A Message from Rev. Dr. Roger Paavola, President

Encourager

A young man called his parents to wish them Happy New Year. His Dad answered the phone, so he asked, "Well Dad, what's your New Year's resolution?" His dad replied, "To make your mother as happy as I can all year." When his mom got on the phone he asked her the same question. His mother replied, "My resolution is to see that your dad keeps his New Year's resolution."

Are we Americans optimistic? A recent poll off the Internet said 70% of American expect 2025 to be better than 2024 - 70%! So, does the clock striking 12-midnight or flipping the calendar to the next day, month, and year really mean 2025 is going to be better? Will we change our bad habits, January 1, 2025 be that much different than December 31, 2024? Our wellbeing, the world, our bodies, and the entire Cosmos aren't inseparably tied to our calendar. In fact, 2/3 of our world doesn't even celebrate New Year's Eve.

So, where's our optimism coming from? Because we're a follower of Christ, we know our life should be filled with joy, and hope amidst all things – good or bad. We also know we have joy despite the junk that messed up those last years – but may likely happen again in 2025. St Paul's Epistles say joy in Christ is our strength – in bad or good times. This joy and peace passes our human understanding, that if properly grounded, nourished, and found, it will overcome even great grief and suffering.

When Jesus prayed to the Father, He said, "I pray that they [that's us - His dear children] may have the full measure of My joy within them." He also made a great promise, saying, "You will rejoice. And no one will take away your joy" No person, no thing, no circumstance, or no event life thrown in our way can take our peace and joy that passes our understanding!

It's Christ's Promise! Remember the times when Jesus spoke to His disciples about troubles and persecution. They were going to be stripped of everything they owned. Ten of the Eleven would be tortured and put to death. Despite all of this, Jesus promised them joy. So, why do a majority of Americans feel 2025 will be better? Because they realize 2024 hasn't even come close to what they wanted!

St Paul picks up on this idea saying, "Nothing -no disease, no persecution, no alienation, no loneliness, no torture, not even death can take this gift of Divine peace and joy away." Paul knew

how to live in a dying world – a world that's deeply immersed in brokenness, troubles, persecution, and conflict. Look at our city's streets! How can Christians live like that?!

Paul's answers us on our entry into another optimistically-filled New Year: He says that because we're followers of Christ, our bad things are real, but God will work them together for good, our good thing won't be lost – the reason for our Divine joy. The bad things that happen to us (are bad) but will work together for good in Christ. Paul says, "We know that for those who love God all things work together for good, for those who are called according to His purpose."

Everything! The Good, the Bad, and the Ugly can happen to Christians, just as they do to the rest of the world. But for the Christians – those called according to His purpose - these things will

never make us lose our hope in our Promise from God.

The sun rises on the evil and on the good. God sends rain on the just and the unjust. We face the reality of what it means to journey through this temporal life. Bad things happen. But God wants us to live in an eternal joy and get us out of this rat trap where evil things happen. Being a Christian doesn't put an invisible shield around us or give us trees in our backyards that grow money. That's not the ways things happen in this real world.

Too many Christians hear preachers say that if you have enough faith, love God, and serve Him faithfully, then you won't have any bad things happen to you. If that's true, explain the martyr deaths of countless thousands who died for their faith in Christ? How do we explain the poverty, suffering, and death of

Jesus? Simply stated, false teachings that becoming a Christian turns everything on this earth into a bed of roses is simply false!

Scriptures doesn't teach that nonsense. St Paul makes this clear. He says "All things" good and bad will be used for the good of those who love God. "What then will separate us from the love of Christ? Will hardship, or distress or persecution, or famine, or nakedness or peril or sword?" Those aren't good things. They're terrible! God's Word says that when these things do happen to those who love

God, they won't separate us from God's love, peace, and joy... ever! Thanks be to God, when the good things come by His grace.

Paul doesn't say, "Things work together for good." He knew that when he relied on his own works or flesh, he constantly failed. He wrote, "O wretched man that I am! Who can deliver me from the body of this death? I thank God: [it is] through Jesus Christ our Lord." If St Paul struggled with sin and failure, what makes us think we won't?

When someone is there to hug us when we're hurting, or holds our hand when we're in despair, if someone loves us despite all the flaws and sin, God brings all these things together for our good! Paul says that we have the promise that all these things will work for our good because of His love for us.

Paul writes, "For those whom He foreknew, He also predestined to be conformed to the image of His Son, in order that He might be the firstborn among many brothers. And those whom He predestined, He also called, and those whom He called, He also justified, and those whom He justified, He also glorified. What shall we say of these things? If God is for us, who can be against us? He who did not spare His own Son but gave Him up for us all, how will He not also with Him graciously give us all things?"

Isn't the word "glorified" past tense? Shouldn't Paul have said, "He will glorify?" The Greek is clear, Paul speaks of glorification as an accomplished fact: Glorified! God won't let anything in this life get between us and His eternal



Promise. We're predestined, chosen, elected, and conformed into the image of Christ by God's grace in Holy Baptism. When simple water and His Word was poured over us, we became an inheritor of God's Kingdom, one with eternal intimacy with God. "...predestined to be conformed into the likeness of his Son."

Paul gives us certainty, "For I am persuaded, that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor powers, nor things present,

nor things to come, nor height, nor depth, nor any other thing in all of creation, shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which is ours in Christ Jesus our Lord." It's our covenant relationship given by God.

We don't have to wait for another day, another year, the ticking of a clock, a month on the calendar, a year in our journals, a decade, or even for a lifetime. God promises a better eternal life filled with joy – a life glorified in Christ

 a life being conformed into the image of His Son – and a life that never ends. May God bless you in your New Year and forever.

# **Redeemer's New Baptismal Font**

The font that was installed recently at Redeemer was supplied jointly by New Holland Church Furniture of New Holland, Pennsylvania, and Henninger's Inc of Brook Park, Ohio. New Holland crafted the base out of rift-sawn red oak wood, and Henninger's sourced the carving of the marble top from artisans in Carrara, Italy.

The font was customdesigned, and a traditional eightsided font was chosen because of the symbolism associated with the eight sides. Christ was raised on the 8th day of the week, and



Blessing of Redeemer's new Baptismal Font on the Last Sunday of Church Year.


likewise believers received new life through baptism. Also, in the Old Testament, infant boys were circumcised when they were eight days old. With circumcision being the shadow of the substance that is baptism, an eight-sided font reminds us of that connection. Lastly, the eight-sided font reminds us of the eight souls that were saved in the flood on Noah's ark. The Flood Prayer is traditionally said during a baptism, so this symbolism provides additional reinforcement.

The font was placed at the entrance to the nave in part to provide ornamentation where there had previously been none, but also to show that we are a congregation that places an emphasis on the sacraments. The placement of the font also is in keeping with the tradition that baptism is the entrance into Christian life in the church.

The eight-sided font presented us with the opportunity (and challenge) of including carved imagery on the font. It was decided that four alternating panels would contain Luther's Rose. The remaining four panels would contain Noah's Ark, the Agnus Dei, a shell (a traditional symbol of baptism), and a descending dove which represents the Holy Spirit who is delivered in baptism. Mr. Edward Riojas was commissioned to provide graphic consistency amongst the carvings. Mr. Riojas' designs are also featured in Redeemer's new paraments. -Chris Goldbeck
