"A Mighty Fortress is Our God!"

artin Luther's epic hymn, "A Mighty Fortress," sounds very much like a military battle song. "A Mighty Fortress is our God, a trusty Shield and Weapon; He helps us free from every need that hath us now overtaken. The old Satanic foe now means deadly woe; Deep guile and great might are his dread arms in fight; on Earth is not his equal." Verse 4 concludes, "The Word they still shall let remain nor any thanks have for it; He's by our side upon the plain with His good gifts and Spirit. And take they our life, goods, fame, child and wife, let these all be gone, they yet have

nothing won. The Kingdom ours remaineth."

Military science has always included fortresses or redoubts military strategy. Only the weaponry and soldiers performing in military strategy have changed. In warfare, the strategies and tactics change when new weapons roll on to the battlefield, but the overall concept toward victorious armies remains the same. Castles and fortresses were built to protect an army and its citizens from marauding enemies. For example, fortress around Constantinople was deemed to be nearly impenetrable. The **Byzantine** capital withstood invasions from outside forces from the Seventh Century until its defeat by the Ottoman Turkish general Sultan Mohamed II in 1453. The invention of gunpowder made the difference as the Turkish bombards (cannons) battered the impenetrable fortress and brought the city to its knees.

The French developed a defensive installment that was known as the Maginot line. It was a fortification along the French-German border that was interconnected and was used to defend against a German

invasion. But, during the first part of World War II, the Maginot Line became useless. The German war strategists planned an invasion of France through Belgium. The fortress was worthless.

The development American Western Expansion showed fortifications developing pattern a of outposts dotted that our Western frontier in an effort support settlers and to American soldiers. The Western Expansion eventually brought the continental states to range from the Atlantic to the Pacific Oceans. Fort Smith, Fort Wavne, Fort Laramie, Fort Campbell,

and Fort Randall are just a few examples outposts that helped established "plants" of Western Expansion. What does this all have to do with the Church? A lot!

The Bible tells of stories of the Israelites laying siege on the Canaanites in the cities such as Jericho - where Joshua led the Israelites to victory. The walls of Jericho were a fortress that protected both the inhabitants and its army from invading armies. But, when the marching around the city and the blowing of the trumpets were completed just as God directed, the Israelites saw the strategies of God that caused

the walls of the city to crumble, leaving the inhabitants and army completely vulnerable to God's design for warfare.

The advance the Reformation Lutheran that began in Germany over 500 years ago, took a militarylike development. Once the immigrants from Germany, Sweden, Finland, Norway, and elsewhere brought their "brand" Lutheran of Christian faith they had packed in their trunks and baggage. Seacoasts cities and hamlets that served as outposts along navigable waterways began to be dotted with Lutheran churches and schools. "Mothering" churches launched new congregations as the inward migration grew. The first Lutheran settlement in North America was established in 1619 when Pastor Rasmus Jensen brought Danish colonists to this continent because they became trapped by ice in Hudson's Bay. The first Lutherans started in Pennsylvania under **Pastor** Henry Melchior Muhlenberg in 1748. Some of our Mid-South District congregations began before The Lutheran Church Missouri Synod was formed in 1847.

The Mid-South District began in 1966 after the old Western District split into the Mid-South and Missouri districts. The purpose was to establish better ways to do the expansion of The Lutheran Church Missouri Synod into the "Bible Belt." Through the efforts of Rev. Norm Groteluschen, Al Benke, Dr. Wil Griesse, Rev. David Callies, and Rev. Ken

Lampe, in just over 50 years, the Mid-South District has grown to twice the size it started with in 1966. The "battle" has changed however. Not with gunpowder, but in the way the battle for "Church Expansion" has been fought.

Today, individual congregations or groups of congregations join together in all of the 35 districts of the LCMS to plant, support, and encourage emerging Lutheran congregations. The "battles" are not waged against other denominations of Christianity. The battles are fought against an evil foe that has opposed Christ's Church for eons. St Paul wrote, "For we do not wrestle against flesh and blood, but against the rulers, against the authorities, against the cosmic powers over this present darkness, against the spiritual forces of evil in the heavenly places." (Ephesians 6:12 ESV)

We are called to be witnesses for the sake of Christ and His Church (I Peter 2:9) and to build up the Church, guided by God. St Paul concluded, "Therefore take up the whole armor of God, that you may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand firm. Stand therefore, having fastened on the belt of truth, and having put on the breastplate of righteousness, and, as shoes for your feet, having put on the readiness given by the gospel of peace. In all circumstances take up the shield of faith, with which you can extinguish all the flaming darts of the evil one; and take the helmet of salvation, and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God." (Ephesians 6:13-17)

We are dedicated to doing church planting for Mid-South District. We will continue with the resources God provides, through the 26,000 soldiers of the cross from the Mid-South District Jesus has redeemed, equipped, and called to the battlefield where His Word - the only offensive weapon St Paul listed within the armament of defense - God freely offers by His unending grace.

