But I was intent on making sure Good Shepherd had the best Christmas services we could - "pulling out all the stops!"

Christmas is important to Lutherans because it is all about Jesus. We champion the biblical teaching of "grace alone." The birth of Jesus signals that He came to earth to complete the work of our salvation. It is a high and holy celebration because our King and the one and only Savior of the world was born.

With increasing numbers of unchurched and unbelievers, Christmas is an opportunity we Christians can't miss. We want to raise questions in people's minds about the origin and meaning of Christmas. Why is this day, this season, so important to Christians? Why do they flock to churches? Is it just tradition to do so or is there something more? It is our opportunity in the worship services to show them there is a lot more!

How can we use the Christmas season to the greatest advantage in our desire to connect people to Jesus? I have four suggestions, but I am sure you can add to this list. (Why not email the Mid-South District with your ideas so they can be shared with all.) Here are mine:

INTRODUCE ADVENT CALENDARS

I've always liked the ones with a little chocolate behind each date. This is a great tool especially for children to anticipate Christmas that's linked to its true meaning. Lessons taught to children before the age of 7 are deeply ingrained and have staying power. Let's

Faith hosts mission conference

The attendees had the opportunity to "kick the tires" on the way they have approached evangelism.

With humor, Finke explained that we are not to be "Jesus sales people," taking the lead and forcing interactions. Jesus is already "messing" with people, trying to get their attention. He will place them in our paths, and it is up to us to recognize those situations so we can be good listeners and share kind words.

Finke encouraged attendees to think about their mission. Are we spending too much time creating church programs and activities instead of using our time caring for others? Are church activities providing opportunities for personal interactions with the individuals being helped?

Attendees learned how to begin the process of joining Jesus on His mission in their neighborhoods, workplaces, social circles and schools. Finke emphasized the importance of being intentional in getting to know others and their stories. The first step is to prav for them. Then take time to get to know them. Social events such as cookouts. ice cream socials, chili cook-offs and cookie exchanges are comfortable gatherings for conversations. The more conversations that occur, the more opportunities we have to develop strong, caring relationships, allowing us to join Jesus in the work He is already doing.

Finke has been a pastor for more than 22 years and resides in League City, Texas, with his wife, Susan. They founded Dwelling 1:14 in 2011 to help Jesus-followers become strong disciples by connecting with others in their neighborhoods, workplaces, social circles and schools. He is a popular non-denominational presenter for conferences and retreats, regularly speaks to seminary and university students, and has worked with pastors and leaders across the United States and Canada.

The Rev. Emmanuel Makala of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania (ELCT) visited Memphis in September to meet those in the Mid-South District who have been committed supporters of the South East of Lake Victoria Diocese, of which Makala serves as bishop. The ELCT is one of the largest Lutheran denominations in the world with more than 6.5 million members.

Among those Makala greeted during his visit were members of Christ the King, Memphis, who have been good friends to him and the diocese for many years.

During meetings in St. Louis, he was also able to meet with Mid-South District President Rev. Dr. Roger Paavola and others in the LCMS Council of Presidents. Makala and his companions talked about the challenges the ELCT is facing in managing its finances, and expressed a desire to learn from LCMS and the Lutheran Church
