#### May's Focus: Small Town & Rural Ministry

With this issue of the Encourager, we give thanks for the many ministries in the Mid-South District that serve small congregations and rural communities. We lift these congregations up are grateful for the many ways they serve their communities by sharing Christ's love.

### Message from Rev. Dr. Roger Paavola, President



Rural and Small Congregation Ministries have a huge advantage: They know their community! But, there may be things that stand in the way of that advantage. Hans Christian Andersen wrote the story "The Ugly Duckling." It told about a strange-looking bird raised by a duck, looking for other creatures who would befriend him. Not until the ugly duckling grew up as a swan did the ducks realize how beautiful the Ugly Duckling could be.

We can be in the middle of the busiest city in the world, scanning the endless expanse of an Arkansas rice field, or take in the vista of our many mountainscapes, yet a person can be lonely. "Three Dog Night" sang a song years ago called, "One is the loneliest number that you'll ever do..." But, we're not wimps! We don't have some strange flaw in our human character. God said, "It is not good for man to be alone. I will make a companion for him." God created us as creatures of community. When God said, "Let us make man in our image, in our likeness, and let them rule over the fish of the sea and the birds of the air, over the livestock, over all the earth, and over all the creatures that move along the ground," He's talking to us. The Triune God created birds, fish, animals, reptiles, and bugs with companions. But Adam was all alone in a chirping, buzzing, whirring, busy world. God said, "It's not good..."

We each have a built in need for deep, satisfying relationships within the human community. There are times when we deny that functional need and hide from it. Harvard's Dr. Robert Putnam studied over 29,000 communities around the nation to discover the basic needs of basic fellowship. He found that the vast majority of people today don't volunteer, join clubs, know

their neighbors, or trust each other. Our nation is becoming more isolated, alienated, crime-ridden and increasingly unhappy. People's participation in bowling leagues, clubs, church, social groups, and other venues has dropped to a dramatic all-time low. His study shows Americans stockpile their "social capital" because trust, cooperation, and working collegially is going bankrupt. According to Dr. Putnam, what the people said is: Computers, TV, longer work hours, the rise of the two income family problem, and ethnic diversity make almost two-thirds of the people say they would take a pet or a computer along with them if they were stranded on a desert island, rather than a family member or a friend!

But, we need each other! Thinking otherwise robs us of the fullness of what God designed within us. Like any battle or war, the only way to combat this growing isolation is to go on the offensive. Unless we have a caring

for someone else, there is no foundation to build the kind of relationships God created in us. So, according to Putnam's study, a church is the best place for the building of a relationship that makes for lasting friendships. It's the one social organization where people look for incarnational interaction. Unfortunately, the disease of isolation has crept into the church as well.

Dr. Richard Bliese, a theologian in the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) spent ten years studying the trends of church attendance, trying to figure out their plummeting drop in church membership and attendance. He laments that all the things their body did to try "modernize" the church and its doctrines has done *just the opposite* of what was hoped. As a result, their entertaining, high energy contemporary worship watered down worship, sin and forgiveness aren't mentioned anymore, and the social Gospel left Christ's atonement and resurrection far back in the field of things in their sermons.

The three Persons of the Holy Trinity are indivisible, unchangeable, immutable, eternal, and perfect. God gave us this strength to hold our human relationships together. Another survey, conducted in our own area by Lutheran Hour Ministries, discovered that there are over 30% of our neighbors, classmates, or co-workers (maybe a friend) who are unchurched. One of every three people we know do not have a place where they can begin to build a meaningful relationship like the one Dr. Putnam uncovered that exists even in our smallest congregations.

We all have an opportunity to bring a friend, neighbor, or relative to worship to hear the proclamation of God's Word. There are a number of reasons we hear why others won't bring new acquaintances to worship. "I don't want to!" "I am afraid to talk religion with my friends." "If they want to come, they know where we are." "I don't want to bother." "I'm just too busy." Or, there's the other one we've heard lately, "I don't want this church to grow."

