Message from Rev. Dr. Roger Paavola, President



ennifer Sinclair, a principal in the Elkton, Nebraska school district recently ordered all the candy canes in the school to be removed because they were offensive. She banned singing Christmas carols and decoration of any kind that are red or green. Her reason? Red and green are the colors associated with Christians Christmas; candy canes are shaped like the letter "J" – reminding the person about Jesus, and they're red and white, which she reasoned reminded the person eating the candy cane of the blood Jesus shed for the sins of the world, and the white (she said) the symbol of Christ's resurrection. Bah humbug?!

It's safe to say that she was a little misinformed about Christmas and probably heard something about the candy canes when she was listening to a children's sermon (sort of!). There's changes happening in the world around

us. St. Paul already said that the story of Jesus was going to be offensive, so we shouldn't be surprised. He wrote, "For the word of the cross is folly to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God. For it is written, "I will destroy the wisdom of the wise, and the discernment of the discerning I will thwart." Where is the one who is wise? Where is the scribe? Where is the debater of this aae? Has not God made foolish the wisdom of the world? For since, in the wisdom of God, the world did not know God through wisdom, it pleased God through the folly of what we preach to save those who believe. For Jews demand signs and Greeks seek wisdom, but we preach Christ crucified, a stumbling block to Jews and folly to Gentiles, but to those who are called, both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God. For the foolishness of God is wiser than men, and the weakness of God is stronger than men."(I Corinthians 1:18-25, ESV)

Think about it, outside the sweet embrace of the Christian Church, things change. Things change and we may not even realize it. For example, think about something as common as food. The food we eat is very different from the food people ate generations ago. Our food is genetically modified. Chemicals protect the seeds and ingredients from bugs, disease, and decay with pesticides and chemicals. Leave a loaf of bread out for a few days and watch what happens: Fresh bread we bake at home starts to turn green and fuzzy within a few days. But, not the bread you grab from the grocery store shelf. Some will argue that this is good, but others argue that it's not all that good. The fact remains that things in this world are always changing, and we might not always be aware of what's going on around us.

The Bible even says that we're always changing. Not just in the way we look, or the way we dress, but in our soul, and our inner being. Our level of trust in God, our level of hope from the forgiveness of sins, our level of desire to serve God – these things are always changing inside of us, sometimes for the good, and sometimes for the "not so good." We're like clay - something very malleable. God is the one who changes us for good.

Christian education reminds us of the special way God shapes and changes us, and especially young lives through the power of his Word in Christian education. He is the Potter. We're clay in His hands. Scripture talks God dealing with Israel, who had been very faithful to God, hearing His Word and living according to it. But as a nation they began to fall away. Isaiah wrote: "All of us have become like one who is unclean, and all our righteous acts are like filthy rags. We all shrivel up like a leaf, and like the wind our sins sweep us away." (Isaiah 64:6) The people changed for the worse. But, God never changes.

What happened? Instead of staying in God's Word, allowing God to shape them, they pushed His Word away. A sinful world shaped them instead: Idol worship, materialism, immorality, selfishness. But, the same thing can happen to us if we ignore the Word of God and let a sinful culture shape us. Sadly, the same thing often happens to our Lutheran youth. For a few years, grade school students spend time in the Word in confirmation classes. God is the potter. He shapes those students. Then the students are confirmed. Some data shows that within five years, two-thirds of those students lose their connection to God and His Church. Materialism, immorality, selfishness take over and shape the young. Without even realizing it, they've changed,



2018-2019 marks the 25th anniversary for Heavenly Host Lutheran in Cookeville, Tennessee, and we celebrated in grand fashion at the end of September. Three events were rolled into one exhilarating weekend. The Eagle Run/Grandparents' Day kicked off Friday morning's activities on 9/28, and Heavenly Host Lutheran Church held its annual Oktoberfest on 9/29.

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Perhaps the most interesting innovation to Heavenly Host this year isn't a student information system, iXL, or Google Classroom. It might be our new GaGa Pit, in which students love to play GaGa Ball. The construction lasted one morning, but the memories will endure. and not for the good. It's not for a lack of training, but because of the influence of the world.

Yet, Isaiah records what he asks of God, "Do not remember our sins forever." Our Father looks down from heaven, and doesn't want us to be covered within the filth of sin. God reaches down from heaven and re-shapes us. He uses His law to cut away at our sin. Just like that first century potter who would dig clay out of the ground, and remove all the rocks and sticks that were stuck in that clay. Sometimes the potter stomps on the clay, pushing it through little holes in order to remove impurities.

But, by the same token, the blood of Jesus, His Son, purifies us from all sin. Our Heavenly Father removes our sins through the merits of the sacrifice of His Son Jesus. He does "not remember our sins forever" because of His undeserved love in Christ Jesus. God, the Potter, takes our clay, purifies, and begins to shape us. The Potter has a plan for each of us.

Who is shaping our children? Who is the future of our church? The average school student will be away from home at high school from 7:30 until 3:30 – provided they aren't involved in some extracurricular activities that keep them until 5:30 or later. Sporting event or concerts in the evening could mean they're gone until 9:30 or 10:00 at night. Who do we want shaping those young Christians who have been out of our homes for up to 15 hours in a 24-hour day?

