

President's Report Fall Pastors' Conference – Mid-South District–LCMS October, 2020

MID-SOUTH DISTRICT ACTIVITY

I. CHURCH PLANTING:

The BOD's Mission and Ministry Committee and Executive Staff have worked with the congregation in Munford to settle in their newest location on the south side of Munford. A welcoming for the community was held on August 17 at the new location. The event was well attended.

In addition to the church planting activity of the NW Arkansas plant, Rev. JD Zischke is working with the Fayetteville Circuit to determine what will happen with the future areas of opportunity and concern. This includes:

- The University of Arkansas campus ministry ("Lutherans and Friends")
- The Rock House properties and ministry
- Prairie Grove properties and ministry
- Siloam Springs ministry
- St John's and Living Savior in Fayetteville and Lowell property and ministries

Rev. Dr. Peter Meier has announced that C4USM will discontinue its arrangements with their clients for mission development and church planting. Eric Wenger (24/7 Ministries) started a more personalized service for congregations, and for our Mid-South District for Church Planting. Rev. JD Zischke has completed their training session and is now a certified church planting trainer, mentor and coach. Two other planters will be appointed to continue this work in the three regions of the District – West, Central and Eastern. We will have a planning session on how this may affect the mission and church planting efforts of the Mid-South District. We will complete a report on the NW Arkansas developments after meeting with the leaders in the circuit and C4USM personnel. The meeting was held on December 2, 2019 in Little Rock as an all-day program.

We identified potential church planting "hotspots" in the state of Arkansas that include, Northwest Arkansas (in addition to the work in Fayetteville), Fort Smith, Little Rock (in addition to West Little Rock), Stuttgart, Alexander, and Hot Springs; in Tennessee the focus is on Hohenwald and Lebanon; for Kentucky, Cadiz and Smiths Grove.

Dr. Mark Press informed us that the Smiths Grove church planting effort has reached over 50 souls in attendance at his worship services. They are currently renting space in the First Christian Church of Smiths Grove, and conducting weekly Bible studies in the community. Several of those attending have committed to making this a permanent mission opportunity.

II. SYNOD CONVENTION:

The Mid-South District Convention held on June 28-30, 2018, unlike many other District Conventions, showed collegiality and unity in passing every resolution without significant opposition. One of the Resolutions (2-02A) was to submit an overture to the Synodical Convention on the processes that affect the ordination of Specific Ministry Pastors. Our overture was received and assigned for discussion at the Synod's July Convention. As a result, the Pastoral Formation Committee of the Synod will be evaluating the process that SMP candidates move toward ordination and make their recommendations to the 2022 Synod Convention.

Our Generation to Generation (G2G) project received overwhelming support as a study model for the rest of Synod. We will submit a report on the findings and methodologies we have developed to evaluate ways Synod and other Districts can work to keep our young adults active in the church, and ways to have families become more deeply involved in faith formation for future generations. That report will be presented to the Council of Presidents at their November meeting, 2020. A more extensive report will be coming from the Family Ministry Subcommittee and Tessa Brasher. She is leading this effort with some great results.

IV. YOUTH AND FAMILY MINISTRY FORUM:

The Youth and Family Ministry Committee has set its Beta-study congregations in Arkansas, and will begin their work toward presenting Generations to Generations to those congregations. There will likely be substantial changes made in the first four modules.

Included in the entire **COMPASS** study program, there have been 83 congregations who have completed the **C.A.R**. tool for assessing congregational activity.

The Educational component for **C.A.R.** has been completed. A BETA study was conducted on January 23 to work out any details or changes that were necessary on the draft form. Those changes have been submitted to Holybytes and became operational in April, giving us a chance to launch the additional component. The Copyright has been secured.

VII. CAR and COMPASS DEVELOPMENTS

In January, the Mid-South District invited Dr. Lane Sietz and every participant we have had in our **COMPASS** studies to do an evaluation of our first version of **C.A.R.** and **COMPASS**. We experienced significant results and have been asked by several other Districts to use our programs in their Districts. Any revisions to the programs to streamline the responses and information will be forthcoming.

VIII. EACH ONE – REACH ONE (\mathcal{L}_{1} - \mathcal{R}_{1}):

Diane Reimold (LWML District President) and I continue the second phase of £1-\$\mathbb{R}1\$ in the District. We employ the materials from Synod's "Every One His Witness" program and apply those principles in our local congregations. In addition to Christ the King Lutheran, Memphis; Grace Lutheran, Knoxville; Zion Lutheran, Ulm; Immanuel Lutheran, Memphis; and First Lutheran, Fort Smith, the LWML Spring Zone rallies have had an additional 180 participants from the LWML. That brings the total of £1-\$\mathbb{R}1\$ participants to over 250 people. Two additional locations were scheduled for Our Savior, Morristown, TN (completed) and Chapel of the Good Shepherd, Sharps Chapel, TN (completed).

