Message from Rev. Dr. Roger Paavola, President



celebrate sually, we "Veterans" in November, but this year, we have chosen to celebrate all veterans in a special way. November's Veterans Day usually reminds us of men and women who have been called to protect our nation in military service for our nation. We're grateful for their willingness to serve and sacrifice for our nation. So, for that service want to say thank you. We also praise God for not only hearing our prayers, but giving protection and care during dangerous times. St. Paul writes: "Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ who has blessed us in the heavenly realms with every spiritual blessing in Christ." (Ephesians 1:3)

It reminds me of a story I read about a man who was hospitalized and had a young son try visit him during his

confinement. The man made a little wooden truck for his boy. But, since the boy wasn't allowed to go to his father's room, an orderly brought the gift to the son who was waiting in front of the hospital. His father looked on from his window as his son unwrap the truck.

When he opened the gift the boy's eyes got wide with excitement. His father walked back and forth, waving his arms behind the window, trying to get his son's attention. The boy put the truck down and reached up and hugged the orderly and thanked him for the truck. The frustrated father went through every dramatic gesture imaginable to get his son's attention, 'It's me, son. I made the truck for you. Look up here!" Finally the mother turned the boy's eyes toward the window to see his father. "Look up son, it's your father!" It was then the boy cried, "Daddy! Oh, thank you! Come home, Daddy. Thank you for my truck!" His father knew his son's real gratitude as he stood in the window with tears pouring down his cheeks.

Are we like that child? Think of the many people we need to thank. All good things in

this life come from God our Father. Just as a soldier needs to follow orders and training of the commander, if we're going to live as followers of Jesus, it's important we know God leads us by His Spirit for Him and His cause. St. Paul writes, "We do, however, speak a message of wisdom among the mature, but not the wisdom of this age or of the rulers of this age, who are coming to nothing. Now, we speak of God's secret wisdom, a wisdom that has been hidden and that God destined for our glory before time began." (I Corinthians 2:6-7)

The war we're in as Christians is against principalities of darkness that try to destroy any hope that we might have in this world. Evil has imprisoned humanity from our conception (Psalm 51). When our nation's forefathers struggled under the tyranny of English rule, they

soon discovered that the English expected compliance by their control. The "Americans" had two choices: give in, or fight for freedom. Most settlers chose to take a stand and defend this nation against oppression and tyranny. The consequences were that blood was spilled and lives were lost. But America eventually became a free nation.

But, in a more important way, God didn't give up on His creation without a fight. God led His church into battle... the church where there is a message of hope found in Jesus Christ our Captain in this fight. We're called into battle to fight for the Kingdom of God. His desire is that all men and women come to know Him as Savior. His people have the privilege and responsibility to share His Gospel with our throughout neighbors the world. His Gospel is a message of salvation, where people are broken free from the chains of sin and death.

Just as the cost for any military campaign is great, Jesus said: "Greater love has no one than this, that he lay down his life for his friends." (John 15:3) Veterans for this fight are called to help. They know the battle. They were called for the fight to take on the enemy. The familiar hymn says, "Like a mighty army, moves the Church of God; Brothers, we are treading where the saints have trod. We are not divided, All one body we, One in hope and doctrine, one in charity. Onward Christian soldiers, marching as to war, with the cross of Jesus going on before."

Just as the veterans of American wars have a responsibility to our nation, we also have a responsibility and awesome privilege for the Kingdom of God. We're making a difference in the world through Christ. We have the honor and privilege to point people to Jesus Christ who, alone, can save people from eternal condemnation. But there's a fire-fight before our Champion comes to bring us to His glorious, victorious Kinadom.

We follow the call of Jesus when He calls us to be soldiers of the Gospel. St Paul writes, "But I think it is necessary to send back to you Epaphroditus, my brother, fellow worker and fellow soldier, who is also your messenger, whom you sent to take care of my needs." (Phil 2:25) Soldiers don't go out to the

battle field without a battle plan or the necessary armament. In the same way, soldiers in God's army will, "Endure hardship with us like a good soldier of Christ Jesus. No one serving as a soldier gets involved in civilian affairs – he wants to please his commanding officer." (II Tim 2:3-4) Our goal our purpose in battle, equipped by God's armor, is to do those things that are pleasing in His sight and led by His Spirit. Above all, God's Word promises us that He has already won this war.

