

A Message from Rev. Dr. Roger Paavola, President

Alan, a very muscular big man in my last congregation told me a fascinating story about the time he was scared in his work as a coal miner. He told about the times when coal miners dug for coal in eastern Kentucky, but had to leave pillars of coal - lines of unsteady compressed hydrocarbons that were left to support the roof of the mine. The coal pillars weren't excavated but were left as supports for the next portion of the mining operation. But, when a mine was worked so there was no more coal left to dig, the dangerous task to remove the coal pillars began.

"It's called 'Robbing the Mine,' Alan explained. "It's when we'd go deep back inside to take down the coal pillars." Starting in deepest part of the mine, the miners chipped away at the coal

pillars and systematically let the mine collapse behind them. One by one they would "Rob the Mine" and make their way back out of the shaft with smoke, soot, and flammable gases belching from the collapsing mine behind them. The process is obviously dangerous. Alan said that most coal mining casualties came when the miners had to "Rob the Mine."

Listen to what's happening in our nation and to our parochial schools across the span of Christianity. Are we watching as Robbing the Pillars that once brought safety and purpose to our Church and general society begin to disappear? The pillars of the nuclear family, traditional values, and Christian virtues are not only waning, but are under direct attack. In a recent COMPASS visit, we heard that one of our

Lutheran parochial schools could never achieve that state's highest standards of excellence. It wasn't because of bad curriculum, or poor staffing, or poor academic performance. It was because the school's library had, "...literature of a violent nature." The title of that specific literature is, "The Holy Bible"! Because it contains "stories" like David and Goliath, wars, famine, and a crucifixion, the school's standards were beneath the compared standards of public education.

Proverbs 9:1 states, "Wisdom has built her house; she has hewn her seven pillars." Lutheran education was the beginning of mission and ministry when Lutheran immigrants first set foot on this continent. Lutheran schools were essential ingredients for an emerging American frontier. Yet, fundamental progressive thinking challenged Christian parochial education. A man named Horace Mann (c. 1796 – 1859) was best known for his commitment to promoting public education. His vision was: "It is the law of our

nature to desire happiness. This law is not local, but universal; not temporary, but eternal. It is not a law to be proved by exceptions, for it knows no exception."[Horace Mann (1853). "A Few Thoughts for a Young Man" A lecture, delivered before the Boston Mercantile Library Association, on Its 29th Anniversary. p. 9.]

Mann's ideal to follow the "Law of Nature" as it forms the education norms for American children seemed to be focused on an "eternal" outcome. But, in reality, Mann was more committed in his opposition to religious influences on the minds of young children. In a review of Mann's educational progressivism, the historian Ellwood Cubberley wrote, "No one did more than he [Horace Mann] to establish in the minds of the American people the concept that education should be universal, non-sectarian, free, and that its aims should be social efficiency, civic virtue, and character, rather than mere learning or the advancement of sectarian ends." [Cubberley, Ellwood P. (1919).

Public Education in the United States. p. 167] His use of the word "sectarian" is a euphemism for "parochial" education. Growing out of progressive Massachusetts soil, state supported public education grew.

What does this have to do with our precious Lutheran schools in the Mid-South District? First, this is neither an indictment of our public school systems or its dedicated teachers. They are to be honored and supported for what they do to sacrifice for the educating of our young people. Nor is this about the products coming out of our public schools. American students rank among the best in the world in educational excellence.

No, this is about the role, purpose, and unique opportunity we have in the privilege of having great Lutheran schools in our Mid-South District. We have a clear purpose for our education ministries. Our Lutheran schools provide a foundation for a Christian life that has a plan and purpose for now and for eternity. It's about faith formation. Every world religion states they "have faith." Whatever form their "faith" has, there is a belief system that forms one's dedication to the object of that faith. Any "faith" has an object of faith. However, no other religion in the world has the Object of faith that we Lutheran Christians have - Jesus Christ.

