## Message from Rev. Dr. Roger Paavola, President



The famous author, Zig Ziglar wrote a story about a situation that happened in the Great Smoky Mountains decades ago. Some hogs escaped from a farmer's pen. Over the years, the hogs became more and more wild. They were a menace, eating up gardens and threatening children, pets, and livestock. Hunting was unsuccessful. The feral hogs flourished in the unlimited environment of the Smoky Mountains. One day an old farmer went to park officials saying he'd get rid of the hogs. The park officials doubted him but let him proceed. With a few of sacks of grain and some lumber, he went to a clearing near where the hogs congregated to eat. He put out a few handfuls of grain. At first, the hogs were hesitant, but eventually ate the grain. The next day he laid a plank next to the grain. The hogs were hesitant, but eventually ate the grain. He repeated the process with posts, a few rails lying next to the grain. Each time the hogs hesitated, but eventually ate the grain. Each time he added something, the hogs hesitated, but came back to get "something for nothing." It took time but, the temptation of a "free lunch" captured the whole herd.

The hogs became dependent on someone else to give them food. Is the same true for human beings? But, this isn't about capturing pigs. It's about our youth and young people. According to a recent report in The Huffington Post, it hasn't been a good time for America's young. The study shows American education needs an overhaul. There's a huge rise in the number college-age suicides, finding jobs is challenging, and marriage and birth rates are decreasing compared to past generations. The family structure is getting weaker. The number of high school dropouts is making America the best half-educated country in the world. According to the College Board, 857 students drop out of high school in the U.S. every single hour.<sup>1</sup>

Public school success was questioned. Just last September, high school graduates scored a four-decade low in reading on the SAT's. The Pew Research Center found that in 2011, less than half of U.S. adults were married. The birth rate fell to its lowest level since the earliest year of reliable statistics, 1920. The confusion escalated when a perplexing case, like that of Rachel Canning, an 18-year old teen, sued her parents for private school, college tuition and living expenses. The case is a tragic example of a family where communication has collapsed and animosity has replaced needed family foundations. On the surface, her case should have been a private matter. Why did it receive so much attention?

The answer lies within a misunderstanding of basic family values and an older generation that resists how "entitled" youth appear to be. David Finkelhor coined a phrase, juvenoia - the fear of juveniles by older adults<sup>2</sup>. Juvenoia is manifest in a multitude of ways, including the belief that today's youth are worse behaved than ever before, despite much evidence to the contrary. Many older adults continue to think that youth violence is the worst ever, despite the fact that it stands now at only about 12% of what it was in the 80's and 90's. But in the current case, many comments have focused on how "entitled" Rachel Canning is, implying that this is part of a greater trend in the current generation of youth.

The parallel studies show a precipitous decline in family values and the decline in

church affiliation. The staggering results of these trends cannot be ignored.

At the same time, family life is changing. Two-parent households are on the decline as divorce, remarriage, and cohabitation are on the rise. Families are smaller now, both due to the growth of single-parent households and lower birth rates. Not only are we having fewer babies, but circumstances surrounding parenthood have changed. In the early 1960s, babies typically arrived within a marriage. Today fully four-in-ten births are within single parent or non-marital partners. Family structures have transformed. The role of mothers in the workplace and in the home saw more women in the labor force, becoming breadwinners; in many cases, *primary breadwinners*.

As a result, there is no longer a traditional family form. Today's parents raise their children against a backdrop of increasingly diverse and constantly evolving family forms. In 1960, the height of the post-World War II baby boom, the dominant family form was where 73% of children lived in a family with two married parents. By 1980, only 61% of children lived in this type of family. Today less than half (46%) are. The declining percentage of children living in a "traditional" family has been largely replaced by a majority of children living with single or cohabiting parents.<sup>4</sup>

Jesus calls Himself the Bread of Life – Bread He gives for us to eat and live forever. When the crowds asked for this "free bread" Jesus didn't rebuke them for their shortsightedness. He said, "...to work for bread that does not spoil."

In response, the crowds ask, "What must we do to accomplish the work God requires?" Their Old Adam kicked in. They thought there's something we can do or have to do to please God, to accomplish His will, and to develop our relationship to Him. Our obedience doesn't earn a place in His eternal kingdom. Only Christ's cross and His victorious resurrection are acceptable to God for our redemption.

God is the source of life. The Bread Jesus spoke of isn't ground flour. It's the Person of Christ and His means of grace. "No man can come to Me unless My Father draws him. And I will raise him up at the last day, for whoever eats of My flesh and drinks of My blood, has eternal life; and I will raise him up on the Last Day." (John 6, ESV) That's a promise no other person can make. No other bread can offer us life eternal. Jesus said, "The work of God is this: To believe in the One He has sent." Not too tough, right? So, why is it so difficult to accomplish? Why is the next generation falling away?

Jesus told the people His flesh is real food and His blood is real drink. The crowd didn't mistake this as being something symbolic. They left Him in disgust! They left Him - the Son of God who came to save us and give us life by dying on the cross - beyond our human logic. Faith, isn't logic or reason. Pure, child-like faith receives the means to receive this Bread of Life - Jesus Christ. This Spirit-given faith journey begins in the home - a family gathered together around God's Word, and His nurturing in the Church entrusted with His unending grace. For those who rely on the handful of "grain" offered by a secular world, "There is no free lunch." Getting drawn into something that sounds too good to be true is probably too good to be true.

