Message from Rev. Dr. Roger Paavola, President



The Apostle Peter, in his first epistle wrote, "You are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for His own possession, that you may proclaim the excellencies of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light. Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people..." (I Peter 2:9-10a, ESV). His first chapter makes it abundantly clear that this privilege is given to every baptized Christian, saying, "May grace and peace be multiplied to you. Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! According to His great mercy, He has caused us to be born again to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, to an inheritance that is imperishable, undefiled, and unfading, kept in heaven for you, who by God's power are

being guarded through faith for a salvation ready to be revealed in the last time." (I Peter 1:2b-5, ESV) It seems clear, so why is church attendance and membership declining in the United States... that is, if we are embracing this privilege and stewardship of the Gospel?

Recently, 1 shared the observations of a book with the joint Board of Regents of our two seminaries. The book is called, 10 Tsunamis Impacting Ministry, (Daniel Cook © Build God's Way Services, 2015). It isn't a scholarly piece, but explains a gigantic, destructive wave that is sweeping over American Christianity. Even though he's more inclined toward the "we-gotta-dosomething" mentality, rather than understanding that, regardless of what we think we "gotta-do," the Christian Church still belongs and has its life given by God's grace in Christ Jesus; and despite several limitations, the book challenges us to open our eyes to the reality of several alarming trends happening to American Christianity.

He quotes Edwin Friedman, who wrote, "Everything we enjoy as part of our advanced civilization, including the

discovery, exploration, and development of our country, came about because previous generations made adventure more important than safety." Cook's concern is that there is a wide swath of "tsunamis" which have hit or will eventually hit ministries in America. Churches, schools, and other non-profits are in the "eye of the storm." How do we survive what's coming? Even though he used mixed metaphors, be it a storm or a gigantic wave, he demonstrates that the next 10-30 years of ministry will not be the same. How we approach ministry will change.

The first tsunami Cook discussed is a Tsunami of Generational Transition. In 2012. Baby Boomers made close to 70% of all of the income earned in the United States. Baby Boomers gave to churches at a rate of 90% or more in their total giving. By 2018, Baby Boomers are nearing or have entered retirement and will command no more than 20% of total US earning power. Millennials' income, on the other hand will increase to over 50% of total US earned income. This means that over \$60 trillion dollars will be transferred from the management of the Baby Boomer generation to millennials in the next 30 years. When the money falls into the hands of the millennials, they will direct their giving in accordance with their values. Calculations from federal not-for-profit (NFP) reports show that only 25% of total earnings for NFP's was generated by the 46 million Generation X-ers, and than 5% from the 100-million millennials who were born after 1980. This represents a 59% shortfall in giving, or in terms of actual dollars approximately \$58 billion dollar shortfall to religious charitable giving in 2018 compared to how the Baby Boomer generation supported the Church.

The millennial generation (born from 1972 - 1998) is poised to assume leadership business, roles in society, government. They are and "right-brain" predominantly thinkers with ideas, values, and perspectives that will redefine commerce, organizations, and politics for the first half century. But, what is so alarming is that millennials are leaving the church in record numbers some estimates show as few as 15% remain in the church, with as few as 3 - 5% of them attend any church service on any given Sunday. Millennials now represent 1 in 3 persons in the United States. How are we going to share the Gospel with them?



HUGABEAR GROUP RECEIVES THANK YOU

Peace Lutheran Church, Cherokee Village AR was blessed with a special visit recently by an out of town mother and daughter, who came to personally share their gratitude for the daughter receiving a "hugabear" from our ladies' Hugabear group when she was in the emergency room with a bad cut. She found the bear so comforting and encouraging when facing the trauma, being reminded that Jesus and His people care. The Hugabear group (pictured) prepares hundreds of unique home-made stuffed, sewn bears each year and distributes them to local hospitals, ambulances, and firemen, and they are given to both children and adults.

According to Sylvia Ronsvalle of "Empty Tomb" Foundation, one out of four millennials cannot think of any positive contribution the church has made on them. They believe the old fashioned mentalities are meaningless when all ministries need to work on is doing better with offering gratitude for the gifts they receive. A nice note or recognition goes a long way. However, gratitude has been replaced with instant gratification for the millennial.

Yet, millennials are searching for a church that, "...truly believes what it says it believes." Peter Voogd, a featured writer (and millennial) for *Entrepreneur* magazine, states, "Millennials have acute "BS meters" and inauthenticity doesn't set well with them. We do not choose one worship style over the others, but want structure. We're beginning to recognize the value of traditional worship over entertainment worship."

