

### Message from Rev. Dr. Roger Paavola, President

#### February's Focus: OUTREACH

The Mid-South District is blessed with LCMS ministries that regularly seek ways to reach beyond their own walls to share the love of Christ. This month, the *Encourager* is pleased to celebrate outreach in the Mid-South with stories of ministries and individuals shining Christ's light – both in their communities and beyond.

"And He said to them, "Go into all the world and proclaim the Gospel to the whole creation."

Mark 16:15 ESV



I do a lot of traveling with my Calling. I get to explore parts of the world God has created that few other people will ever see. Before I head out on a trip, I check my GPS to see how long it will take to get to the next destination and how to get there. When the GPS works well, it's a great trip. However, on the last few trips, I typed in the name of "Hopkinsville, KY." It came back that there was no such place! I typed Kentucky and then the zip code with the same results. I've been there before, I KNOW they're there. But, then on my most recent trip, I wanted to get my ETA for going to Fort Wayne. The GPS said "There is no Indiana." Well,

isn't that great?! A good GPS can save a traveler time and make the trip more trouble free. But, not this time.

Wouldn't it be great if we had a functioning GPS for doing ministry? Wouldn't it be so much easier if God's Positioning Service (GPS) told us exactly where and how He wants us to carry out our Gospel privilege? But, God does guide our Gospel outreach - not always going in the directions we'd expect, but always where His work awaits. For many years, the Mid-South District purchased vacant land in areas where it seemed reasonable that we could plant a church. That became difficult to manage, the District then tried parachuting new pastors into areas where it seemed reasonable a church plant could start. We know there have been some successful plants and some that no longer exist. What's the difference?

On his second missionary journey, St. Paul learned firsthand how God would guide his Gospel outreach. After returning to the congregations he started in Asia Minor (his first missionary journey), Paul looked for a new area to share God's Word. It seemed the logical place to go was due west to the provinces of Asia. There were some big cities like Ephesus and Smyrna out there. But, the Holy Spirit turned Paul and his companions in another direction. Recalculating! So Paul turned his attention north

to Bythinia. But again the Holy Spirit prevented Paul from going where he thought he should go. Recalculating.

While we don't know how or why the Holy Spirit made His will known, we do know that he didn't hinder Paul from entering into those territories because the souls there were important. Later, those churches would be established in Asia - churches in Ephesus, Colossae, Pergamum, Laodecia, Philadelphia, and others. By guiding Paul away from that area, God was simply saying, "Not now."

God continues to guide His Gospel outreach. Although He has told us to go into all the world with the Gospel, there are times when He closes doors to certain areas. Our District and some congregations have experienced that before. Many efforts have been started, but several times God says, "Not now." This doesn't mean that the Gospel ministry is unimportant, or that it's not ever going to happen. The Gospel continues to be shared there, just not at this time.

After being turned away from Asia and Bythinia, Paul and his companions ended up in Troas, an out-of-the-way port town in the northwest corner of present-day Turkey. Paul must have wondered what God had in mind! Paul didn't have to wait long to find out. While God doesn't always guide us to where we expect, He always lead us to where His work is needed. Paul found that out in a vision he received in Troas. In this vision Paul saw a man from Macedonia begging him to come over and serve them. God sent this vision to lead Paul to expand his ministry into Europe.

God still works to guide our Gospel outreach. We may not receive visions but we do receive requests from people and places where the church can serve them. That's how our Synod started its work in our country and in its many foreign missions. People looking for a Bible teaching church began contacting pleaded our Synod and with them to send support. Circuits and congregations working together have begun to identify areas where new church plants might work. Demographic studies help auide our decisions and mission outreach in the wider sense takes place. It's happening now in Munford, TN, West Little Rock, AR, Fayetteville, AR, and Jonesboro, AR. The map of places where Lutheran congregations could appear has many gaps. We can keep our eyes and ears open and be ready to share God's Word with those whom God would place for us to reach.

When God guides us to where He wants us to work it's not always under the circumstances that we imagined. When Paul arrived in Macedonia he went to the city of Philippi - the most important city in the region. Based on his vision, Paul didn't expect to find a large group of people just waiting to hear the Gospel. However, he couldn't even find a synagogue - the place he usually started his ministry. Instead, Paul found a few Gentile women who regularly met down by a river to pray. He went to that group, shared God's Word, and through that ministry God opened the heart of a woman by the name Lydia.

Lydia's conversion reminds us that although God carries out His ministry through us, it's always still His ministry. He is the one that brings people to faith. We merely share the message that saves us, so we can share it with those who still live in darkness without Christ. Our work may be compared to a certain extent to that of a lifeguard. A good lifeguard is not just a strong swimmer but skilled at calming others. He needs to be skilled. Otherwise the person he tries to save will keep thrashing, even after the lifequard has reached him and starts to rescue him. This isn't only tiring but dangerous. Both the swimmer and the lifequard could be in peril.

But, the job of "towing" sinners into heaven still belongs to the Holy Spirit, God's Word, and our Savior Jesus. Jesus has rescued us from the sins that threatens to

lose us. God has given us the privilege of telling others what Jesus has done for us and for them. Only through God's Word can we tell others how God stopped our thrashing about and rescued us for His kingdom in heaven. On their own those who have not heard the Good News are destined to sink away from life eternal. In the arms of Jesus they can rest secure in the blessed hope of life through the forgiveness and life He freely offers.