"Why aren't we able to have more young people?" is heard in nearly every congregation. Who's feeding our young people? What's trapped a whole generation to becoming "fenced in" by secular temptations? Is the world becoming progressively more and more



The Mid-South District in partnership with Concordia Center for the Family – Ann Arbor and The Family Friendly Partnership Network are excited to begin this ministry paradigm shift – a shift which includes every generation

living today, our parents, ourselves, our children, their children, to the next generation and beyond. This initiative will change the very DNA of how we live out our faith and encourage others to do so – beginning in our homes.

Why Generation to Generation now? Look at the following data concerning each generation in America that has an authentic relationship with Jesus Christ. As you look at the percentages, consider the Christian faith of the parents in each generation declining...

Builders born before 1945: 60% Boomers born between 1946 and 1965: 40% GenXers born between 1966-1985: 25% Millennials born between 1986 and 2005: 4-6 %

Facts: One third of the world's population is 15 and under.

Many parents today believe that attending church once per month is regular attendance.


The main influencers of a child's faith are close family members and friends. Children may or may not be raised by their parents. Grandparents are often stepping into parental roles, raising their grandchildren while continuing to raise their adult children.

Many parents today do not understand their responsibility in passing their faith to their children.

The likelihood that a young adult will remain faithful to church and the faith after graduation if the only influence comes from the church is 25%...if from faith shared in the HOME, that number increases to 81%.

Generation to Generation will help the church move from the Institutional View of ministry (church asks homes and families to support and give to the church to build the organization) to

the Biblical View (church intentionally forms their community of faith by partnering with the home and intentionally



Generation to Generation equips those who are in non-nuclear families, gets real and honest about human sexuality, helps people learn to manage the resources God has given them, and helps families with members in the later years. With the help of God, we will shift the function of the church, going from church centered/home supported ministry to home centered/church supported ministry.

Who is participating in Generation to Generation now?

Two BETA groups were selected by our District Pilot Team to represent a variety of churches small, larger, rural, urban, school, preschool, dual parish, etc. - across the district. Ten congregations were recruited in the West Region, seven began Orientation in Conway month. Included in West Region: Bella Vista Lutheran Church, Bella Vista; Salem Lutheran Ministries, Springdale; Peace Lutheran Church, Conway; Redeemer Lutheran Church, Mountain Home; Pilgrim Lutheran Church, Jonesboro; St. John's Lutheran Church, Lafe; and Christ the King Lutheran Church, Memphis.

Over 60 people from those congregations gathered with Professor Ben Freudenburg for the first of seven training seminars. Each

congregation signed a two-year commitment.

Churches across the world have recognized the importance and urgency to reach out to others with the Good News of Jesus Christ. However, families are struggling to reach out to their own children and loved ones with that same Good News. It is not too late - the time is now. Generation to Generation will equip and encourage families through these ever-changing times to become the faith influencers in their own homes, in their schools, their workplace, the community and the world.

Her one blue uniform is sitting out as she and her sister dress for school before beginning their two-hour walk with their dad. Her favorite part of the day is lunch, because food isn't so plentiful in her meager home.

So what is a typical day like for a child in Haiti? Let's follow this precious child of God as she is hears those faithful Words resonate throughout her day. Wimily attends Lauture in Jacmel, Haiti, where she is in the first grade. Today they are sharing the story of Joshua when God told him, "Be strong and courageous. Do not be frightened, and do not be dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go," (Joshua 1:9). This is Wimily's favorite story. She may not understand the whole story, but she understands

being frightened, not knowing when she'll eat again, and being discouraged as she trudges the two-hours between her home and school each day. Yet she is encouraged to know that God is with her even at her young age.

Shortly after math, the class lined up outside near the water bucket to wash their hands. Excitement came all over her, because she knew what was coming next – lunch! She hasn't had anything to eat since lunch yesterday and her stomach is rumbling with hunger pains. After standing and singing the prayer with her classmates, she enjoyed her favorite corn and beans with amazing sauce. This one bowl of food was the only food she would get until

Early in the afternoon Wimily, her sister, and

three other friends began their walk home singing and skipping with joy in their hearts. So happy to arrive home and change out of her only beloved school uniform and back into her play clothes. But first she had to be sure her

uniform was clean enough for the next day and help her sister wash the family's clothes in the creek.

While she is at the creek, they decide to bathe before heading home with water for their home. It has been a busy day. She will need to study before the sun sets, and then sleep on the wooden floor with her family in their one-room, simple home.

Wimily's school days don't vary much, but she smiles enthusiastically as she tells her dad about all she has learned. She and her sister say their prayers with their family and thank God for all He has given them, especially their hot nutritious meal each day at school.

### Concordia College Alabama to Close

It is with heavy hearts and deep regret the Board of Regents announced that after 95 years of fulfilling the dream of Rosa J. Young, Concordia College Alabama (CCA) will close its doors at the end of the spring semester 2018. No new students will be admitted after the current semester which began January 8th.

"The Board of Regents deeply appreciates the work of the faculty, staff, and others who have worked tirelessly, and at personal sacrifice, to keep Concordia College Alabama viable.