What are we doing for the Great Commission: "Go, therefore, and make disciples, teaching them all that I have given you..."? Are we so unfamiliar with our Bible and Confessions

that we'd rather not be asked some tough questions? Do we think we have too many things to do already? Read the first chapters of the Book of Acts. We see there were eleven men in Jerusalem when this Holy Christian Church was in its infancy. After the Holy Spirit came to them on Pentecost, and because they were following Christ's instructions, thousands of people were converted to Christianity. They may have been like many modern churches that say, "We better wait here for a while, because we have too much to do here." But, they didn't.

From Jerusalem they traveled to Samaria, Judea and all the known nations of the world to enlarge the Church. Why? Because the Church is the means by which God brings His blessings, grace, mercy,

and promise of eternal life where the people are gathered together!

We must continue to support (and grow where the Lord enables us) and grow our rural and small congregations' ministries. We need them where our Lutheran "footprint" can be preserved and enhanced. Who would benefit if we do NOT go about the work Jesus gave to His Holy Christian Church? Let it never be said, "You never even tried!" Instead, let us all hear, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant. Come and enter the kingdom that has been prepared for you." May God continue to bless and keep our Rural and Small Town Ministries of our Mid-South District.



#### **Redefining the Graying Church:**

#### The Mission Field of Older Adults

The rural and small-town churches in America are poised to become the spiritual renewal center for older adult ministries. How's that for a challenging goal and opportunity for each of us in the years ahead? Jeremiah 29:11 says it so well: "For I know the plans I have for you ... plans for welfare and not for evil, to give you a future and a hope."



The reality is that the Lord is allowing us to live longer in order to bring His hope of love, peace and forgiveness in Christ to more people! There are more people over 65 years old on this earth now than ever before. Over 10,000 of us are turning 65 today, and this includes many of us in rural and small communities. Rural and small-town congregations are in the position to be leaders to help people of all ages celebrate God's gift of aging, if — and this is the challenge — if our congregations are willing to change the climate of how our society perceives growing older.

It is time that we, the Church, become more intentional about enabling people to see aging as a blessing to celebrate rather than a burden to endure! God's people do not need to "get over it." We need to "get on with it" as we celebrate and serve people of all ages! The new frontier for the Church is longevity, and longevity is getting longer all the time. Where else but in rural America is the best place to make this statement to the whole Church, as the rural/small-town churches around us become a spiritual renewal center for older adults, and at the same time, for those of all ages as well?

Rural and small communities are aging. Metropolitan areas are generally getting younger. Rural and small-town congregations are being positioned by the Lord to serve as renewal centers as they equip and model how God's people of all ages care for people, love people, serve people and pray for people throughout the U.S. and the world! Pastor Brad Roth, author of *God's Country: Faith, Hope, and the Future of the Rural Church* says, "Leaders in the early monastic movement envisioned their monasteries as special houses of prayer sustaining the global church. They went out into the country not as a flight but as a vocation — to pray on behalf of the city."

Our rural and small-town churches can be laboratories for all generations by teaching and modeling what the Church is all about! They can model preaching, teaching, serving and relating to people of all ages, at home, school and in the community. They can teach parents to teach their children the Word of the Lord. They can unite people, young and old, as people of all ages worship and receive the Sacraments together. They can model that families are called to care for one another and to bring generations together again in the common bond of unity in Christ Jesus. They can once again connect people of all ages to come together and complete the ministry God has created for them to do! Are we ready, rural and small-town congregations? Are we ready to reunite God's people of all ages as we serve, care and celebrate together? Are we ready to see aging as a "natural resource" that is a gift

Maybe, just maybe, becoming a spiritual renewal center of prayer and teaching for the younger and for the older, locally and throughout the world, is our hope and our future in the Lord!

The mission of Trinity Hope is feed the children, the teachers and the cooks in Haiti. Other Christian organizations support and run some of the schools while others are self supported. All schools help support their feeding program!


## **Mission Trip April 2018**