Mission To Ministry

Zero to Sixty

Christ the King Lutheran Church in Memphis, TN, celebrates its sixtieth anniversary this fall. As a church plant in 1959, CTK was the beneficiary of significant encouragement and donations of time and talent from its sister congregations and their pastors.



Volunteers came in every weekend to set up for services. As the congregation outgrew the original house, a second house was connected, adding more classroom and worship space.

n September of 1958, the Mission Board of the Western District of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod explored the possibility of forming a mission church in the eastern area of the expanding city of Memphis. Under the auspices of the Lutheran Activities Council, an organizational meeting of the new South-East Memphis Mission was attended by 30 people, as well as several area Lutheran pastors who provided their support and encouragement, including Rev. Leo Symmank of Holy Cross, Rev. Paul Martens of Trinity, Rev. Paul Schmidt of Redeemer, and Rev. Everett Grese of Immanuel. Wednesday evening services began soon after in a local bank building, with Rev. Symmank serving as supply pastor. Several months

later, a "lovely 7-acre tract of land out on Park Avenue," complete with two small houses, was purchased by the Mission Board for around \$40,000. Charter members recall the entrance to the property was just a small dirt driveway covered with overhanging branches of trees on both sides, with the houses set far back from the road. It was dubbed "The Church in the Wildwood" by its members, with its parklike surrounding and almost unlimited space for children to explore and play.

Local Lutheran churches and their members loaned the mission appropriate altar paraments and donated hymnals as well as rented a small portable organ for its use. A total of 37 people attended the first Sunday morning worship

in the two-room house on the day after purchase in December of 1958. A year later, as the mission grew, they connected another small house on the property to the original one, providing additional meeting rooms. A mission pastor, Rev. Carl Schrader, was called in April of 1959, and installed as full-time Pastor of Christ the King in July of that year. With the guidance of the Holy Spirit, with the encouragement and support of area Lutherans, and with eager, enthusiastic, innovative outreach and evangelism efforts, this mission plant in southeast Memphis celebrated its Charter Sunday, with 60 members signing the Charter, on Sunday, June 21, 1959.

This fall, Christ the King will celebrate its 60th anniversary

with a special Sunday service at 10AM on Sept. 15, followed by a catered lunch and a look back at six decades of serving the Memphis community and beyond, giving thanks to our gracious God for His providing faithful undershepherds (Reverends Schrader, Bruce Zagel, Jeff Stephens, Chuck Neugebauer, and Mark Goble), and guiding us through years of mission and ministry, construction and renovations, and expanding our reach to the farthest corners of the world. We invite our members and

friends to join us on September 15, and celebrate with us our sixtieth year of having been "planted" here and now to do the Lord's work. Contact Genie at gswan@ctkmemphis.com for more information on our anniversary celebration.

hurch planting in the Southeast of Lake Victoria ■ Diocese (SELVD) is such an amazing experience. Each year since 2004 mission teams from the Mid-South District partner with pastors and lay people from the SELVD to outreach into areas of the diocese that has had little or no exposure to the Gospel message. We form into teams and go out into pathways and trails of the area and into homes to share the good news of Jesus Christ. We return to a meeting area and share the stories of our visits with the rest of the team. Thousands have been baptized during these trips and sub-congregations are started in these areas. We then go home, we feel blessed to have been part of this experience. A few months after the trip, we receive reports and pictures of what these new Christians have done in these sub-parishes. This May we evangelized in the Welezo and Shabuluba areas in the Tinde Parish of Pastor Jeofrey Tenga. This week we were notified that a church building had been built in each of these villages. The new congregation dug the foundation by hand, they made the bricks and constructed the walls themselves. We have had similar experiences during other mission trips. In 2017 in the Lalago Parish new churches were built in Mwakidiga and Mbalagane by the newly baptized Christians in 4 months.

In 2018 in the Ushetu district, a new church was built in the sub-congregation of Saba Sabini and in Itilima district church buildings were constructed in Muhunze, Mwadiliama, and Ikindiro. Mission trips in Tanzania have been a blessing to all who attend. We are making plans for another mission trip in 2020, comejoinus! ContactBobAllenformoreinformation,








Members Welcomed
