Message from Rev. Dr. Roger Paavola, *President*



God in Flesh made Manifest

One year for my birthday, Pat got me the 8-volume collection of the works of Martin Chemnitz. Sound exciting? Well, maybe not! But one of the books is an 800-page work called, *The Two Natures of Christ*. It's Chemnitz's response to the efforts of people around the time of the Reformation who tried to downgrade the Person of Christ. The heresy suggested that, as a Man, Christ Jesus was eternally doomed to be a "localized" human body; that is, since Jesus took on human flesh, He couldn't retain all the attributes of God. For example,

because Jesus ascended into heaven after His Resurrection from the dead, they suggest He was "stuck" here and couldn't exist in His omnipresence as He did prior to the Incarnation. It's the same explanation (or excuse) for those who suggested that the real presence of Jesus in the Eucharist was (at least to them) impossible. Logically, they would posit, Christ's real presence in the Lord's Supper is impossible. But, for us Christians, God in Christ, it's a divine reality and mystery beyond human logic.

Our Christian friends who deny Christ's true presence in the Divine Supper, of course, may have logic on their side, as did the skeptics in Capernaum who asked, "How can this Man give us His flesh to eat?" But, Jesus declared, "This food is My flesh, which I will give for the life of the world." *The doubters of Christ's Word were prevalent back then and are in abundance even today. But, Jesus said, "I tell you the truth, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink of His blood, you have no life in you. Whoever eats My flesh and drinks My blood has*

eternal life and I will raise him up on the Last Day. For My flesh is real food and My blood is real drink."

This encounter between logic and a divine mystery hit its apex when St John recorded these words: *"On hearing this, many of His disciples said, 'This is a hard saying. Who can accept it?' Aware that His disciples were grumbling about this, Jesus said to them, 'Does this offend you? Then from this time many of His followers turned back and no longer followed Him."* Do we understand HOW Jesus gives His body and blood to eat and drink? No. But, do we understand WHY He gives us His body and blood in communion? Jesus tells us why: *"Whoever eats My flesh and drinks My blood has eternal life and I will raise him up on the Last Day."*

Why is this Supper so important to us? And what does it have to do with Christmas? It's because this is precisely the point at which true Biblical Christianity departs from false teachings and all man-made religions. The most profoundly alarming verse in all of Scripture appears in the Gospel of St John 6:66 - - *"Then from this time many of His followers turned back and no longer followed Him."* Does he imply that if one can't fully embrace Christ and all He says as divine truth, that they no longer follow Him... completely... and by faith?

We can't explain how Jesus gives us His true body and blood in the Lord's Supper. But we do understand why: That we may have eternal life. We believe Jesus Christ alone gives us forgiveness of sins that brings us to life eternal, by God's grace alone that we receive by faith alone, as revealed in His Word alone. What part of His Word is untrue? None of it! What part can we throw away because it doesn't jibe with logic? None of it! Can we really follow Him if we throw away some of the things He said just because we can't explain HOW He does them? No!

So, what does this question have to do with Christmas? Plenty! From the very beginning of Christianity, there were skeptics about what Jesus said in John 6. It became a major sticking point between Martin Luther and others within the

Reformation. But, as we dig deep into the theology of Christmas – the Word Incarnate – we find evidence of the horrible error and departures of these skeptics from Biblical doctrine. John's Gospel begins with the words: *"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through Him, all things were made; without Him nothing was made that has been made. In Him was life, and that life was the Light of men. The Light shines in the darkness, but the darkness has not understood it."*

Christ's birth is the fulfillment of all Old Testament prophecies. Jesus is the Word: *"The Word became flesh and made His dwelling among us. We have seen His glory, the glory of the One and only who came from the Father, full of grace and truth."* How did that happen? We don't know HOW. WHY did this happen? Scripture answers that too: *In Him was life, and that life was the Light of men.* There is no life outside of Jesus Christ. WHEN did all this happen? From before the very beginning, before time and creation, God foreknew He'd bring life and salvation to this world. The pre-incarnate Christ existed before creation. But, we also know He appeared many times before God's people. Moses encountered Him in a burning bush. He appeared to the Israelites as a pillar of smoke by day and a pillar of fire by night in Exodus. He appeared to Abraham to bless him with the announcement of the birth of Isaac. He gave living water to the Israelites from a solid rock along their Exodus; and that rock was Christ.