Our American Commanderin-Chiefs have, for years, sent men and women to places like, Japan, Europe, others to Iraq, Vietnam, Afghanistan, Africa, Korea, and many other foreign lands. We may wonder if we have the perfect country or what may have happened to our veterans who faithfully and fearlessly served our country and sacrificed for our freedoms. Our faith remains in this nation led by faith in our almighty and eternal God. God calls us to go bravely into the world with the Gospel.

A few years ago, I visited Washington, D.C. and toured many of the monuments in our nation's capital. One monument was especially touching to me – the Wall of the Vietnam Memorial. Three close friends have their names carved into the jet black granite wall, indicating the ultimate sacrifice they gave to our country. Along with some 55,000 men and women who served, Johnny Silver (a high school classmate), Roger Maki (a college classmate), and Steve

Peterson (my college roommate) gave all they had for the cause of American freedom.

Yet, there is no memorial on Calvary Hill emblazoned with the name of Jesus. He died for a cause of freedom, but the greater and eternal freedom from sin, death, and evil... forever. Think of the mother's plea to her son who had just unwrapped the toy truck his father made for him, "Look up son, it's your father!" In honor

and thanksgiving, turn our eyes upward. God, our heavenly Father has given us every perfect gift and the special message of salvation in Christ Jesus. Yes, we remember veterans who have served our nation. And, we also remember those veterans of the cross in the Kingdom of God.

MISSION TRIP TO TANZANIA 2017

This year the mission team was sent to the Maswa District of the Southeast of Lake Victoria Diocese (SELVD). The Maswa district located north of Shinyanga, has a population of 344,125 people, and is served by five pastors who serve five congregations and 13 sub-congregations.

On our first Sunday in country, we were able to celebrate with members of the Lalago parish and with Bishop Emmanuel Makala, who consecrated the new Ephratha Lutheran Church building. This congregation was started as the result of earlier church plant/mission outreach to the area. On our last Sunday we worshiped at Budekwa, another new church that was planted two years ago after another mission outreach. Two other new church buildings were dedicated and the cornerstone laid in the villages of Mwanundi and Labago. These two sub-congregations were also started as the result of mission outreach activity two years earlier.

Sandwiched between worshiping at new church buildings and congregations we conducted mission/church outreach into the villages of Mwakidiga and Mbalagane, both are church plants of the Lalago parish. Mwakidiga located 45 minute

drive from Maswa, has no other churches. Our local evangelist Fredrick Jeremia and Pastor Tenga had been doing work in the area in preparation for the team visit. Our group of nine Americans partnered with a Tanzania pastor, interpreters, and local congregation members. We walked to homes with a 2 or 3-mile radius of the village to visit all who lived in the area and share the Gospel message.

The Good News that God the Creator sent His Son to earth for them. Paul tells us in Romans 1 For since the creation of the world God's invisible qualities—His eternal power and divine nature—have been clearly seen.

This is certainly true for the Sukuma tribe members we visit in Tanzania. They acknowledge there is a supreme creator they call Mulungu. They know that God created the heavens and the earth and all things in it.

But they believe that God is not accessible by them. The Sukuma people believe in ancestor worship and spirits. This means when someone dies they simply cease living in the flesh but continue in the spirit in a place closer to the creator God. They believe that God is accessible to them only through their ancestors, ghosts and witch doctors. So the



people try to seek power from their dead relatives, but the relationship with ancestors can bring the possibility of blessings and good fortune, but also misfortune, sickness, drought all depending upon how good the relationship they had with their ancestor.

They have no Savior to help them connect with God. Their only hope is for their deceased ancestor to put in a good word for them or purchasing an expensive charm from the witch doctor to help them. We tell them they are separated from God by sin and the Good News that God loves them and sent His one and only Son Jesus Christ to earth. Jesus lived a perfect life, but went to the cross taking the sins of each of us with Him. He died and rose from the grave a victor over death, hell, Satan, sin and all evil spirits. He paid the price so they could have access to God in heaven who reaches out His hand to us through Jesus Christ and says Karibu...welcome, come to Me all you who labor and are heavy laden I will give you rest. Jesus paid the price, they don't need to pay the witch doctor for expensive charms. Jesus paid it all.

As the result of church outreach activities during the week, 1263 souls were baptized in the Maswa District. Pastor Tenga, District Pastor Gyunda will have the responsibility for serving them.


The LCMS and Mid-South District were honored in their dedication on the plaque that resides in the school.