Since God brings people to faith through His message, we should never take His Word for granted nor underestimate what His Word can do. Although the church in Philippi had only humble beginnings, it became the crowned jewel of the churches Paul started. The Philippians often sent Paul financial support and encouragement, even when he no longer served them directly. Lydia demonstrated an eagerness to serve, who, after being baptized, insisted that Paul and his companions make her home their base in Philippi.

I wonder what Paul thought when he and Silas ended up in prison in Philippi. They had been jailed for driving out a demon from a slave girl. Was this part of God's plan? Well it was! God used that experience to put Paul into contact with the jailer who was later converted after hearing Paul and Silas sing hymns and share with him what Jesus had done. God may still use every trial to put us into contact with the people with whom He wants us to share His Word.

We don't have a GPS that tells us exactly where Jesus wants us to go. There is no recorded message that tells us we're not going to the right place. God wants us to tell others about Him. We can expect that He will guide and direct us in the way He wants us to go. St Peter in his first Epistle makes it clear that our privilege and responsibility as Baptized Christians is to "proclaim the excellencies of Him who has called us out of darkness into His marvelous Light [of Christ]." (I Peter 2:9, ESV) We don't need to become discouraged if our missions haven't been a 100% success rate. He will lead and guide our efforts and the efforts of every

congregation and person to go in the way God guides His work. He is guiding us where His work already awaits. This is the resolve and efforts of the Mid-South District's mission and ministry plan - working for our congregations and the Kingdom of Christ.

Our Gospel outreach is **not** on hold. God has already opened doors with our efforts with the Lutheran Women Missionary League, our Each 1-Reach 1, and Synod's "Everyone His Witness. The tools are there! The Bible is central and the Gospel our focus. In the meantime, continue to walk through those doors God opens to bring you into contact with the people of His Calling. So tell them, "Christ has died, Christ has risen, and Christ will come again... for you!"

Grace Place is a Saturday evening service, an outreach ministry of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church

In December 2017, Grace Place was started as an outreach ministry of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in Chattanooga, Tennessee. Pastor Ed Rosser, was called to serve at the Saturday evening worship service. Members of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church placed introductory door hangers, hung signs at strategic locations and a large banner was placed on the lawn of Good Shepherd.

Several of the visitors were seeking a new church or were unchurched for quite some time. In addition, members of Good Shepherd who worked on Sunday morning or had not worshipped recently liked the Saturday evening opportunity to worship. Bible class is from 4:45-5:35 PM with 12-14 attendees. Worship is from 6-7 PM with weekly celebration of Holy Communion. Some people go out to dinner or a movie after worship.

Eleven (11) brothers and sisters in Christ have joined Good Shepherd and additionally there are four (4) in various stages of completing Adult Confirmation classes.

In May 2018, it was suggested the sermon be recorded (Android phone) and placed on Facebook. Soon after a Lay Minister suggested that Pastor record a Grace Place Minute. It is recorded in the Narthex with Pastor sitting on stool and sharing spiritual insights. Over the past eight months, there have been over 30,000 viewings of these messages. Recently Pastor's spiritual poems have been placed on Facebook and over 1500 people have viewed them.

The service is liturgical with a husband and wife team leading the music program. The musicians play piano, trumpet, Irish whistle and guitar. This past years attendance has averaged between 47-50 weekly worshipers.

The Mid-South District is pleased to announce Mr. John Hall as the 2018 Ralph C. Weiser Excellence in Ministry Award recipient for his work for Trinity/HOPE Ministries. The award was given to Mr. Hall posthumously on Sunday, December 16, 2018 at his home congregation, Emmanuel Lutheran Church in Hermitage, Tennessee.

Introduced in 2016, the Ralph C. Weiser Excellence in Ministry Award recognizes the dedication and ministry–building work of one Mid-South District layperson. The award honors the life and work of the late Ralph Weiser, a long-time friend of the Mid-South District, whose example of leadership, service, and faith impacted his local Lutheran congregation and community, as well as ministries across the entire District.

This year's recipient, John Hall, was the founder of Trinity/HOPE, beginning the ministry in 1999. He witnessed a school where the children were disengaged in the learning process and very lethargic because of hunger as their parents weren't able to feed them. John began a feeding program at that one school of 42 children in 1999. Through God's abundant blessings, John kept raising funds for more children and schools. Under his leadership, Trinity/HOPE served more than 26,000,000 meals throughout Haiti. John Hall went to be with the Lord in November, 2016.

"An empty stomach has no ears," is a wellknown phrase in Haiti. But, Haiti's future depends on the education of the upcoming generation. "Ain't God good!" was one of John's favorite phrases, and he was known to use it often when talking about the work God accomplished through Trinity/HOPE. John and his lovely wife, Carol, were married over 50 years and have two grown daughters and two grandchildren. As the words in Matthew 25 state, "Well done, good and faithful servant!" Like the award's namesake, Ralph Weiser, Mr. Hall exemplified service to God's Kingdom. Congratulations and many thanks go out to Mr. John Hall!
