## Is There Something to Share?

Back in the 70's, I took my turn at covering the emergency room in the small country hospital where I worked as its CEO. Early in the evening, a young man and his wife came in because he had rolled his car and wanted to be checked out. Fred - the physician on call that night - came in and examined the man, coming to the conclusion that he had fractured ribs and needed to be hospitalized to prevent any further damage to his

lungs and internal organs. "I'm alright," the man demanded, "just wrap up my chest, give me some pain medicine, and I'll go home. I hate hospitals!" Fred wasn't the most patient physician on my staff, but argued for a few times, arguing that it was dangerous for him to go home. But after requiring him to sign himself out against medical advice, Fred resigned himself to the fact that he couldn't convince the man about the gravity of his injury. About 24 hours later that same young man was brought in by ambulance - unconscious - because he had a collapsed lung.

"There's nothing wrong with me," is a dangerous thing to say. Yet, when we consider the spiritual things in our life, it's probably the worst thing to say. For a person to stand in front of God and say, "There's nothing wrong with me," is to say the opposite of what Scripture says about us and is, therefore, unacceptable to God. The Bible tells us that in the case of the unregenerate soul, *everything* is wrong with us! Yet, as Christians we can truly say that Jesus Christ has overcome all our sins. He has taken away everything that is wrong with all people. Some just don't accept the gift He offers! We begin Lent on Ash Wednesday - which just happens to be St Valentine's Day. It's going to culminate on April First - when the rest of the world celebrates April Fools Day. Isn't it great that we have these "bookends" to tell others about what Jesus came to offer to the world?

Jesus tells a parable about two men - one who is confident and self-righteous, who looked down on everyone else; and another man too much aware of his short comings to even lift his eyes to heaven. *"Two men went up to the Temple to pray,"* Jesus tells, *"a Pharisee and a tax collector."* Remember, Pharisees were people confident in their faith, who lived clean lives. They didn't want to bother with sinners who resided outside of their tight little circles.

Tax collectors, on the other hand, were known to have swindled people and intimidated others into paying more than was expected. Both came to church. The Pharisee stood up and prayed about himself, *"God, I thank you that I am not like other men - robbers, evildoers, adulterers - or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week and give a tenth of all I get."* Perhaps we can sum up his prayer like this: "God, just look! There's nothing wrong with me!"

He was a good citizen. He obeyed the laws, lived a moral and upright life (and was willing to tell everyone about it, and point an accusing finger at those who didn't match up to his standards). From all outside appearances, there really wasn't much wrong with him - at least in humanitarian terms. But, then Jesus focused on the tax collector. He may have stolen money from people using the system. He ruined other people's lives. His life was an external disaster and deserved earthly and eternal punishment. "The tax collector stood at a distance. He would not even look up to heaven, but beat his breast and said, 'God, have mercy on me, a sinner.<sup>77</sup> He was ashamed of what he was and what he did. We can sum up his prayer, "You don't need to look, God. Everything wrong with me!"

But, Jesus says the tax collector is the one forgiven by God. Jesus explains, "For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted." The Pharisee exalted himself, while the tax collector was exalted by God. But, is Jesus saying that you earn the forgiveness of sins by being humble? "The tax collector deserves forgiveness because he is so humble." Is that how it really works? No, that's the way a lot of people think, but it's not the way God's mercy works. If that's the way it works, then our whole salvation would be dependent on us and our attitude. No one would ever be sure if they were forgiven by God or not. No one would ever know if their humility was sincere enough or not. The truth is, however, that neither the Pharisee nor the tax collector deserved God's forgiveness. The Pharisee didn't deserve it because he was self-righteous! The tax collector didn't deserve it because he was a horrible sinner.

No, the truth is that forgiveness is offered by God out of His grace and mercy. God forgives people because of His grace through Jesus Christ. Because of the sacrifice Jesus made on the cross, taking away the sins of all the world, God offers forgiveness to all the world, for every generation. That's true love. God offered forgiveness to both men, but only the tax collector received God's forgiveness, because God forgives those who confess their sin, rather than those who wish to stand on their own "goodness" before God. Those who confess their sinfulness and plead for God's mercy recognize their need for God's help - not because they earn it, not because they're groveling, but because God shows undeserved love (grace) to all who humble themselves to God.

The tax collector is the picture of Lent. The Pharisee is the opposite. Will we plan to observe Lent this year by acting in extra religious piety? "Maybe I will give up something for Lent - my favorite food, watching my favorite TV show, or give up eating chocolate. Look how religious I am, God." But, is Lent about self-denial and abstinence from chocolate? Lent isn't about chocolates and TV. Jesus is concerned about what's churning around in our hearts. Lent is a time to turn from the sin that stains our lives more than chocolate stains our favorite shirt or blouse. Lent is a time to give up the sin of hypocrisy - only acting like Christians on the

outside, but being self-righteous on the inside. Lent is a time to give up the sin of duplicity being a Christian on Sundays but living like an unbeliever Monday through Saturday.

Lent is that man who stood at the back of the Temple, looking only at the ground and praying, "God have mercy on me, a sinner." Lent is our time to ask God to forgive us, to wash away our sins and to empower us by His Holy Spirit to turn away from our sinful past and live new lives dedicated to Him. In Lent we lay our sins at the foot of the old rugged cross and there realize the great act of love Jesus did for us. We can walk away, knowing that we've been forgiven by God out of His grace and mercy - washed clean in the blood of the Lamb. It's all about God.

Maybe that's why the early Christian Church began its observation of Lent - giving us seven weeks to not only look deep inside our hearts, but having a special time to share this great treasure with those who have no hope... out there. Jesus promises that by the Holy Spirit, others may to be enlivened to live a new life in Him as well.

If people want to give up something for Lent as a sign of love for Jesus, that's OK. But, let's give up our fear of telling others of what it is Jesus has done for us, *"To declare the excellencies of Him who has called us out of darkness into His marvelous Light."* (I Peter 2) At the cross, we will see how wonderful and deep our Savior's love is for us. Our Christian joy doesn't end at the cross, but at an empty tomb, where Jesus rose from the dead to prove God's satisfaction in Christ's sacrifice was fulfilled, and that, just as Christ rose from the dead, we too shall rise to the glory of His holy name. May God bless us on this Lenten journey, and in our Christian witness, knowing that in Christ, we're truly forgiven and made heir - and co-heirs with Christ of a glorious and eternal kingdom.

## **Mission Team Prepares for Trip to Tanzania in May 2018**

Twenty-four representatives from the Mid-South District are preparing for a mission trip to Tanzania in May.

The first group of 10 (team 1) will be leaving Memphis on May 19th and the 2nd group of 14 will be departing on May 31.

Each group will fly into Kilimanjaro Airport and then board a smaller plane to Mwanza. From there they will drive to Shinyanga, where the headquarters of the Southeast of Lake Victoria Diocese of the Lutheran Church of Tanzania is located.

Team 1 will drive to a remote location and conduct an outreach to villages known as Ulowa. Team 2 will be going to a remote location north and east of Shinyanga to a new district whose only exposure to the Gospel was in 2015.

Please keep the teams in your prayers as they prepare for this mission experience.