The schools and ECC's of the Mid-South District provide a place where the Potter works His clay. His Word is present in so many different ways. The Potter shapes

His clay in our religion classes and chapel services. The students in science classes learn about God's creation. The Potter is at work. In history, students see the hand of God in world events. The Potter is at work. The music students sit at the feet of Christian teachers. Our athletes listen to a Christian coach. The Potter is at work. He talks with his Christian friends as they grow up together, going through life together. The Potter is at work, shaping and molding the young Christians. The students graduate or go on to advanced education with the full understanding of God's overflowing grace and their purpose of serving Christ and others.

May God continue to bless the education ministries that take place in the Mid-South District, and bless all the principals, leaders, teachers, and helpers in all of our education ministries. May God continue to bless and keep us and work in us, so that we may always reflect the fact that we are still and will always be God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God has prepared in advance for us to do. (Ephesians 2:8-10)

School in Haiti



In the U.S. we all are blessed to have the opportunity to go to school regardless of where we live or how affluent we are. This is something I never gave much thought when I registered my children in public school and 12 years later thankfully watched them walk across stage to receive their high school diploma. Post-graduation education was optional and where we spent much more energy and time planning. Would they go to college or a trade school?

This is not the case in all countries, especially Haiti. Even though the U.S. and Haiti constitutions both require free public education be offered to everyone, all similarities stop there. Haiti has great ideas and goals but they lack the infrastructure or financial means to provide free education. This leads to about 90% of the primary schools being privately



run by churches, NGOs (Non-Governmental Organizations) and local communities. The number of secondary schools is much smaller and again mostly private.

The school buildings are few and many schools will use the local churches or be held in open-air buildings with only tarps for shade and protection from the rain. The resources available in school are also very minimal; most use blackboards instead of books as their primary means to teach the children. School locations are not evenly distributed across the countryside. They can be up to 2 hours from the homes of many students whom walk to school.

Trinity HOPE is called to work with primary and secondary schools sponsored by Christian organizations in Haiti. This partnership with the schools allow all to see the importance of providing a daily meal that enables the children to learn and attendance to increase. After seeing the results, schools are willing to expand the school's business plan to help financially with the feeding program.

Even though the schools are few, have limited resources, and may be a far distance from the student's homes, the students have a strong desire to learn. This opens the door to

the opportunity to share the love of Christ with them and their families. Providing a hot nutritious meal of their favorite food, rice and beans with a red sauce makes a huge difference in attendance and advancement to the next grade level. That They May Know

On Reformation Day, Wednesday, October 31st, I took a group of eleven people from my congregation to the movie "Gosnell: The Trial of America's Biggest Serial Killer." The title sounds like a horror film, not something that sanctified Lutherans should be watching. It is, in fact, a horror film about the carnage of abortion, and Lutherans should definitely see it so that they may know what is happening in this unholy industry and that they may tell others.

The film does not use a whole lot of shocking images of death, just shocked faces. That was the biggest impact for me in viewing this very important film: the faces of people who didn't know but now knew. From the detectives to the prosecutor to the jury members, nobody had any idea what went on inside Gosnell's abortion clinic or any other abortion clinic. They didn't know until they heard the testimony of the workers and saw for themselves, or saw the photographs.

Perhaps the movie's most damning argument against abortion is the testimony a of doctor who sits on the witness stand and describes the legal way to kill and remove an infant in the womb. This doctor's face is also telling as she is in horror that Dr. Gosnell would kill moments after birth. It is a powerful display of rationalizing shades of evil. There were many things I didn't know prior to seeing the movie. One particular piece



of information I didn't know is that the Grand Jury concluded "political reasons" accounted for why the Pennsylvania Department of Health stopped mandatory state inspections of abortion clinics. This is how Gosnell operated his clinic illegally for so long.

Many people have never heard of Gosnell or the case that resulted in his conviction. That's why the movie was made. If you are not completely in the know, then I urge to you to do a little research. Start with the two articles in the LCMS Reporter and the LCMS Statement on the conviction:

An Update From Madagascar

Ed. Note: Below is an email from Rev. Joseph Randianasolo of Lutheran Institute of Managerial Enterprise (LIME) giving an update and thank you to President Paavola and the District for all the help and equipment received.

"Finally, we got things together: printers, video projector, computers chairs and tables. The tables and chairs just came yesterday late afternoon. There were unexpected expenses which forced us to cut the numbers of computers from 15 to 10, the numbers of tables from 30 to 20 and consequently the numbers of the chairs from 60 to 40 to meet these unexpected expenses.

We had to bring an expert on up to date printers and video projector from Fianarantsoa to Antananarivo to choose them and to test them at the stores themselves in Antananarivo to avoid chinese copies. Back in Fianarantsoa, this expert had to initiate our computer man how to use them.

For the tables and chairs, we asked the factory to make larger tables for multiple uses (like tables for eating in case the school organize a paid eating party and so on) and to paint them to protect them from insects. In addition, we had to pay the delivery to LIME. The factory is located 5km away from LIME.

For the computers, we bought two small speakers for each computer to allow students to listen in silence their lessons and researches. All of these unexpected expenses forced us to reduce the numbers of the above items.