These are a few of the manifestations – *Shekinah* – of the pre-Incarnate Christ. But, what does these have to do with Christmas? When did the Word become flesh incarnate? It wasn't in fire, smoke, a Traveler, or a Rock. When Almighty God humbled Himself to assume human flesh, He fulfilled the prophecies of the coming Messiah to be our Savior. We boldly confess that truth in our Christian Creeds; "I believe...in one Lord, Jesus Christ, begotten of the Father before all worlds... **begotten, not made, being of one substance with the Father,** by whom all things were made, who for us men and

for our salvation *came down from heaven and was incarnate by the Holy Spirit of the virgin Mary, and was made Man...*" The Apostolic Creed succinctly says, "I believe... in Jesus Christ...who **was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary...**"


WHEN did the eternal Christ become Man? When He Himself assumed human flesh – (the Incarnation) – simply meaning to put on human flesh. That happened precisely at the instant of His conception by the Holy Spirit. God was Himself - a tiny living incarnation within the womb of His human mother, Mary. His humiliation laid aside His almighty powers in order to become our Savior. Yet, He was, is, and always will be fully Almighty and eternal God. If this Divine reality and mystery weren't true, there'd be a point in time where the Christ was NOT God. If He wasn't fully God, or was made into God at a later time, He would've been mere un-divine humanity - an inheritor of original sin by a human birth. And we'd be doomed because no perfect life would be yet offered as an atonement for our sins.

God's Word brings us by His divine omnipresence to the foot of the cross where our many sins were washed away. His Word brings us to the empty tomb to witness the Resurrection of God in flesh made alive, signaling the justification of all human flesh joined together in Christ Jesus by His means of grace, where His Word brings us back to our Baptismal covenant, to enjoin us in Christ's righteousness. His Word brings us to receive the living Christ in the Supper, that we may receive the forgiveness of sins and strengthening of our faith toward life everlasting. After hearing Jesus say His flesh is real food and His blood is real drink, and people began walking away, He asked His disciples, "Do you want to

leave Me too?" Simon Peter answered Him, "Lord to whom shall we go? You have the Words of Eternal life. We believe and know that You are the Holy One of God."

Christmas blows away all reason and human logic and lets us rest in the divine mystery of God's grace. Christmas brings us a real God who still comes to us by real means – bread, wine, water and the Word, and pronouncement of God's absolute forgiveness of our sins for the sake of Jesus our Christ. St John concludes, "No one has ever seen God; the only God, who is at the Father's side, He has made Him, our God, known to us through Christ." May He grant you a blessed Christmas to you and yours.

Lutheran World Relief CARE-VAN 2018



At this year's Lutheran World Relief CARE-VAN ingathering the Mid-South District had seven drop sites Nov. 2nd – 3rd collecting handmade quilts, school kits, personal care kits, baby care kits, fabric kits and boxes of soap. Our drop sites included Christus Victor, Knoxville, TN.; Cross of Christ, Chattanooga, TN.; Emmanuel, Hermitage, TN.; Immanuel, Memphis, TN.; First, Fort Smith, AR.; Grace, Little Rock, AR.; and Salem, Springdale, AR.

At the time of this report (11/15/2018), the top four quilt-producing congregations that dropped off their work at an LWR CARE-VAN ingathering site were Cross of Christ, Chattanooga, TN (111 quilts), Faith, Hot Springs Village, AR (103 quilts), First, Chattanooga, TN (100 quilts) and St. Paul, Wartburg, TN (100 quilts). A total of 1,096 quilts were donated by our Mid-South District churches.

To date we had 37 congregations participate (3 ELCA), collecting over \$3,081 for shipping costs. We also collected 928 personal care kits, 95 fabric kits, 727 school kits, 93 baby care kits and 29 boxes of soap. The CARE-VAN loaded up with 414 boxes (weighing approximately 8,564 pounds!) of offerings from District congregations for Lutheran World Relief. Way to go Mid-South District!

Many of the congregations' efforts are coordinated by LWML groups and longstanding quilting groups in the congregations. They participate in this effort to share the love of Christ in a personal way. The tireless efforts of those who share their talents and the generous contributions of many make this a successful ingathering. Thank you to all who participated in this year's annual LWR CARE-VAN drive!

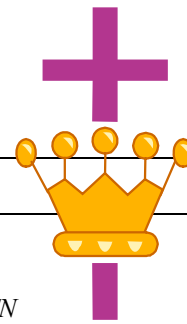
