is to continue operation of its community Food Pantry Ministry with as little disruption as possible. Zion's food storage facilities and critical equipment for the Food Pantry Ministry (refrigerators, freezers, etc.) were destroyed in the fire, along with the original chapel and the church/pastor's offices. Zion's school, Avilla Christian Academy, recently wrapped up its academic year and the church's plan is to temporarily

run the Food Pantry Ministry out of the school facility. However, this will require the immediate replacement of large capacity refrigerators, freezers and other equipment. On behalf of Zion Lutheran Church, the Mid-South District asks Lutheran brothers and sisters to help meet this need by sharing their generous support.



EASTER VIGIL – THE RITE OF HOLY BAPTISM

The Easter Vigil has traditionally been a time to receive candidates for baptism into the Church. That was true in spades for Grace Lutheran Church (Clarksville, TN) this year when seven were baptized at the Easter Vigil, April 15, 2017. Gathered in darkness, the new light of Easter was kindled in a brazier and transferred to the Paschal Candle. As the congregation made their way from outside into the darkened nave, they brought the light with their hand candles. A series of readings from the Old Testament described how God had delivered His people in the past (many through water). Then the attention turned to the font and to the Rite of Holy Baptism. A baby, several small children, two youth, and an adult came forward to be sealed into the Kingdom of God in the waters of baptism. These were added to the dozen baptisms in the previous few months and to several more that follow the Vigil to total of 20 baptisms of various ages so far in 2017.



Jean Philippe Paul has been our Feeding Program Director in Artibonite, Haiti since 1999. In addition to working with Trinity/HOPE he studied at the local Lutheran Seminary and completed his studies for ordination. He started a church in the Gros Morne, Haiti area which is very remote with many voodoo worshipers. It takes him a couple hours to reach his new church but the difficult trip does not discourage his passion and work. English is not Jean Philippe's first language but I think you will understand his points as he describes his new church in Haiti.

church is started in Gros Morne Haiti with the support of a group of Haiti Mission who used to bring mission team down Haiti and bring teachers from the States to teach in the seminary. The status

of the church is Christian with the purpose to destroy the flag of the voodoo spirits in Haiti and lift up the banner of Christ Jesus.

That church is a baby of only one year old but grows up and seems a young man of twenties. In one year all the member is challenge to know they have potential in them, when God calls He doesn't ask you for what you are in the society, can you write or read. He asks you to hear, to answer with obedience and to believe and He will use you in the way He wants depending of the talent He gave you.

The members of my church are really poor economically, they have no resource at all but I can tell you they are rich in goodness. Even though they cannot preach or lead a service they talk to others, invite them to come to our meeting, they are participating.

They built a building to worship the Lord. They do everything they can as go the river which not far get the sand carry stone bring water carry mortar they are just interested in serving how they can.

Hearing and seeing are different. If you go to Gonaives area and do not plan to see that difficult and inaccessible place [where our new church is located] which have such good a people, your trip can be incomplete.

As you are talked about the status of the church the words of Philippe to Nathanael are lent to tell you **come and see (John1:46).** Last year they had no understanding of God Grace, today they are beyond expectation. Out of all of that we say that God is good. God Bless you."