Christian education begins from what Jesus told His disciples, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to Me. Therefore,

when you go from here, make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching (διδάσκοντες) them to observe all that I have commanded vou." (Matthew 28:19ff, wooden translation) The basic foundation upon which we can ever build the Church is granted by God's will and the starting point of all ministry, and for our discussion, also teaching ministry. This διδάσκοντες means to teach, or more literally, "cause to learn", instruct, impart knowledge, or disseminate information.

Imparting knowledge begins the way Martin Luther arranged the Catechism's chief articles of the Christian faith. It begins with The Decalogue. Society cannot build character or a sound society without the foundation of God's Commandments. They firmly place the family, the church, the schools, and our whole society in the fundamental truths of God's precepts.

The Psalmist writes, "Blessed is the man who walks not in the counsel of the wicked, nor stands in the way of sinners, nor sits in the seat of scoffers; but his delight is in the law of the Lord." (Psalm 1:1-2) Delight in the Law of the Lord is hardly the characteristic of certain segments of our public. I John 5:1-2 (ESV) states, "Everyone who believes that Jesus is the Christ has been born of God, and everyone who loves the Father loves whoever has been born of Him. By this we know that we love the children of God, when we love God and obey his commandments." His Law is one of the pillars in Christian education - firm, upright supports of structure that gives strength to it.

It takes teamwork between the church and the family to teach a strong structure for moral character and Godly values. The nuclear family is essential for any chance of meaningful faith formation in future generations. The old advertisement said, "Don't take your children to church, bring them with you." Sunday School is a great resource, but the greatest help to establish meaningful faith formation rest in the nuclear family supported by Christian education.

Dedicated parents with Christian resources are key in faith formation. There are thousands of negative influences that chisel away at character and faith building for our children. Television, video games, and peer pressure push shove their way influence on the malleable minds of our youth. Trustworthy bonds of relationship are needed to hold the next generation away from perilous collapse of Christian virtues. The pillars of respect for First and Fourth Commandment is firmly understood in a unique way within Christian education. It's a respect that begins in the home. Ephesians 4:32 states, "Be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake has forgiven you."

Without the moral teaching of God's Word, eternal truths will be laid aside. There can be no absolute

truths when the absolute truth of God's Word is dismissed. By the time America entered the 60's and 70's, Dr. Dennis Brogan had determined that public education become. "...a had formally unestablished national church." (Time, September 14, 1969, p. 70) In other words, he saw public education replacing traditional religion. We need God's gift of understanding and wisdom in our homes, our churches, and in our schools. That is easier in Christian education since, beginning at the very earliest age, it is not merely adding religion to wrap around what we need to learn for an adult life, but an education shaped by our Christian faith founded in God's Word.

Miners chipped away at the coal pillars in the mine when the supply of coal neared its end. Lutheran Christian education builds not only for what our youth need in this life, but the life that is to come. Our Lutheran schools teach loyalty to Christ and citizenship to the state. We can never allow our stewardship of Christian education to be eroded, chipped away, or allowed to collapse. Pray for and support Lutheran Christian education because it is the mother lode for the next generation's faith formation.

# **Faith Development at Home and at School**

The Mid-South District of the Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod has schools that work together with parents to build children's faith in our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. In this district we support 1 high school, 10 elementary schools, and 22 early childhood centers. So, the question that I would like to address is, "How does faith at home improve the effectiveness of the schools?"

Teaching children and teenagers to develop Christian values and character takes the entire community of believers. At home the parents of the children need to give positive support, communicate well, and set responsibilities and boundaries. The community itself should be caring, value the youth, and have positive peer influences. The church should have positive adult role models, be honest in everything, and engage the youth in the work of the church. The school must have a caring climate, set boundaries and high expectations, and involve the parents.

Ben Freudenberg, in his book *The Family Friendly Church* states four family practices that are particularly important in helping young people grow in their faith. (p. 17)

- 1. Talking about faith with your mother.
- 2. Talking about faith with your father.
- 3. Having family devotions or prayer time.
- 4. Doing family projects to help other people.