IX. MID-SOUTH DISTRICT DEACON PROGRAM:

The Synod's Resolution provides for LLD's to be in the process of their application to the ordained ministry to continue their work until the General Colloquy Committee for Pastoral Ministry of the Synod acts on their applications. Therefore, those men who are in the process, and have been placed in the queue for colloquy may continue to serve in that capacity until their day with the colloquy committee. Those men who have applied for the SMP ministry colloquy must have completed the one-week intensive offered by the Synod and Seminaries, or take the course via a video presentation with attestation by a monitor who is an ordained LCMS pastor.

We have developed a potential program with the Concordia University, Mequon, WI for on-line courses for the deacons who aspire to the pastoral office, and encourage men and women who are not on a pastoral ministry track to become Lay Ministry Associates who will focus on visitation, shut-in visitation, outreach, assimilation, and general work within the congregations, schools, and ECCs of the District. Rev. Curt Hoover is developing the Lay Ministry Associate program for the District and will have the program included in our 2021 work plans.

X. DEVELOPMENT:

Since 2013, the IMPACT program has allowed us to engage individuals across the Mid-South in prayerful financial support of the District's ministry building work—programs and services for congregations, schools, workers and future ministries. The IMPACT program was launched with an initial campaign to raise \$1.5 million in three years (2013-2015). At the close of the campaign period, the District was blessed to achieve 97.5% of the financial goal, receiving pledges of just over \$1,462,313 in gifts and commitments.

The objective for this triennium is for us to launch additional conversations with individual congregations to bring the Mid-South District message to each person. Development will conduct additional information sessions in 2020 and 2021.

XI. MISSION AND MINISTRY EXECUTIVE:

The Executive Committee has not met for candidates to be interviewed because of the impact of the pandemic. We will evaluate the process in comparison to the economic wellbeing and long range outlook for churches in general, and the District specifically. The Presidium will consider our options as we move toward the fourth quarter of this year.

XII. CONGREGATION PARTNERSHIP ARRANGEMENTS

Our Savior Lutheran Church, El Dorado, AR, and Faith Lutheran Church, Magnolia, AR are working out final arrangements for a Dual Parish congregation in their area. But, because of the pandemic, those discussions were on hold. Recently, there has been a renewed interest in calling a pastor to be a part of the dual parish arrangement. We will be working with the new Circuit Visitor, Rev. Chad Philipp to make meeting arrangements with the congregations.

The meaning of these arrangements is that the voting responsibilities and privileges change under the guidelines of Synod definition of "congregation." Similarly, Living Savior Lutheran Church in Lowell, AR, and St John's Lutheran Church in Fayetteville have been functioning as a Dual Parish, but have not participated in District or Synod proceedings since the vacancy pastor, Rev. Duncan Cox began his coverage there six years ago.

In addition to these communities, there is discussion taking place in Fort Smith on the possibility of a dual parish arrangement with some combinations of the three Fort Smith congregations, Greenwood, and Salisaw, Oklahoma. This is in the discussion stages at this point and has been postponed until such time that the Safer-at-Home restrictions are lifted.

XIII. BEGINNING GREEK CLASSES

The Mid-South District has begun a program to teach Biblical Koine Greek to the men who have gone through SMP Colloquy. At the present time, there are nine men who are taking the class. Rev. Greg Bauch is teaching the class on line, using the information from Dr. James Voelz and his syllabus for introductory work in Biblical Greek. They are currently meeting on Monday evenings via Zoom Room, and the iTunes presentations by Dr. Voelz. I am the back-up should Pastor Bauch not be able to teach on a Monday evening.

XIV. TUESDAY NIGHT SERMON STUDIES

In addition, each week, the Mid-South District offers an exegetical sermon study on the upcoming pericopes of the lectionary. A variety of pastors lead discussions on the passages with commentaries and outlines of possible sermon presentations. XV. TORNADO ALLEY

As a result of the Mid-South District's six tornadoes this Spring in Knoxville, Cookeville, Nashville, Hermitage, Jonesboro, and Chattanooga the Mid-South District was able to provide relief to families in the amount of \$16,581 to assist in cleanup and relief. The Lutheran Church Charities organization has been unable to participate in clean-up activities in the last four events because of the lockdown due to the pandemic.

XVI. RALPH WEISER EXCELLENCE IN MINISTRY AWARD, 2020

The recipient for the award for 2020 will be Michael McDowell. The award will be presented at Immanuel Lutheran Church, Murray, KY.