In another study, Cook notes the impact of this difficulty noting that less than 25% of the US households are traditional nuclear families. One-third of the children born in the US is born out of wedlock. Here, consider the impact of these changes included in the Missouri Synod 2019 Convention Workbook: The likelihood of the "next generation's" connection the Church will be when: The Church teaches the faith - 25%. But, when the parents teach the faith with the Church - 81%! Who is active in the Church today: The Great Generation

- 62%; Baby Boomers - 40%; Millennials – 4%! But, then notice what was cited in Resolution 12-07A ("Strengthening Families in Catechetical Responsibilities") at our Synod's 2019 Convention. The next generation of adults will likely become active in the Church when: Mother and Father are active in the Church - 33%; when the mother only is active in the Church - 2%; but, when the father only is active in the Church - 44%! What is more, the next Generation will follow the examples in faith formation to become part of the Church, when: the mother became a Christian, 17% will follow. When the child became a Christian, 3.5% will follow. But, when the father became a Christian, 93% will follow his example. The retention rate of Post-High School graduates in Protestant and Evangelical settings is less than 15%. In the LCMS, the retention rate is 35% - over twice the number in other denominations. Yet, the trend lines need our attention.

Sharing the Gospel begins in the home. Even if it's a non-nuclear family, the head of the household has the primary responsibility in faith formation. Martin Luther, in his Small Catechism, recognizes what these statistics are telling us, "As the head of the family should teach them in a simple way to his household." Our Mid-South District's Generation-2-Generation project has taken on the task of bringing about a paradigmatic shift on the way we share the Gospel. Through its efforts, congregations will learn of ways to bring a renewed emphasis rising from the nuclear family that structures faith formation the way God designed the family.

Each-1 Reach-1 has touched congregations across entire District. Individual congregations have invited us to participate in learning the basic of how to respond when we're asked, "What do you Lutherans believe?" The doors swing wide open for us to share the beauty of the teachings of our Confessions. It accomplishes what St. Peter encouraged us to do over 2000 years ago, "You are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for His own possession, that you may proclaim the excellencies of Him who called you out of darkness into His marvelous light."

Zion (Augsburg) Celebrates Its 12th Annual Fall Fest



Zion Lutheran Church at Augsburg, Arkansas, will hold its 12th Annual Fall Fest on Saturday, October 12. The festival begins at 10:00 A.M. and lasts the whole day. Zion Lutheran Church is located at the intersection of Arkansas Highway 333 and Augsburg Road, north of London and northwest of Dover.

The first festival was held in the fall of 2008. Founded in 1883, the congregation was looking for ways to reach out to the community as it celebrated its 125th Anniversary. A little intimidated at first by such a large undertaking, the members were surprised at how successful that first festival was. Each year since then it has grown beyond anything that we imagined.

One of the reasons for its phenomenal growth has been the investment that the whole community has made in it, both in time and money. We have a committee that begins meeting each year in March or April to prepare for that year's festival. About sixty volunteers show up the week of the festival for preparation, set-up, and working wherever they are needed the day of the festival. We even have volunteers each year that come from as far away as lowa, Oklahoma, California, and Hawaii.

This year's festival will feature a Bike Ride, free kids' games, bump and jumps, pony rides, petting zoo, cake walk, silent auction, country store, Daisy BB gun

shoot, drawing for a locally grown farm-raised hog (processed and ready to be picked up the day of the festival), drawing for a 40-gun Cannon gun safe, antique farm equipment display, bingo, climbing wall, crafts and educational booths, all day musical entertainment, and delicious German food featuring hand-made bratwursts with sauerkraut or grilled peppers and onions (served on a homemade roll) and homemade desserts. Admission to the festival is free.

All of the proceeds from the festival are equally divided between Zion's two social outreach ministries—the River Valley Christian Clinic in Dardanelle, which provides free health care (medical, dental and optical) and spiritual guidance to anyone in the River Valley who cannot afford to access traditional medical care, and the Augsburg Food Pantry, which provides food to over 650 people each month. In 2018, the Augsburg Food Pantry helped over 7,000 people, distributing over 100,000 pounds of food. Over 70 volunteers willingly gave their time to assist with the food distribution.











Last year, Augsburg Fall Fest raised \$24,378 for these two mission efforts, and we hope to exceed that this year. Come and see what this little congregation atop Augsburg Mountain has done to reach out with Christian love and compassion to its neighbors in need.