Building positive relationships is key to all humans. Parents are of course the key faith developers for their children both positively and negatively, and it's important for both church and school to help parents understand their role in helping children grow in their Christian faith. Rev. Todd A Biermann states it quite clearly in his book *Handing Out Life* when he points to Jesus as our number one priority in building relationships. And what follows you might ask? Well as we order our priorities, they should be spouse, family, other believers, and the world. You see that is where we often go astray because we put worldly relationships too far to the top.

In terms of faith development in children, parents have always been given the primary role to instruct and be an example for their children. Today's busy lives make it difficult to prioritize schedules and resources, but engaged Christian parents are to be consistent in their church attendance, prayers, family devotions and reading the Bible. As it says in 3 John 1:4, "I have no greater joy than to hear that my children are walking in the truth." Statistics have shown that parents are willing to provide spiritual leadership for their children, but often feel ill equipped to do so. This is where the church and school can aid the parents in being the spiritual leader for their children. The school and church can help the children and youth understand their lives as forgiven sinners with the promise of eternal life because of the death and resurrection of Jesus.

The schools in our district not only offer a great curriculum, but also offer the care and nurturing needed by the children that God has put into their midst. The number one goal has always been and will always be to see each and every child in heaven one day. Schools and churches are meant to support the parents by developing short-term and long-term relationships. May the Holy Spirit guide us all to that end.

# Life Plan for the New Year

In this New Year, I pray for the Lord to continue to give us wisdom and compassion in teaching and standing for the sanctity of human life. January is an important month for us to confess life boldly because of the unfortunate anniversary of Roe v. Wade, January 22, 1973. However, the whole year can be used to educate congregation members and others that abortion and euthanasia are moral issues and that life is to celebrated and protected.

## *In the month of January, you may consider the following:*

- 1. Attend the March for Life in Washington D.C. The dates are January 24-25, 2020. Many congregations have been planning a trip and are set to go. Some go every year. Ask around. There may be additional spaces on a bus.
- 2. Observe Life Sunday on January 19, 2020. Visit www.lutheransforlife.org for bulletin inserts and sermon ideas. This year's theme is "Did God Really Say . . . ?" For the year 2021, consider inviting a guest preacher (District V.P., Circuit Visitor, emeritus pastor).
- 3. Attend a state or city rally for life. Or, organize your own circuit prayer rally on the state capitol steps or in your city square.
- 4. Write letters to your state senators and congressmen on your support for abortion restrictions and bans. The real action is at the state level. Tennessee, especially, has a chance to enact a ban on abortion based on the Ninth Amendment of the U. S. Constitution. I encourage sending letters to all members of the Tennessee Senate Judiciary Committee since they will be ruling on this bill in January! (See my article in the September 2019 issue of the *Encourager*.)

# Throughout the year, you may consider doing the following:

- 1. Include in your bulletins and newsletters Life News, Life Quotes, or Life Thoughts in the Church Year. See the media tab at www.lutheransforlife.org.
- 2. Consider starting a Life Team in your congregation.
- 3. Regularly include petitions for the unborn/preborn, the infirm, and the elderly in the Prayer of the Church.
- 4. Listen to a Frontline Conference Call. Lutherans For Life puts them on quarterly. This is a great way to get new ideas.
- 5. Remember October as Pregnancy and Infant Loss Month. Remember October 15 as the observance day. I, somehow, did not know this and was only recently made aware of this remembrance. People are looking for this to be acknowledged, and, as Lutherans, we have the Gospel message of comfort and hope to give.
- 6. Host a guest speaker.
- 7. Get involved with a crisis pregnancy center. I know that many congregations are making a great impact in volunteering and fund raising for clinics that help women carry their babies to a joyful birth.
- 8. Contact me with your ideas. Share them with other pastors and congregations.