XVII. ANNIVERSARIES IN MINISTRY

The Mid-South District recognized the anniversary milestones of ministry for our Mid-South District. (Appendix A)

XVIII. CARES ACT

As the US Congress struggled with ways of keeping businesses moving as the pandemic began to close down the economy, Congress passed the CARES ACT that provided substantial dollars to assist businesses and support wage earners in those businesses. The Mid-South District was eligible to receive CARES dollars through the PPP loan and made application for \$118,800. The funds were received April 24, 2020. At this point, we are closely monitoring commitments from our congregations. We should have somewhat of a downturn in commitments for a while, but the CARES dollars will sustain the Mid-South District until the lockdown has been lifted and congregations get back to normalcy.

Districts have reported a downturn in commitment payments coming from their congregations. Of those reporting, 0% have reported no drop; 6% report a drop of less than 10%; 22% report a drop between 10-20%; 22% report drops of 20-30%; while 16% report a drop in excess of 30%. The District partnered with the Synod's Soldiers of the Cross program to distribute funds to our church workers. The Synod funded \$43,920 (80%) to the cause, with the District adding \$10,980 (20%) to provide assistance for our district's church workers – commissioned, ordained, and lay. A total of 38 grants were awarded for a grand total of \$54,900. (Appendix B)

XIX. LWML DISTRICT CONVENTION

Like many other organizations, the Mid-South District LWML had to hold its biennial District Convention in a virtual setting. We sent greetings (via Zoom) to the women who joined the proceedings from their homes or in person. We presented our thanks for the many years of help for our professional church workers' support program. Once again this year, the Mid-South District, with the help of the LWML, will send \$81,000 scholarship dollars to help our fifteen students in our Concordia University system and Seminaries. The newly elected President for the Mid-South LWML is Candi Habisch who replaces Diane Reimold.

XX. BACK-TO-SCHOOL RECOMMENDATIONS

The Mid-South District schools and Early Childhood Centers have reported some changes in their plans. I have included those in (Appendix C). During the pandemic, the Mid-South District supplied our schools and ECC's with temporal temperature scanners to test everyone entering their buildings. (Appendix D). The entire staff of the Mid-South District were tested for the COVID virus. All of the results came back negative!

XXII. The Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod has announced the appointment of Rev. Daniel McMiller as Executive Director of the Office of International Missions. He will be overseeing the OIM missionary recruitment and regional operations.

XXIII. CONGREGATIONAL STATISTICS

There is an extension of the deadline for completing the annual Congregational Statistics information. The Mid-South District is around 85% complete for our congregations getting their information processed to Synod. We sent reminders going out to our congregations to bring up our compliance. The report determines the layout of our circuits, representation at the Synod Convention, and delegates.

Those non-reporting congregations include: Living Savior, Lowell; Community of Faith, Little Rock; Friends in Christ, Bryant; First, Benton; River Valley, Lamar; Our Savior, El Dorado; Faith, Forrest City; Faith, Magnolia; Christ Lutheran, Siloam Springs; St Paul, West Memphis; Peace, Mountain Home; and LakePointe, Hot Springs in Arkansas. In Tennessee, St Phillip, Chattanooga; Christ the Cumberlands, Harrogate; Shepherd of the Hills, McMinnville; Concordia, Nashville; Faith, Oak Ridge; and Spirit of Joy, Chattanooga. In Kentucky, Immanuel, Murray.

XXIV. CIRCUIT CONFIGFURATION for 2021 CONVENTION

The Synod has published the latest results of the baptized and confirmed members of our respective congregations in the Mid-South District. Prior to the 2018 District Convention, we had:

We did not request exceptions in 2018 for circuits that did not meet the minimum requirements under Synod Bylaw 3.1.2, for the Synod Convention. The Bylaw requires between 7 and 20 member geographically contiguous congregations with an aggregate confirmed membership of between 1,500 and 10,000 members. Both of the lower numbers are critical for our consideration.

This leaves the Fayetteville Circuit with 1,522 members and 7 congregations. It leaves Little Rock South Circuit with 2,431 members and 9 congregations. And, it leaves Stuttgart Visitation Circuit with 630 members and 4 congregations.

Stuttgart and Johnson City Circuits have been Visitation Circuits only for over a decade. Fort Smith was a Visitation Circuit, but with these changes, can now become an Electoral Circuit. We are still requesting no exceptions for Circuit Certification from Synod.

XXV. CANDIDATES FOR 2020 SPRING PLACEMENT

The preliminary information we received from both seminaries was that the graduating class for the 2020 Spring Placement service would have 80 students out of both seminaries. This is approximately half of the number of students coming from the seminaries ten years ago. The Mid-South District requested vicars, but received none in the Spring Placement. We will receive one, pending the approval of the COP for Winter Placement. We received a candidate for our Missionary-at-Large position. The Call services and Commencement Exercises were done remotely, without any crowd assembling for the ceremonies.

There were 134 requests for candidates for this year's Candidate Placement Services. There are 76 candidates from the MDIV programs at our two seminaries (34 FW, 42 StL). We were blessed to receive our single requested candidate to fill the Missionary-at-Large position for Beautiful Savior Lutheran Church, Olive Branch, MS (re-plant) Rev. Sawyer Meyers. There were 95 applications for vicars with 76 placements filled. Both seminaries indicated that their first year classes are substantially larger than this year's graduating classes, so a better trend for filling vacancies seems to have a better prospect.

XXVI. PRESIDENT OF CONCORDIA SEMINARY, ST LOUIS

The Board of Regents of Concordia Seminary, St Louis, were notified that the vacancy to fill the position of President of the Seminary when Dr. Dale Meyer retired was extended to Rev. Dr. Larry Rast. After a month of deliberation, he declined the Call.

Nominations in a second attempt to fill the position are being requested by the Presidential Search Committee. Those nominations has evaluated each of the candidates and made a recommendation of the top five candidates from the list of nominees. The Electors will meet to elect a new President. In the meantime, Rev. Dr. Daniel Preus has been named as Interim President of the St Louis Seminary. Nominations were due from congregations by August 15, 2020.

The electors are made up of the District President in the District where the seminary resides (Rev. Dr. Lee Hagen), the Chairman of the Board of Directors of the LCMS (Rev. Dr. Michael Kumm), the President of the LCMS (Rev. Dr. Matt Harrison), and one member of the current Board of Regents for the Concordia Seminary (Rev. Dr. John Wille).

XXVII. COMMISION ON THEOLOGY AND CHURCH RELATIONS.

With the retirement of Rev. Larry Vogel, the LCMS has announced the acceptance of the Call for CTCR Associate Director by Rev. Dr. Rick Serina.

XXVIII. LCMS OFFICE OF NATIONAL MISSIONS

The International Office of Mission for the LCMS will be contacting all Districts of the Synod to determine what "best practices" have led to self-sustaining church plants in our Districts. As you know, the Mid-South District has worked hard to determine what ingredients make for possible successful church planting. They will be reviewing all church plants beginning from 2000 to 2019. During that time, the Mid-South District had planned to start 23 different church plants. Of those 23, five are in their initial stages of working with the District and its financial support, and 16 have ceased operations.

XXIX. UNITED STATES SUPREME COURT RULINGS

Two significant decisions by the US Supreme Court have an impact on our congregations and schools. In the first case, the SCOTUS ruled 7 to 2 in favor of the Little Sisters of the Poor on ObamaCare imposition of contraceptives. President Trump had expanded the exemption under the ACA for employers to provide insurance coverage that included contraceptives. Several church-owned insurance plans opted out of offering contraceptive medications as a prevention against pregnancies, but allow for their use in cases where a woman has other medical concerns.

The second ruling, the SCOTUS ruled that civil courts cannot become involved in employment discrimination claims against religious organizations where the employee served in a religious function. This expanded the 2012 Tabor ruling that said religious organizations have a ministerial exception from employment discriminations lawsuits, but did not define the function of a "minister." The claimant filed suit in California that she did not have her contract renewed by a Catholic school, because of her age. Another Californian claimed that her contract was not renewed after she was able to return to work after a lengthy leave of absence for cancer treatment. In both cases, the women were teaching religious classes.

XXX. LCEF

We have received notification that LCEF will be discontinuing its' program of Laborers For Christ (LFC). The program began in 1980 to assist congregations in their building programs as a way to minimize construction costs. This will be a huge loss to congregations, schools, and other church-related organizations who are contemplating future building or remodeling programs. (Appendix F)

XXXI. CONCORDIA PLANS SERVICES

Concordia Plans Services has announced the aggregate rate increase for healthcare insurance coverage will be set at 4.95% for fiscal year 2021. (Appendix G)

Concordia Plans Services will be conducting Town Hall meetings in three different locations to give congregations the opportunity to see what Concordia Plans has to offer in the area of healthcare, retirement, supplemental retirement and disability, as well as answer questions that may arise. The Town Halls are scheduled for November 6, 7 & 8. Please encourage the decision makers in your congregation to attend these very important meetings.

If the government locks us down again, our enrollment will surely suffer because some of the new families are coming because they realize the shortcomings of virtual learning. Currently we have 27 enrolled in our preschool, but some of those are not set in stone either. We are rewriting our contracts and personnel manual so that if the government shuts us down and does not provide additional funding like they did in 2020, we will have the option of laying off teachers in the preschool so we can keep our head above water financially. Hopefully, that won't happen, but we are preparing to take necessary decisive steps to protect the ministry if we must.

And one of our teachers is take a reduction in pay, semi retiring, and taking over specials.

LCEF Announces Discontinuation of Laborers For Christ

Laborers For Christ (LFC), a ministry of Lutheran Church Extension Fund (LCEF) will discontinue operations on June 30, 2021, the conclusion of LCEF's fiscal year. This difficult decision comes following an extensive review of the LFC program over the past 18 months. This review revealed a number of critical issues impacting LFC operations, including a steady decline in available opportunities, increasing logistical and regulatory challenges and a marked shift in the needs of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) ministries we serve.

Current and pending LFC projects that have been contracted will be completed with work possibly continuing after June 30, 2021.

Beginning in 1980 as a ministry of the Rocky Mountain District, LFC operations were taken up by the LCMS Mission Board in 1985 and later by the LCMS Foundation. LFC activities were then transferred to LCEF in 2003. Over their 40 year history, LFC has completed more than 800 construction and renovation projects in service to LCMS congregations, schools and other ministries across the country. During this time, hundreds of dedicated men and women answered the call to serve. Their dedication to the church, the ministry of LFC and their love of our Lord has been a blessing to so many, and it has left an indelible mark upon the mission and ministry of the LCMS.

"The church has been blessed through the faithful work of Laborers For Christ for decades," said Rev. Bart Day, LCEF president and CEO. "We remember and celebrate the men and women who used their gifts and abilities to expand the footprint of the church. As the work now comes to an end, we thank God for all that has been accomplished. LCEF will consider new opportunities to serve the church in the future. As opportunities change, so must LCEF and the services we provide. We will honor the past and build the future, always growing ministry opportunities."

Heavenly Father, we thank you for the work and ministry of Laborers For Christ for the last 40 years and for the many lives and communities that their service has blessed and continues to bless. We ask that you bless the laborers as they finish their work and that you would continue to bless the ministry of LCEF. Amen.

LCEF, a non-profit organization, has served as the financial extension of the LCMS since 1978, offering funding and resources to LCMS congregations, schools and rostered church workers through investment support of LCMS members.

A message from Jim Sanft Moving Forward in Faith!

At the beginning of the COVID-19 crisis Concordia Plan Services (CPS), along with everyone else, focused on the transition to a new reality of quarantine. In a matter of a few days we transitioned from working at the International Center to working out of our homes. At the same time our churches, schools and other ministries also made the transition to this new environment. Online learning and online worship became reality overnight.

Although the nature and methods of ministry changed, by the grace of God ministry went on...and God's church continues to serve His people!

Like you, we still have a lot of unknowns ahead of us. Ministries are making plans for moving forward and CPS is making plans to serve LCMS ministries and workers—as together we move forward in faith!

At this time of year, CPS sets the rates for the Concordia Health Plan (CHP) for the upcoming year. We are pleased to tell you that the aggregate CHP rate increase for 2021 is set at 4.95%.

The best way to understand how we got to the aggregate increase is to think in terms of family finances. Ideally families have built up a "rainy day" fund.

Unexpected, non-budgeted expenses do arise. A rainy day fund can provide relief when these expenses hit. The availability of these funds provides financial stability during challenging times.

The CHP is managed to maintain a certain level of reserves. These dollars are intended to be a "rainy day" fund for the health plan. When expenses rise unexpectedly or if there is a run up in the number of high-cost claims, the reserves provide financial stability.

With the amount of uncertainty for all of us going into 2021, the CPS board and leadership determined this is an appropriate time to use a portion of the CHP reserves. Actuaries for the CHP estimated the rate increase needed for 2021 without using reserves could be as high as 9.9% — a number that would be devastating for ministries trying to rebuild from the pandemic!

We know challenging times bring questions and the need for conversation. We welcome the opportunity to engage with you and the ministries you serve. Our Ministry Engagement Team is working with district business managers to schedule "town hall" sessions to discuss the 2021 rates, as well as the new options and flexibility available in the CHP. We have heard repeatedly a desire for more choice, more flexibility and greater control in the benefits ministries offer workers. We are excited to respond to those calls and partner with LCMS ministries as we continue to provide a high level of care to those serving in His name.

Thank you for continuing ministry to a world that greatly needs the Good News of the love of Christ, and for caring for the workers of the LCMS!
